Reports have been made to the. effect that firemen have had to wait, on occasions, for cars to be moved away from fire plugs before connections could be made. And the matter of a few short minutes mean a lot, when it comes to keeping fire damages to a minimum.

Since the purchase of our new Mack fire truck, we have two trucks that go out every time a fire alarm is sounded. The second one gets there in time to help, provided the sightseers don't block its progress.

Mack generally heads for the City. fire as soon as he gets a driver and one extra man. Mack goes first, because with his big booster tank be can handle lots of fires without the necessity of making connections with fire plugs.

Yes, Mack, heads directly for the fire. Then the American-La-France brings up the rear. It usually circles the square, one direction or the other depending on ter. where the fire is, and stops to pick up firemen on the way.

So, when we tear out licketysplit after Mack, we're ahead of and in the way of the other fire truck, and that's bad!

Hose are so racked on the trucks that they (the trucks) must go directly to the scene of the fire; City. then as they are driven to the nearest fire plug for connections, the hose is being strung, too, so as soon as connections are made the water's ready to squirt.



GIVE CHILDREN COLORFUL TOYS Brake Lining




A "Must" for the tiny tots' entertainment is an attractively designed orightly colored rubber ball, says child psychologists. The ball should have colors that catch the eye and color-patterns that will hold, rather than distract, the attention of the child.

Mothers agree that the child psychologists know what they are talking about.



Simple Range Shelter

MORE and more poultrymen are discovering the importance of range shelters in rearing strong, healthy pullets. Such shelters enable flocks to range on clean ground, and protect them from the crowding and overheating to which they often are subjected if kept in colony houses throughout the summer. As a result flocks develop more evenly, with fewer culls.

There are other advantages, too. Many farmers find range shelters useful for housing an early brood of pullets while a second brood occupies the colony house. In some areas shelters are even utilized for late season brooding. This saves the cost of conventional brooder



At little expense you can build a serviceable shelter that will last many years. The type illustrated above, on a scale of 10 x 10 ft., will house about 125 pullets. Structurally, it consists merely of simple framing and a pitch roof. Practically the only other requirements are roosts and some welded mesh wiring for the floor.

The wood framing should be painted, but the roof can be made of asbestos cement board, which requires no preservative treatment. Five sheets of 4 x 8 asbestos board will suffice, with one piece cut in half to form the middle section of each side. If a solid floor is desired, it also may be built of asbestos





> Hold THIS SYSTEM would bog Fast! down under heavy-handed stateism. Let the government step in to manage, and you have a dozen ways the system can go haywire. Demand no longer be-comes the basis for production. Profit is penalized, and nobody gets the benefits of enterprise. People lose initiative and inventiveness, and everybody suffers. This has been America's experience, wherever she has tried "stateism."

Notwithstanding large funds spent by the Russian state on putting electric vacuum cleaners and refrigerators into production, it is reported from Russia that these things are not being produced anywhere. One factory made 300 manually operated washing machines. They sold quickly, but no more were made despite heavy demand. The report said a good potato-peeling machine exists and demand is heavy, but it is not in production.

These are nothing more than the fruits of mismanagement that takes place when government starts tinkering with a nation's economies. The British press reports that one of its state-owned airlines will lose seven million pounds in its first year of government operation; another has already reported a loss of thirty pounds for every passenger it carried. 
