It's soon to become a reality here in Munday-those street markers and house numbers that have been needed for many years. Work of the City Council and


Munday Jaycees are making this possible. The Jaycees have inaugurated a campaign to place street markers and house numbers for all of Munday. The markers will be here

around June 1, it was stated, and the house numbers will arrive in about ten days.


Under the Jaycee plan, the house numbers will be purchased by residents at a cost of \$1.50 per residence. This is expected to raise the amount needed for installing Munday's markers and numbers.

The new street markers, a sample of which is in the show window at Baker-McCarty's, are of cast aluminum . . . sturdy, rust proof. and permanent. They are deep block, raised letters, with names appearing on both sides. Names will be in aluminum-colored letters, on a background of black, so they can be easily distinguished.

They will be mounted on permanent posts, possibly of the angle-iron variety. They are built. to mount atop, one of the other, so each street name can be seen. at intersections.

Munday citizens will be proud of this improvement, and many are anxiously awaiting the time when the project will be completed.



Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employes reject recommendations of President's Emergency board-refuse to negotiate except on their own terms-threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

THE LEADERS of three railroad unions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employees, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation.

These leaders refuse to accept a 151/2 cents an hour wage increase retroactive to Novem-ber 1, 1947. This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman.

This increase of 151/2 cents already has been accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 90% of all railroad employes have accepted. They have called a strike to get more!

Unions refuse rules discussion

Certain rules changes demanded by these union leaders-which would increase wages after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in the case. The railroads have accepted these recommendations.

Who's to blame?

Although they deplored so large an extra cost burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the pub-lic interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.

In contrast, this small group of railroad union leaders are attempting to flout the intent and spirit of the Railway Labor Act, and dictate their own terms.

How long will the American public stand for the undemocratic, arbitrary, and abusive use of the right to strike and the disregard of the obligation to provide transportation? 

A cant strip is placed along the bottom of the sidewall before the first course of siding is applied. The first course is begun with a full siding unit, and halfunits and full units are alternated in starting succeeding courses. Backer strips, furnished with the siding, are centered back of each vertical joint. Where application is to be made over existing wood shingles or clap-board, loose or curled siding should be firmly nailed, decayed siding replaced and horizontal filler strips nailed against the butt edges of existing siding or shingles. Work then proceeds in the same manner as over new sheathing.


Winter legumes such as austrain winter peas and hairy vetch are making some progress in Knox County according to records of assistance furnished farmers by and other relatives here the first the Agricultural Conservation Program.

Messrs. Davis P. Jones, Claude E. Reid, C. C. Browning and others have reported good results from seeding austrain winter peas and hairy vetch. Mr. L. F. Glenn has a good crop of volunteer vetch that he is very proud of.

In the fall of 1944 only 700 lbs. of these winter legumes were seeded but in the fall of 1945 THE modern trend in farm build- Knox County farmers seeded 50,ing construction calls for the 237 pounds and then in 1946 they use of materials that are fire-safe, seeded 75,030 pounds. Even with durable and economical in upkeep. the weather conditions not favorable for the seeding of these legumes last fall there were 27,790 pounds seeded.

Average yields of austrain winter peas or hairy vetch, planted in of asbestos fibers and portland ce- the fall and turned under in the spring will add to the soil nitrogen equivalent to 200 to 400 pounds of nitrate of soda and organic matter equivalent to four to eight tons of manure. Upon decay the crop will also return the phosphoric acid and potash taken from the soil in its period of growth, which amounts to the equivalent of 75 to 100 pounds of acid phosphate and 50 to 100 pounds of muriate of potash. Winter legumes keep the lands covered and protects the soil from erosion and leaching during winter months.

Why not start planning now for an early seeding date of either austrain winter peas or hairy vetch with an application of 200 or 300 pounds of 20% phosphate per acre. This can be done with as-

Mr. J. H. Bardwell, Munday, sub-district director of Young Adult work, conducted a business meeting, at which time tentative plans were made for a meeting early in September.




Mr. Bradberry passed away at the Knox county hospital on Wednesday, Alpril 28, after an extended illness.



Sturdiness of construction is a feature of this trough. Note the wide end pieces which give plenty, of support to prevent tipping. The center rail and uprights help keep the hogs out of the trough. When used for young pigs, a 1 x 4-inch board can be placed between the uprights just above the trough. Wide and shallow, a trough of this design is more sanitary than one which is square or V-shaped. Hogs that have ready access to clean, fresh water and liberal amounts of proper feed will make the most rapid gains. Self-feeders, which also save labor, usually are recommended. The diet should inelude ample protein, vitamins and minerals. These not only are essential to good growth, but effect considerable savings in grain.

The weed killer 2,4-D will also sury that action to stop payment kill your tomatoes, cucumbers, cotton, sweet potatoes, peas, beans, fruit trees, ornamentals, and some field crops if you're not careful in using it.

Last year cotton in several points along the Gulf Coast was injured when 2,4-D dust drifted in from nearby rice fields. In many cases, cotton has been planted right along side rice.
