NOT GUILTY

U. S. News & World Report recently carried an extensive interview with Secretary of Commerce John T. Connor on a variety of matters affecting business. Some of the questions and answers dealt with the balance of payments problem and possible solutions.

It is refreshing that the Secretary said that there is no plan for imposing a travel tax on Americans who go abroad, even though a program is in effect to encourage travel within this country. Then he was asked this question: "Does a person need to feel guilty about it, if he's planning to take a trip to Europe this summer?" Mr. Connor's answer: "Not at all. But if he decides he is going to take a trip, we have the additional suggestion that he use American-owned facilities to the extent possible, and that he keep down his purchases while abroad."

This is certainly a constructive and sensible position. The ever-increasing volume of travel between nations, which the jet age has made possible, is one of the instruments for promoting better international understanding. It brings us a little closer to a really peaceful world. To place roadblocks in the way of that would be to take a step backward.

Mr. Connor's suggestion that Americans going abroad use American facilities is also a sound one. Our international airlines, for instance, provide standards of service of the highest order, and at competitive rates. They have thoroughly earned our patronage.

THE POVERTY PROBLEM

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States organized a Task Force on Economic Growth and Opportunity, consisting of more than 100 leaders of industry, business and finance, to make an independent, constructive examination of the poverty problem. Its first report has been issued and others will follow. The group fully recognizes that poverty is a very real issue in this country. It finds its alleviation is a prime social and national goal. But it questions, and with every reason, if large-scale programs such as road construction and urban renewal can effectively combat poverty. And it recommends that priority be given to human resource development programs that "provide people with the help and opportunities to move out of poverty and become productive citizens."

This goes to the core of the problem. There are, of course, a number of totally dependent poor who for one reason or another—age, illness, disability—cannot help themselves. They must be given relief, and that is certainly a function of society. But, the report emphasizes, the poor who can be helped to help themselves can best be aided by such measures as education, training, rehabilitation and so on. In its words, simply to offer such people guaranteed incomes or similar welfare doles "is to write off their lives."

And, let it be remembered, the sound long-run solution to the poverty problem is to build our economy, thus creating more jobs, more wealth, more opportunity.

THE MINIMUM WAGE PROBLEM

In one of his recent newspaper columns, David Lawrence wrote of the dangers and problems that are apt to result from arbitrary increases in the federal minimum wage, which is now set at \$1.25 an hour.

For one thing, increases lead to demands for wage boosts by more highly-paid workers. In Mr. Lawrence's words, ". . . as one class of employes is given an increase, the class just above it feels

it is entitled to something of the same kind. This is often referred to as 'bumping' the wage scales."

For another thing, upping the minimum may actually do the most damage to those it is designed to help. Of this, Mr. Lawrence says, "It can . . . mean that those persons without skills who are not considered to be worth more than \$1.25 an hour would find it more difficult to get jobs because it might prove necessary for employers to hire better qualified persons at higher wages rather than to take chances with employees who are not really competent to do the work."

In sum, jacking up the minimum could set off a new wage-price spiral which would hit everyone in the country, and fall hardest on people of small means and lack of skills. And that, incidentally, would prevent the attainment of two avowed administration goals—increased employment, and the maintenance of a stable wage structure.

LITTLE VALLEY, N.Y., HUB: "President Johnson has asked all citizens to stay at home this year and 'see America' in order to get a better balance of payments and less outflow of gold. But the President's daughters have stated they will tour Europe this summer . . . Will someone please explain this for us?"

LONDON, OHIO, MADISON PRESS: "Obviously, each generation should pay its own way in life. It is grossly unfair for one generation to pass laws that impose staggering burdens on the next generation. In this case of war, in which a country is fighting for its life, one can understand the accumulation of debt. But for a country to go deeper and deeper into debt, when it is at a peak of prosperity, is a cruel and unfair act directed at the young."

NORWALK, CONN., HOUR: "More than 350 Americans have been killed in Viet Nam, and the total grows almost daily . . . In the last three years, exports by America's allies to the Viet Cong aggressors have increased 25 per cent, and their purchases from North Viet Nam have nearly doubled . . . What the United States needs more than sympathy is allies. Perhaps the welcome announcement by Australia that it is sending 800 troops to help U. S. combat forces will cause some soul-searching among those who speak one loyalty but practice another."

WEST POINT, MISS., LEADER: "Our government, in its concern with minutia, has yet to mark the sparrow's fall, but through the National Labor Relations Board it has become involved with the passing of dogs and cats. It seems that the Teamsters Union set out to organize a couple of pet cemeteries in Peoria, Ill., and wanted an N. L. R. B. election."

BURLINGTON, WISC., STANDARD-PRESS: "These politicians are all alike. Hubert Humphrey gives up his seat a few days early so his Minnesota governor can make an early appointment—by a day or two—and give the new senator a few extra hours seniority. What a racket!"

