Everyone including players will be charged an admission of 25 cents. No prizes will be awarded.

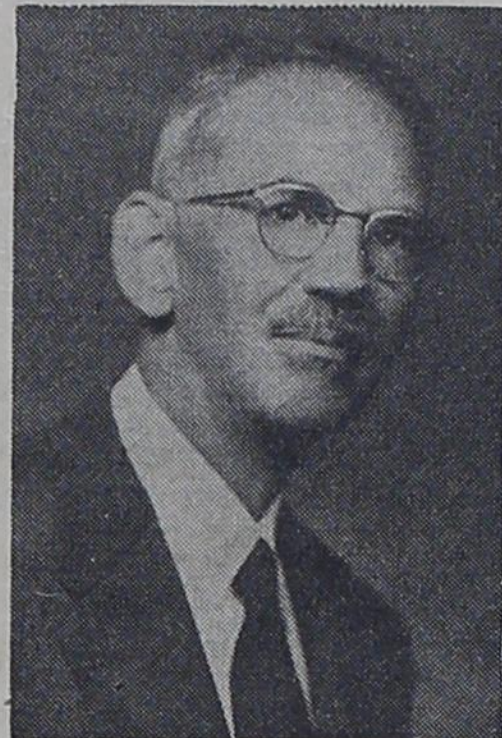

City Council Hires Engineer For Paving

After some weeks of silence since the city voted to enter a street paving project, the City Council has voted to enter into a contract with the engineering firm of Biggs and Mathews of Wichita Falls, with J. E. Biggs as principal engineer.

Mr. Biggs was here last Saturday to make a visual inspection of the streets under consideration for paving in order to get a complete survey of the drainage and familiarize himself with the grading, etc.

Biggs stated that he plans to have a survey crew here this week to begin a preliminary study of the project. As soon as plans are completed, estimated costs determined, etc., it is the plan of the City Council to call a citizen's meeting to discuss the paving with the people. An engineer and staff members will be present to answer questions.

"There is a need for this paving project having a twofold purpose," J. E. Reeves, mayor, stated—"to improve our streets and drainage, as well. This will be made available to the people, if they want it. It will be the project of the people of Munday, not the city officials only."

"The project will necessitate a bond issue, which will be voted by all resident property owners of Munday. It is the desire of the City to vote only the bonds necessary, without increasing taxes above the present rate.

"If you desire terms on the cost of your paving, arrangements can be made for those who qualify, giving them up to three years time. Your help and cooperation will be a must if this project succeeds," he concluded.

