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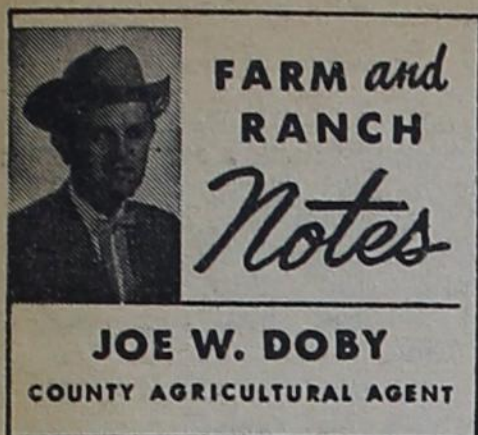

FARM and RANCH Notes

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Mr. K. O. Haddadin, vegetable production specialist, from the country of Jordan, will be visiting in Knox County, April 25-30. Mr. Haddadin is in the United States for a year. He is learning principles and techniques of the way we grow vegetables in order to better teach his own people. Jordan is bringing new land under irrigation and will have a big education program to conduct with their farmers.

Two worm samples from cattle wounds were mailed in last week from Knox County. Both were

determined to be non-screw-worms. One was from a farm east of Vera and the other near Truscott.

Knox County has reached its quota in the current screwworm eradication fund drive, reports Mr. B. B. Campbell, Jr., treasurer. Several community chairmen have not finished contacting all the producers in these communities. Livestock producers that have not been contacted can help by sending their money in so this drive can be completed. Everyone agrees that this is the cheapest worm control they have ever experienced.

Planning to buy some galvanized roofing for your farm or commercial building? If so, you should know what service the material will give.

Quality roofing will give longer years of service at the lowest annual cost. Roofing sheets are usually 26, 28, or 29 gauge. The lower figure indicates the thickness. Gauge influences the weight and strength and the

time required to rust through.

Galvanized roofing is made of zinc coated steel or iron. Uncoated iron or steel will start rusting soon after sheets are put in place. Zinc does not rust. Therefore this material is applied in thin coats on both sides of roofing sheets to give protection to the base metal.

The amount of zinc coating determines the lasting quality of the roofing before rusting begins. Zinc coatings are designated in ounces. The highest quality roofing has two ounces of zinc, the next grade one and one-half ounces, and lower grades one, or three-fourths of an ounce.

This ounce designation is the amount of zinc coating per square foot, on both sides of the sheet. The amount of zinc should be stamped on each sheet you buy. If there is no stamp on the roofing, there is no way to know how much zinc it has.

Tests indicate that galvanized roofing with two ounces of zinc lasts twice as long as roofing with one ounce. The zinc coating is eventually worn off by the weather. The atmosphere in different localities has some effect on the lasting qualities. Roofing with a two ounce coating of zinc should last 10 to 15 years and sheets with one and one-half ounces should last 5 to 10 years before rusting appears. Roofing with no designated zinc coating may start rusting in one to three years.

Galvanized roofing should be painted before any rust appears and if this is done, any quality roof paint will be satisfactory. If you wait until rust appears, you should use a metallic zinc paint to prevent further rusting.

The county elimination contest for all method demonstrations and public speaking will be held for all 4-H members Saturday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. in the courthouse. Junior and Senior winners in each division will be eligible to compete in the district contests at Midwestern University on May 8.

Good insect control means healthier and more productive home gardens. As an aid to home gardeners, entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have prepared information which should help in the fight against insect pests. The new publication, L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden," is now available without cost at my office or from the bulletin racks in the banks at Knox City and Munday.

Among the topics covered in the publication are discussions of the three groups of insects which normally cause trouble in the home garden. They include those with sucking mouth parts, those with chewing mouth parts and those which live in the soil.

Each group requires a different control method and often a different insecticide. Dust and sprays are discussed as are insecticides used in combinations. The entomologists have prepared tables showing the amount of each recommended insecticide needed to make even a small amount of spray, and have listed safety precautions regarding the use of the most commonly used materials.

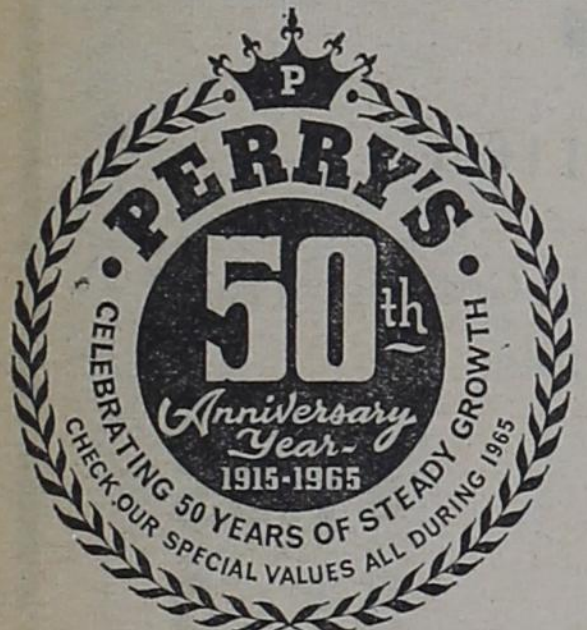

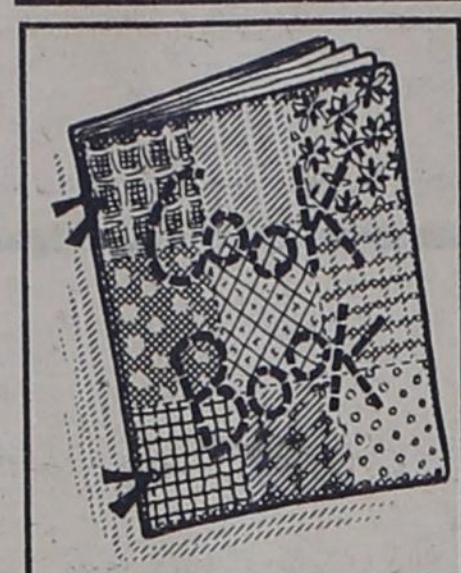
