Veterans' News

More than 52,000 veterans in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi were admitted to Veterans Administration hospitals during the past year, VA's Dallas Branch Office reported this week.

The report showed that 143,000 treatments and 242,000 examinations

of veterans in the tri-state area were given by VA in out-patient clinics during the same period.

VA offices in the three states dispatched 11,000,000 pieces of mail and conducted 1,700,000 personal interviews with veterans during 1947.

Direct payments to veterans in the Dallas Branch Area during the year amounted to more than \$425,000,000. This included disability compensation, death claims, insurance settlements, and tuition and subsistence to veterans in schools or training.

At the end of the year, VA was paying disability compensation to 181,000 veterans in the three states.

More than 43,000 loans on homes, farms or businesses were guaranteed by VA during 1947, bringing the cumulative total for the three states to 75,200 loans with \$227,400,000 guaranteed by the government.

Veterans in training in the three-state area at year's end totaled almost 254,000. The number in school or institutional work increased 63 percent compared to a 15 percent decrease in the number of veterans training on-the-job.

Around 75,000 veterans reinstated lapsed National Service Life Insurance amounting to \$510,000,000 during the year.

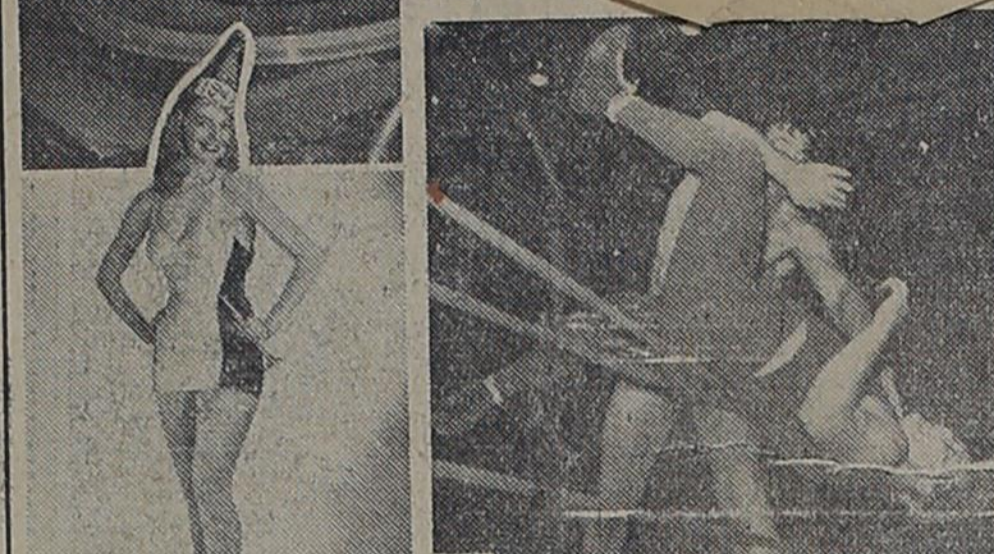
Postal laws and regulations pertaining to delivery of checks for benefits administered by VA have been modified for the convenience of veterans and beneficiaries.

city or rural mail carriers. Checks received are mainly for disabled veterans and for subsistence allowance of veterans in school.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What is vocational advisement all about and why is it required under Public Law 16?

A. The main purpose of vocational advisement is to determine whether a disabled veteran should train for a profession, or for a particular trade or occupation based on his previous education, experience, personal desires and present ability. The veteran is interviewed by highly trained specialists who will consider his desires, but are required to advise him against starting a course for which his aptitudes or physical limitations do not insure reasonable likelihood of success. In short, this advisement is mandatory under the program to insure the disabled veteran's proper rehabilitation.

Q. Under Public Law 16, must I go to a vocational school or may I go to a liberal arts college, a high school, or similar institution?

A. You may enroll in any VA-approved educational institution or training establishment offering the course of training which VA has found you need to insure your proper rehabilitation in line with your own desires.

Q. Will my disability compensation be reduced if I go into training under Public Law 16 or under the G-I Bill?

A. No.

Q. I am receiving compensation for injuries received during World War II and would like to know if my compensation check is subject to seizure by creditors or for