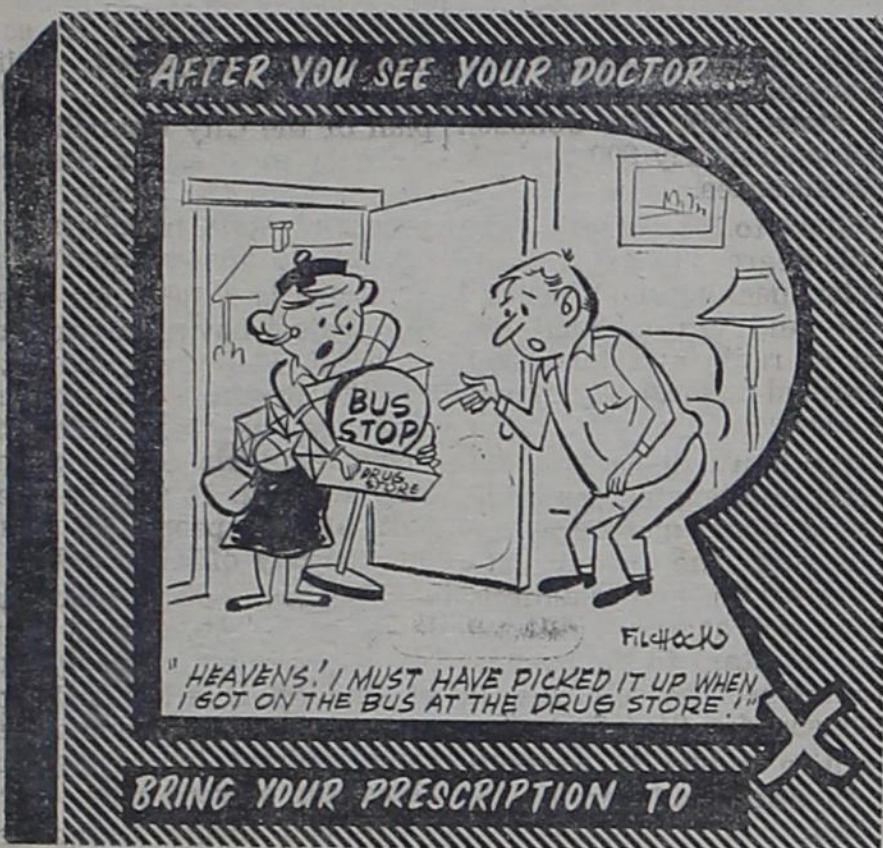
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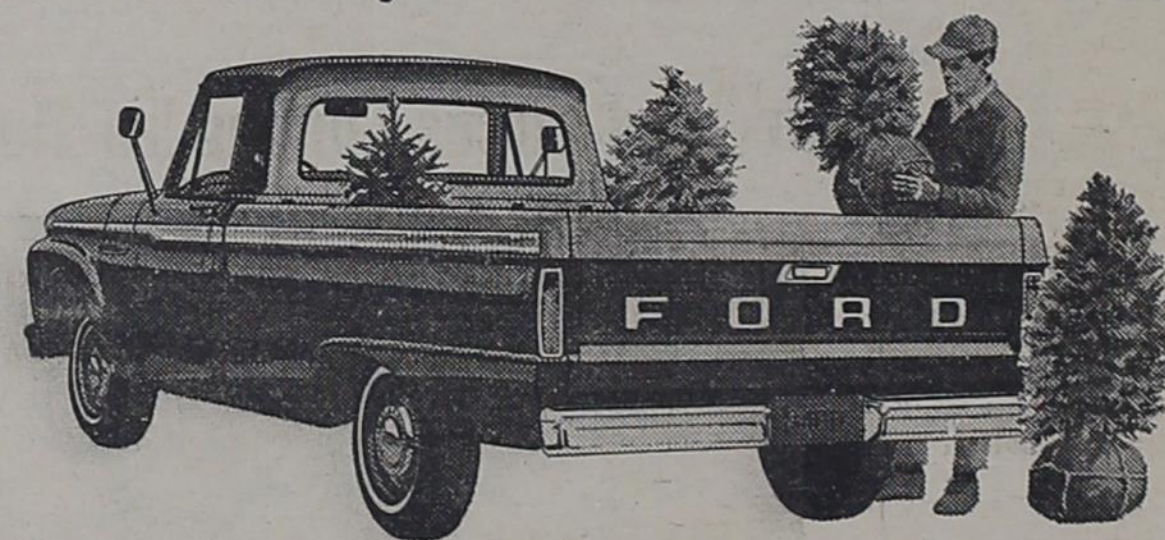
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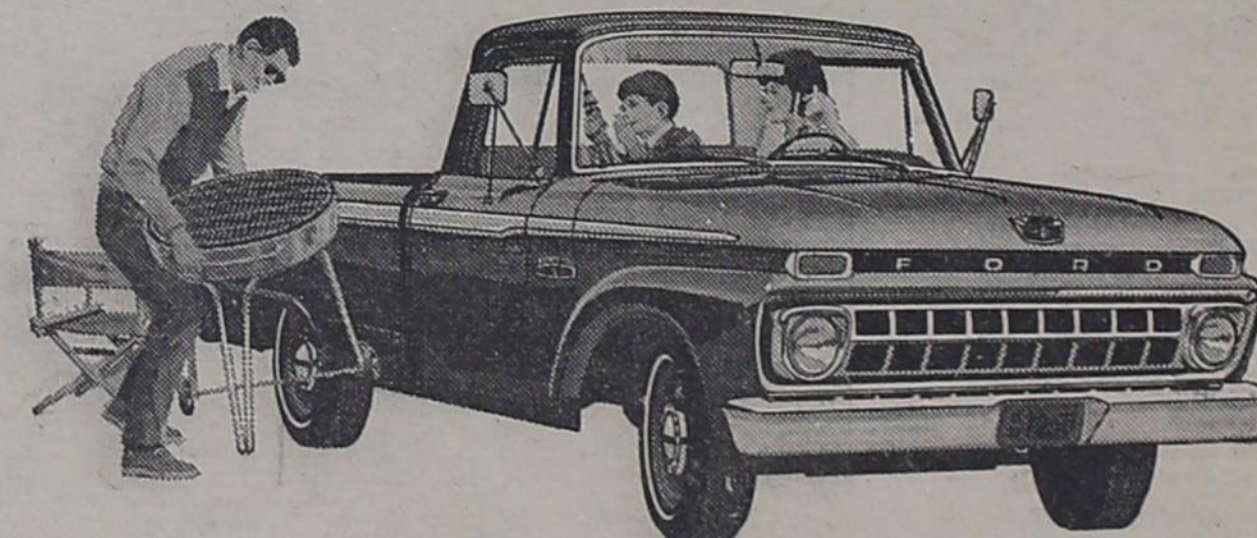

