Now On Sale



Tags may go on automobiles during February this year, he stated, whereas they were prohibited before March heretofore. They must, however, be on all vehicles by April 1, 1948.


Numbers for passenger cars run from A J-1050 to A J-3249.

6. More activity among our civic organizations, looking forward to, and planning for, a better Munday in the future.




Blind veterans, who have been issued equipment by Veterans Administration to aid them in overcoming their handicap, may now obtain minor repairs to this equipment without prior VA approval, Dr. Paul B. Magnuson, chief medical director, announced today. Approximately 6,400 blind veterans are eligible for the new service. They are receiving VA prosthetic service cards, similar to those used by amputees to obtain immediate minor repairs to their artificial limbs.

By presenting their cards to any repair shop in any section of the country, blind veterans will receive, without delay, repair service up to a limit of \$20, without VA's prior approval.

able to take a five-weeks' trip to Europe to see if what you've heard is true? Mr. Ernest T. Weir, chairman of the National Steel Corporation of Pittsburgh, did just that. He made informal contacts with people of all sorts. Then he had opportunity to interview outstanding men of finance and industry in each country.

Because of Mr. Weir's nation-ally recognized leadership, and because I consider him a far-seeing and capable observer, I want to give you some of his conclusions.

English businessmen he interviewed think England must work out her own salvation. They said more U.S. dollars poured into England would be harmful. Our \$4 billion loan to them has been wasted, they told him, and has kept England from facing problems squarely. "England's greatest need is for better government, more hard work and greater production '

FRANCE, except. Follow-up ing war-torn areas, The Money! was in about the same physical shape as England. "The most serious condition in France is the black market. in money," he added. The black market offers twice as many francs for a dollar as the government allows officially. "The great problems of France are bad government, encouragement of the people to believe they can live without working, and the conse-quent failure of the people generally to produce."

Mr. Weir thinks the German people must have full liberty in the reconstruction of their country. He branded the Morgenthau plan, as applied in Germany, "one of the great crimes of history." America should stop loaning or giving money without

HOW WOULD YOU like to be | proper planning and full investigation of the use of the money. At the same time, he believes Germany is a safe place to put funds for reconstruction, with proper plans.

and the United States makes communism an unreal danger. He believes the people in these countries will never, for long, permit "the iron heel on their necks." It is his belief that a program financing foreign nations so they will not go commu-nistic is without justification. 'People who will stand for Communism will go in that direction irrespective of what we may do to the contrary."

Europe is loafing on the job of genuine recovery, he believes. "The day they roll up their sleeves and go to work, recovery will begin." Visitors find the English and French, supposedly starving, working only 40 hours a week. Mr. Weir asks: "Why don't they adopt a six-day week. which would greatly increase the production of all materials?" There are enough resources and manpower. "Given the right kind of leadership and adequate incentives . . . the peoples of Europe would work harder and more productively."

Mr. Weir's phrases "right kind of leadership" and "adequate incentives" suggest the key to this entire puzzle of European difficultics. Take away the profit motive and people lack incentive to work. Then add tax oppression and all the decay of leadership that Europe has had to put up with. The result is unrest and economic chaos. Grabbing the nearest "ism" will not bring prosperity, nor freedom of any kind, for anyone. That is the way to shackles that bind men: hands. feet, and ideals.

Pointers Given **On Taking Care Of Baby Chicks**

This year, more than ever before, we want our money invested in baby chicks to pay off. This means we must put out special effort to have healthy chicks. Miss Eugenia Butler, Knox County Home Demonstration Agent, has the following suggestions to be passed on from Ted Martin, Extension Service poultry husbandman, of Teaxs A. and M. College.

You've sent your order in for those baby chicks, so now's the time to get the brooder house ready for them.


He says the number one job is to clean the brooder house throughly, and that means scrub and disinfect the house and equipment. If the brooder house is movable, skid it at least 20 yards to cleaner grounds.

. The number two job is to close up the cracks in the walls and floors that might cause a draft. Then two days before the chicks arrive, begin the brooder operating to see if the temperature holds. Then, just before you put the chicks inside, put litter, feed hoppers and water fountains inside the wire guard in the house and put out the chick starter. The chicks will be hungry after their long ride and will want feed as soon as they arrive.
