Sunday Evening Shooting Results In Four Arrests

Gary and Otis Dixon, both of Goree, were arrested Sunday evening and charged with attempted murder and attempted capital murder of a police officer. The arrests came after a suspensful altercation at the Elementary School playground at approximately 7:00 p.m.

A group of youngsters were playing basketball in the schoolyard when the Dixon brothers and an unidentified black male arrived on the scene. The Dixons confronted Bobby Dockins concerning a previous misunderstanding. When Otis produced a gun and threatened Dockins everyone fled the scene with the exception of one individual. This young man went to the tennis courts adjoinng-the basketball court to warn a nother and daughter who were playing tennis that the Dixons had 1 gun. The mother, however, had seen the gun. With no way out except directly in front of the Dixons, she and her daughter had advanced to the far side of the ennis courts and laid down. The young man who had atempted to warn them then turned and saw that Gary Dixon had taken the gun from Otis and aimed it at Dockins' head. At that point, the young man turned and ran. Upon seeing him run, Gary raised the gun and shot, narrowly missing the young man's head. The shot hit the side of the school building causing debris to strike the young man in the face.

wards him. One of the men, Otis Dixon, complied. The other, Gary Dixon, raised only one hand. Andrade then repeated his order, at which point Gary drew the gun from his pocket and aimed it at. the officer. Andrade drew his gun, aiming it at Gary, who then dropped his weapon and raised his hands.

The Dixon brothers were arrested and charged with attempted murder and attempted capital murder of a police officer. Federal charges will also be filed against them for taking and discharging a gun on school property. This offense carries a mandatory sentence of five years with no parole.

Two other individuals were arrested in connection with the incident, but no charges have yet been filed against them.

Suspecting that they might be involved in the incident, he followed them to the 400 block of Cisco. 

Final Certification Date for Wheat

May 15 is the final date to certify wheat and other small grains, including ACR and CUPAY acres with a small grain cover. If you are a wheat only farm and participating in the program, you must also cerify your ACR (set-aside) and, if applicable, CU for PAY acres by May 15, regardless of the cover. ACR and CUPAY acres without a small grain cover do not have to be certified until July 15 if you are participating in the cotton and/or feed grain programs. Certification is by Appointment Only - Phone 817-658-3537.

Wheat Cover on ACR (setaside) and CUPAY Acres

If you have wheat, oats or any other small grain planted on your ACR (set-aside) and /or CUPAY acres you must have the cover destroyed (to the point that it will not make grain) before it reaches the hard dough stage. Acceptable methods of destruction include baling, grazing, plowing and shredding. If you wish to leave the cover standing, you can file a request and pay a nominal fee prior to the certification date.

Sign-up Date Extended 1992 cotton, wheat and feed grain program sigh-up date has been extended until May 1. If you did not sign up by April 17 and now wish to do so, phone 817-658-3537 for an appointment.






MHS graduate Kathy Wilde is making a name for herself in college track and field events at Angelo State University in San Angelo.







What Immigrants Need To **Know About Social Security**

By Patty Brandt, SS Representative

Many immigrants living and working in the United States know little about Social Security. They may wonder if the taxes they are paying will provide anything for them and their families. The answer is yes!

Social Security eligibility rules are the same for citizens and noncitizens. In addition to earning credits toward retirement benefits, immigrants who work in jobs where they pay Social Security

taxes are eligible for disability benefits, and their families may be entitled to survivor benefits when they die.

Some immigrants may plan to return to their homeland one day. Those who become U.S. citizens may have their Social Security benefits sent to most foreign countries.

Those who are not U.S. citizens can receive benefits outside the United States, but only in certain

circumstances.

The Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program is another federal program managed by the Social Security Administration. SSI pays monthly cash benefits to people age 65 or older and to people with disabilities. To qualify for SSI, a person must have limited income and resources. Immigrants may be eligible for SSI if they have been lawfully admitted for permanent residence, or if the Immigration and Naturalization Service is permitting them to remain in the United States indefinitely. Special provisions apply for sponsored aliens and for immigrants who are granted asylum or who are refugees.

Anyone working in the U.S. needs to have a Social Security number. When an immigrant applies for a number, he or she needs to show a birth certificate or passport and Immigration and Naturalization Service documents, such as a "green card". The Internal Revenue Service requires that tax returns include a Social Security number for all dependents age one year or older. Anyone who wants more infor-