Hightower Voices Opposition To Senate Increase

Senator Jack Hightower, of Vernon, stood almost alone last week in opposition to a proposed change in the Constitution. S. J. R. 41, introduced by 22 members of the Senate, provides for an increase in the size of the Senate from 31 to 39 members. The proposal also includes a provision for six-year terms for the Senators and provides that some members of the present Senate will not have to run for office again until 1970.

Senator Hightower said: "I may be just a voice in the wilderness but the Senate is about to make a drastic change in our Constitution. I do not like the prospects of redistricting any more than any other member of this body. I shudder at what it might do to me, but I believe that this proposal will merely postpone what will ultimately be a very unpleasant task for this Senate."

"If we give the urban areas eight new Senators now, this number, combined with the five they already have, will make it possible for the population cen-

ters to dictate the terms of the redistricting which will be required after 1970. 1970 is not far away. Even though it may hurt us individually, we should not try to postpone our duty to redistrict by taking the easy way.

"The Legislature of 1970 could just as easily add eight more Senators at that time. We have a job to do, the responsibility is ours, and we should do it now.

"The proponents say that we can write a bill under this amendment which would not require us to run against each other. This may keep us from opposing each other, but certainly does not guarantee that any one would run without opposition. The people at home are still going to say who will represent them in this Senate.

"In amending the Constitution we should take the long look—not what will be best for the moment, but what will be best for the State in the years ahead."

Hightower's opposition expres-

sed the fear of many rural area people that future redistricting plans will change the traditional pattern of politics in Texas which has been centered in the small towns and rural areas.

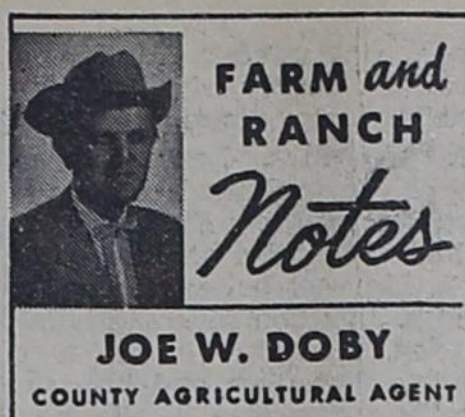

Randy Reeves, Gilliland and Pam Roberts, Benjamin, co-chairman of the 4-H Council this year, will be master and mistress of ceremonies.

Each club may enter as many talent acts as it desires. Each act can have from one to nine members and an adult can act as accompanist if required. The top senior act will be entered in the district contest to be held in Wichita Falls on May 8.

As credit becomes more important to the farming business perhaps we should consider what characteristics a farmer needs in order to be a good credit risk. Kansas State University recently ran a survey to find out what credit men look for when making a loan. They are listed below in order of importance.

1. Progress in increasing net worth; 2. Ambition; 3. Loan history prompt payment of notes; 4. Management practices; 5. Co-operativeness; 6. Family buying

habits; 7. Farming experience; 8. Formal credit rating; 9. Cooperation of the family; 10. Mechanical skills; 11. Level of family living; 12. Flexibility of production; 13. Scale of operation; 14. Financial backing.

Note that ambition ranks high, scale or size is at the bottom of the list and age is of no importance.

Many homeowners have seen their favorite ornamentals killed or weakened by insect infestations. Just about every ornamental plant and shade tree grown in Texas is subject to attack by one or more insect pests during the season.

In most cases, it is not necessary to be able to identify every insect or pest attacking plants around the home. The main points to know are how the insect is causing damage and the part of the plant it is feeding on. The majority of ornamental pests can be divided into two groups—those that chew and those that suck.

The mouthparts of sucking insects are arranged so that a hollow beak can be inserted into the plant and the juices withdrawn. This results in a weakened condition and may invite the entry of wood borers who cannot survive in a healthy tree.