CLERMONT, FLA., PRESS: "That the majority is always right, that our chosen leaders are infallible, and that our nation is invincible, are extremely popular misconceptions that are much too often confused with patriotism. 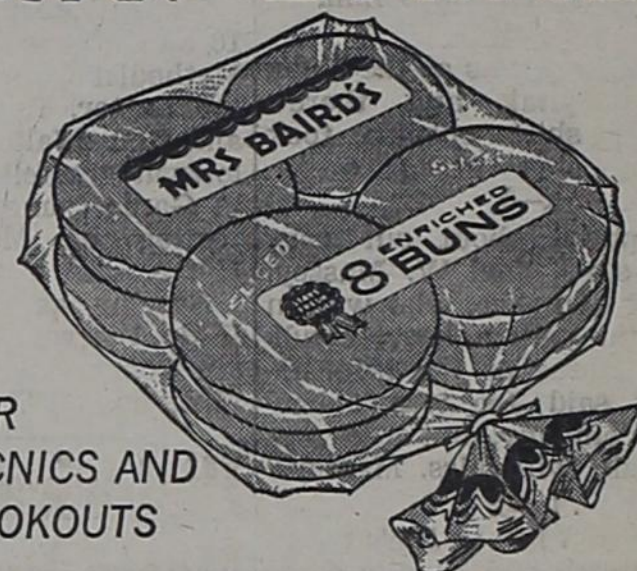
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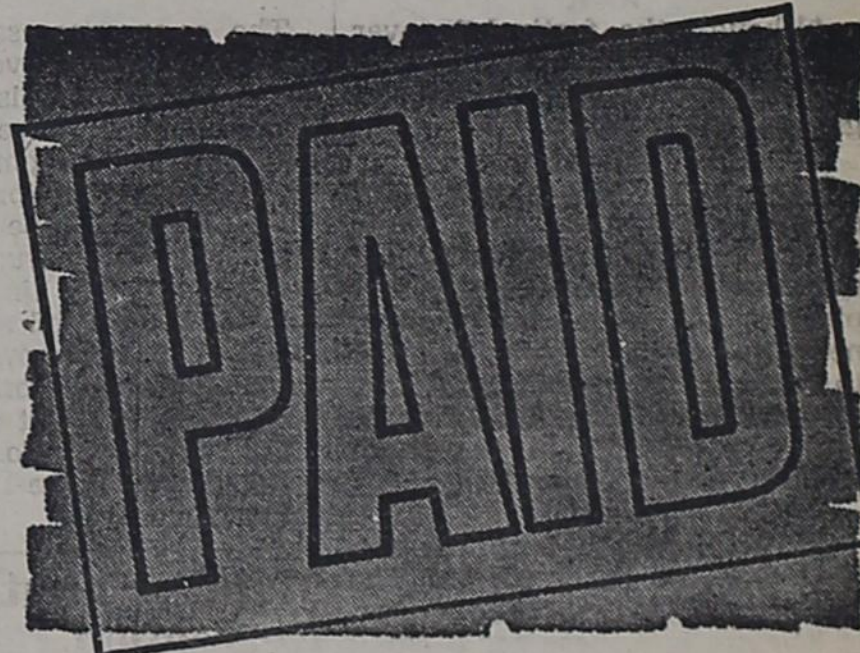
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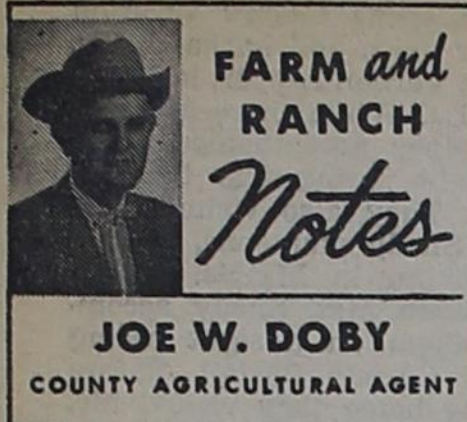

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The third annual Knox County Vegetable Festival is now history. The entries in the vegetable and fruit divisions were an improvement in quality over past years. The home gardening exhibits really put the show over this year. Exhibitors are learning what to look for and how to prepare a quality product.

The judges of the vegetable show were Dr. Jack Kyle, Lubbock Experiment Station; Virgil Woodfin, Iowa Park Experiment Station and Lester Brooks, retired Superintendent of the Iowa Park Station. They asked me to pass on a few comments concerning the show. The biggest fault of the exhibits was the lack of uniformity in the size of the total entry. One person brings in six green beans for instance and someone else brings in a quart, which was listed as correct amount for an exhibit. The few may be of better quality than the others, but it makes a difficult job for the judges to decide. Obtain a copy of the rules and bring in the exact amount specified. This will help the show more than anything else.

