We all see mud- Burns Post 16 of The American dy streams and rivers and know Legion at Covington, ten miles A Want Ad In The Times Pays that the thing that makes them muddy is dirt-soil. We hear and repeat that 500,000 acres of land is being lost each year through erosion. But still that doesn't get down to how much is lost from my farm and your farm when the top soil is washed away."

In this way, Howard T. Kingsbery, chairman of the Texas PMA Committee, points up the conservation problem—that the problem of erosion concerns more than the farmer. Consumers everywhere, he says, have an interest in what happens to the soil-"It's where all of us get our food."

The chairman calls attention to a study made by the U.S. Geological Survey on the Iowa River in lowa from October 1, 1945 to Septmber 30, 1946. In this study the actual soil loss was carefully re-

During this period a million and . half tons of topsoil from Iowa farms went down the giver. It was estimated that if this lost topsoil were loaded into trucks, the trucks standing bumper to bumper would

reach a distance of 1400 miles. Figuring the loss of fertility and the lower yields of crops where the topsoil was washed away, it is estimated that the erosion in one county alone had taken more han two million dollars' worth of and down the river. 

enterprise country. Of course, Switzerland was not a belligerent, and hence was spared some spoilage of war. But now comes news that Belgium is prospering. What is the reason? Belgium chose a free economic system at the close of the war, when she might have taken some foolish panacea. This little country rightly chose a system of free enterprise and economic freedom as the system most likely to bring recovery.

Practical A REASONABLE degree of freedom is enjoyed by the Belgium Reports have it that the standard of living there is well up toward pre-war levels. Newspaper reports have called attention to Belgium's airline, Sabena, which reported its net profit for the year at \$2,800,000. This has happened despite the fact it started out with practically nothing after the war. The airline had lost most of its equipment, and had to get help from the government to go ahead.

This is high contrast to what s happening to British airlines. Owned entirely by the socialist government and operated by them, the British airlines find difficulty in keeping their losses down to that figure. The difference is that Britain blundered is choos- dom.

Belgium will notice her good example. Planned economy sometimes looks good on paper, but it is free economy that permits people to use their initiative and work out their own salvation.

And in this there is a lesson for our own people: labor was at that time cooperating in Belgium with the management of industry and with government, in keeping prices down. America has not achieved that much teamwork, and we need it. Dangers still threaten in the battle against in-

In Belgium, labor leaders were saying that it was necessary to increase production and thereby bring down prices rather than put up wages and keep prices high. They reasoned that in the long run this would be the best for labor. It is not surprising that their standard of living is reported good by those who have recently toured the country.

As a result of that policy, and because she kept her private ownership and private manage-ment of industry, Belgium has come back more rapidly than other European countries that were hit by war. This experience is only another link in the strong chain of evidence that free men working in a free economy are happier and better off than they could ever be under some kind of totalitarian government - any kind. Weekly Health

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin-The recent death of a child in south Texas from rabies emphasizes the danger of this disease and its improtance to public health.

According to a statement just released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer, there were 1,099 rabic animals discovered by laboratory examination in Texas last year. There were undoubtly many more rabic animals running loose which were never examined. Since most of these animals were dogs, children are especially vulnerable to this dreaded disease.

"All dogs should be vaccinated annually as a rabies control measure," Dr. Cox said. "When a child is bitten by an infected dog, the dog should be penned up for observation for 10 days. If he shows no signs of illness in that time he is not rabid, but if he sickens, he should be killed in such a manmer as not to injure the brain. The brain should be packed immediately in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination. If rabies is shown to be present there is still time to begin anti-rabies treatment on the

Cities and towns should take firm steps to control the presence of dray and ownerless dogs since they remain unvaccinated and are usually the principal source of rab-



Time To Plant Summer Grasses

Now is the time of year to think about planting summer growing grasses. They must be planted early so as to get ahead of spring weeds. Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District will be busy during the next thirty days assisting farmer and rancher cooperators plant such grasses as weeping love grass, sand love grass, buffalo grass, blue grass, side oats grama, and yellow (King Ranch strain) bluestem. The district is trying to build up a seed supply of these beneficial grasses. A list of available grass seed distributors is available at the Soil Conservation office.

Much over seeding of native grass in over-grazed pasture is needed. Most of the pastures in the district have been over-grazed and should be rested this year from May until November. Grazing should be increased in most pastures during last half of March, and all of April to utilize the Rescue grass which is already furnishing grazing. Following that period the cattle should be greatly lessened or removed altogether to allow the better turf grasses to increase and cover the bare

Continuous heavy grazing during the period May to November is helpful to the Mesquite trees and other brush and very harmful to the grass. Soon bare areas appear in the turf and erosion is evident.
