



(Lesson Text: Luke 19-29-42-45-

It was a period of strain, finality and tragedy, often lost sight of as we study the side lights which occurred along the journey. A week before his death Jesus approached Jerusalem. His work was drawing to a close and his heart was full of concern for the future. Not so much doubtful for his own personal welfare but solicitous for the future of his teachings. The impending suffering on the cross and the potential growth of the Kingdom of .God were the ideas in his mind as he approached the capital city of his people.