The commercial exhibits were outstanding, also. The earliness of the show and late spring kept the cantaloupes and watermelons from being ready.

The yield and quality of the potato variety test was the best this year it has ever been. This test is one of three in Texas which breeding lines from the USDA at Beltsville, Texas Experiment Station and many other State Experiment Stations are planted and observed. Notes were taken on vigor, vine growth and disease resistance as well as the actual yield per acre and the specific gravity. The results of the test here, at Lubbock and Crystal City, Texas, are evaluated and the decision made whether to repeat the line, advance to plot increase or to drop it entirely.

The specific gravity is a measure of the soluble solids in potatoes. The specific gravity of water is one, so the specific gravity of the solids in potatoes will cause it to be heavier. The higher the specific gravity of potatoes, the lower the oil content of the

chips. S. G. usually varies from 1.005 to 1.090. It varies with the same variety grown in different soils and with various stages of maturity.

There were 158 lines in the test this year grown on the farm of Gene Thompson in a commercial field of Cherokees. A total of 51 of these lines were recommended for repeat or advance on the basis of their performance. The top yield in the plot was 404 bags per acre with another line making 397. This is the total 100 pound bags of all grades.

Watermelon and cantaloupe growers are urged to watch their fields carefully for disease. A field near Gore is affected by alternaria leaf spot. As the name indicates, the disease shows up as spots on the leaves and spreads to other leaves. To produce quality fruit, all the leaves must function to produce food. A preventive spray program of a weekly application of 2 pounds Maneb in 100 gallons of water is strongly advised. Alternate every other week with zineb at the same rate.

Leaf miner damage has also been noted in many fields. The damage is done by a tiny worm which eats through one layer of the leaves leaving a zigzag path. Aphids may also be a problem. A spray application of .5 pound of actual Diazinon can be used to control both of these pests. This material can be used up to three days before harvest. It is very important that the correct amount be applied. Each grower should have a copy of MP 675, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Commercial Vegetable Crops, to use as reference.

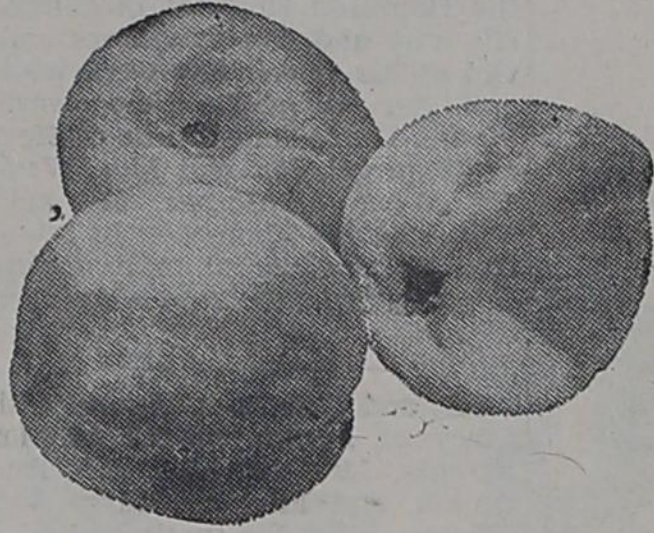
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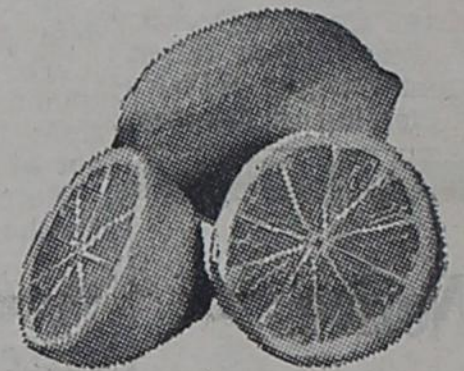

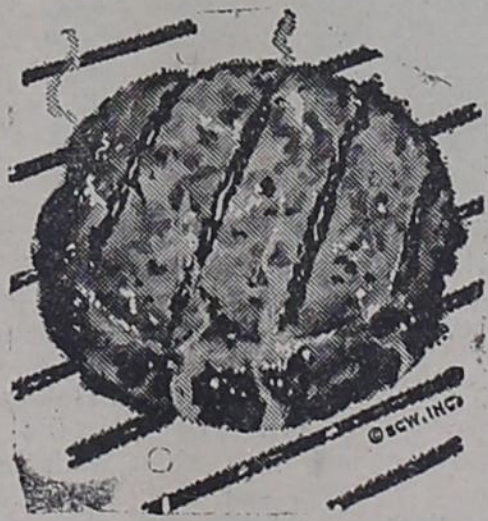

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 81 to 89 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 160 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 89 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 160 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 81 to 89 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 81 to 89 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