Chewing insects eat the leaves, thus reducing the food manufacturing areas of the plant. Some insects girdle the plant near the soil surface thereby stopping circulation and killing it.

To control insects on ornamental plants, combination sprays or dusts or a specific insecticide may be used. Combination materials are marketed under various trade names and may contain a fungicide as well as insecticides. All active ingredients must be stated on the labels. Directions for application are also found on the label. These combinations will give satisfactory control of a large variety of sucking and chewing insects. Sprays will usually give better control of ornamental pests than dusts.

Extension recommendation for control of ornamental insects are given in L-199, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants. The insecticides are given by their actual names rather than trade names in this publication.

However, don't expect these recommendations to work 100% every time. Here are fine basic principles to follow in successful pest control: 1. Good equipment for application; 2. Selection of the proper insecticide; 3. Correct application; 4. Starting control measures before serious damage results; 5. Repeat applications must be made in 7-10 days to control certain pests such as scales, white flies and spider mites.

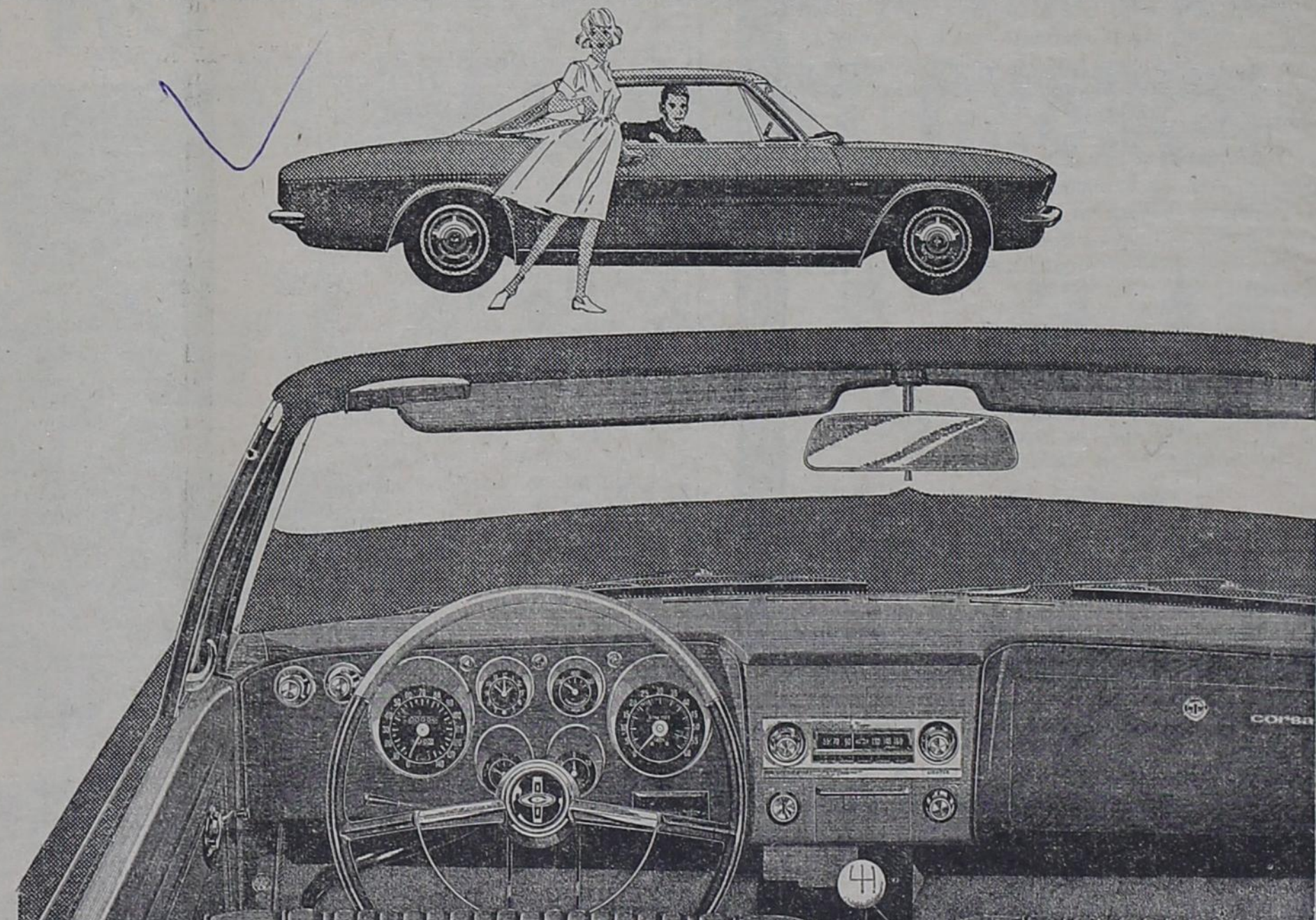

Croup is one of the symptoms of a throat problem. Breathing is difficult and there may be a spasm of the larynx with a wheezing sound. It may occur in acute laryngitis, a streptococcus sore throat or even diphtheria.

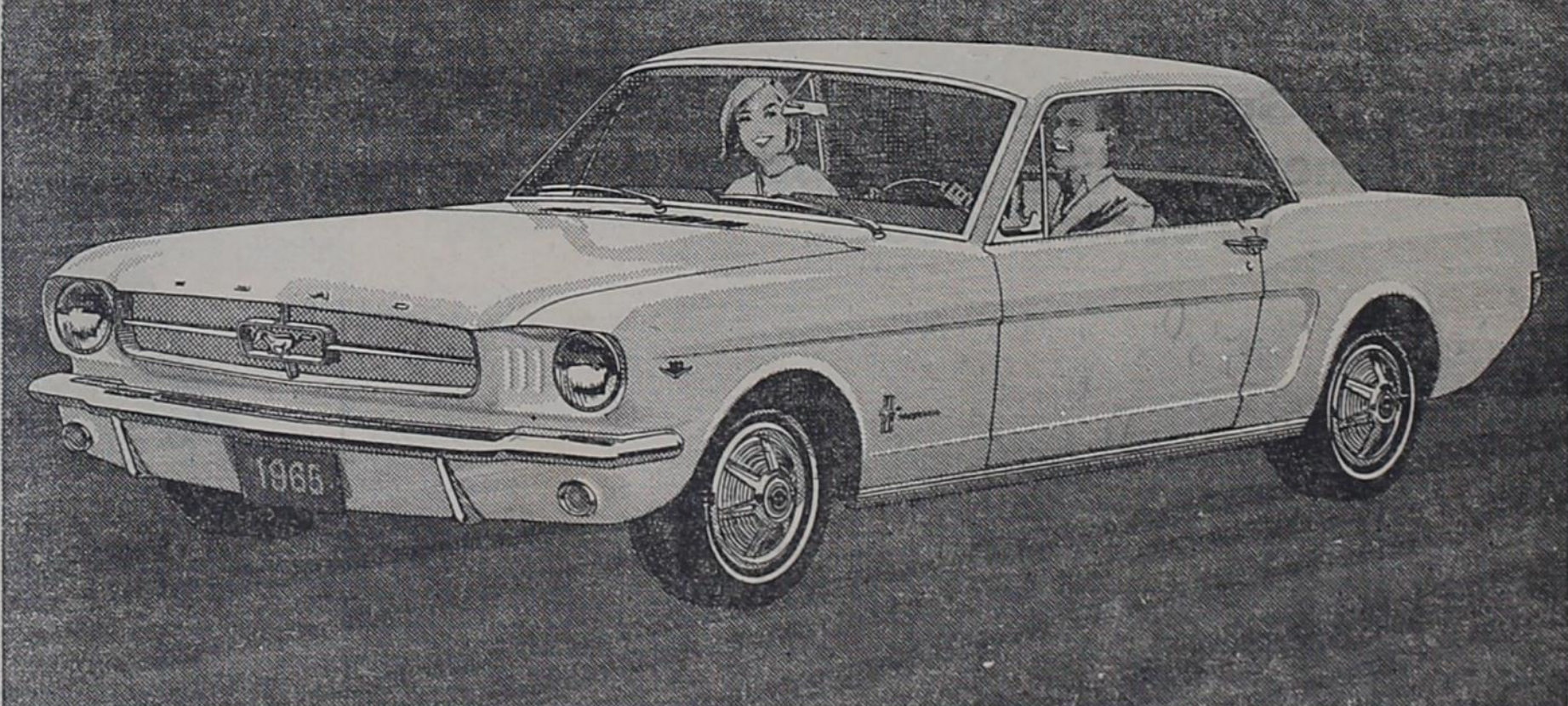
