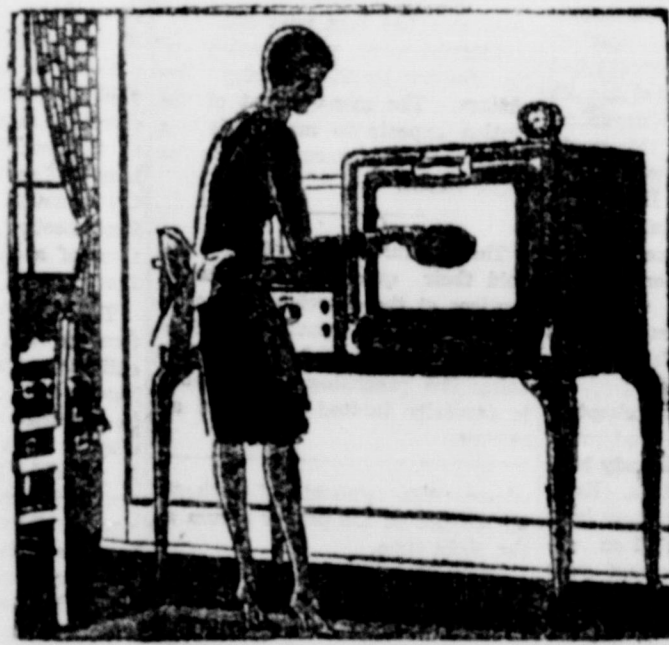

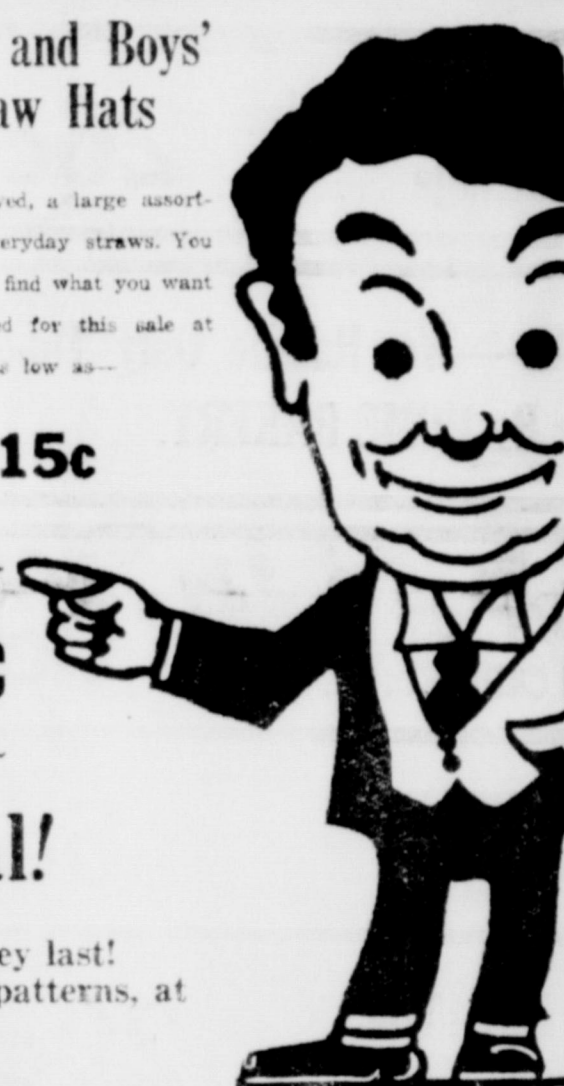

Sunday School Lesson

Golden Text: "He is the Lord of lords and King of kings." Rev. 17-14.

(Lesson Text: Luke 19-29-42-48.)

Chapters nine to nineteen of Luke's Gospel have been called the diary of the Jerusalem road. They tell about the final journey of Jesus to the city of David. It was a period of strain, finality and tragedy, often lost sight of as we study the side lights which occurred along the journey. A week before his death Jesus approached Jerusalem. His work was drawing to a close and his heart was full of concern for the future. Not so much doubtful for his own personal welfare but solicitous for the future of his teachings. The impending suffering on the cross and the potential growth of the Kingdom of God were the ideas in his mind as he approached the capital city of his people.

The entry of Jesus into Jerusalem was a triumphal procession. The multitude of disciples greeted him with praise and rejoicing, hailing him as the long-awaited messiah. The Pharisees scowled at this recognition and wanted him to rebuke his followers. Jesus did nothing to check the interpretation of the populace and permitted the demonstration to continue unrestrained. He was ready for the crisis of his life and knew it had arrived.

In making the formal entry into Jerusalem riding a colt as a symbol of the peaceful nature of his mission, Jesus made his last appeal to the people to accept him—the climax to three years teaching and working miracles. The time for explanation was over; Jesus boldly and spectacularly made his claim as the Expected One.

As he approached the city, seeing the "imperial mantle of proud towers," the palace and the temple, and realizing the future ruin which would come, Jesus wept aloud, giving vent to the strangest evidence of emotion in his life. He could foresee the horrors and suffering of the Roman siege by Titus and could foretell the punishment which the passions of the people would bring upon themselves. His heart was touched with pity for those who could not receive him or understand the purpose of his coming.

After his triumphal entry Jesus went about Jerusalem in his ordinary manner. The second cleansing of the temple occurred about this time, when he charged that the house of prayer had been made a den of robbers by those who were using religion for selfish and tricky greed. In this there is a note of warning for all of those who today profess religion for mercenary purposes. Each day Jesus followed his practice of teaching and every day the opposition of the chief priest and scribes became more determined because they saw in the success of his mission the destruction of their own power and the end of their extortion and privilege.

The crowd which greeted Jesus so enthusiastically upon his entrance soon became subdued. The people were disappointed; no extraordinary miracles were being performed; no revolt against Rome had been instituted; they could not get away from the idea that Jesus had established a temporal kingdom. The great mass could not understand the spiritual significance of the Kingdom of God. They could not visualize the enemies of that kingdom in the pride, ambition, vanity, hypocrisy and cruelty which dwelled in the hearts of men.

So, finally, the critics of Jesus grew bolder and questioned his authority. Jesus answered by questioning them as to John the Baptist, which placed them in a dilemma. If they admitted John had been a prophet they were confronted by the fact that he had
