



Protect Feed From Rats

WITH high grain prices narrowing the margin of profit for millions of farmers, all possible measures should be taken to reduce cost of production. One way in which farmers can cut needless exof grain caused by rats.

A vigorous rat extermination program, of course, is essential for best results. Other steps also should be taken, however, to protect stored grain from rodents.

For storage of small amounts of grain which the farmer wishes to keep handy, galvanized steel con-



tainers are highly recommended. get rid of your garbage. Grain stored in such containers is fully protected. Rats cannot gnaw through galvanized steel; and the tight-fitting lid defies the most de-

A further measure of effective rat control is the use of similar containers as receptacles for kitchen food scraps. Exposed refuse is sustenance. Galvanized steel containers may be obtained at most hardware stores.

Primary feed storages should be constructed of rat-proof building materials. Such products as asbestos cement board, when used as an free, either! interior lining for walls and floors, provide an effective barrier which rats cannot penetrate.



Oven-baked desserts can be cooked along with the roast to save time and fuel. Banana-Coffee Souffle, one of these, is nourishing and flavorful. Melt 2 tbsp. butter in a saucepan. Remove from heat and stir in 3 thsp. flour. Gradually add 1/4 cup strong coffee, 34 cup milk and cook over low simmer flame stirring constantly until nicely smooth and thick. Combine 1/4 cup sugar, 4 egg yolks, gradually stirring these into cooked mixture. Add 3 mashed medium-sized bananas, Beat 4 egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into banana mixture. Pour into 11/2 qt. soufflé dish which has been buttered on bottom only. Bake in slow gas oven (325°) 40 to 45 mins.

The most reliable buyer's guide to gas appliances for the home is the Seal of Approval of the American Gas Association Testing Laboratories. For example, nearly 600 tests and requirements must be met on a gas range before it can be produced and sold to the homemaker.

If your biscuits burn on the bottom and still remain rather pale on top, your baking sheet may be too large which tends to hold the heat from the burner to the bottom instead of radiating around the oven evenly. There should be at least one inch of space between the baking sheets and all four sides of the oven.

Hot butter and syrup makes a richer-tasting spread for waffles. Add 2 tbsp. butter to 1 cup extrasweet corn syrup, heat until butter is melted, then serve hot.



Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin-"Few, if any, people have escaped the inconvenience and the annoyance of athlete's foot. It is said to be the third most common skin disease of the summer, and, contrary to popular opinion, the fifth most prevalent disorder in the winter."

So says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in a recent press release. Dr. Cox explains that athlete's foot is due to a small, mold-like growth or fungus which thrives on moist, warm parts of the body such as the feet.

"The infection of athlete's foot s usually gotten directly or indirectly from someone else," Dr. Cox says, cautioning that the most likely places to contact the infection are around bath houses, locker rooms, and other public places where people go barefoot. "It is probable that at least onehalf of all adults suffer from the

infection at some time." In suggesting some effective measures to be taken to prevent initial cases and avoid recurrent attacks of the disease, Dr. Cox emphasized drying carefully beween the toes; use of a mild ai-
