Ever try to work a balky horse? It's the best way in the world to put in some hard work and not get anything done.

Usually the horse hooks up so nicely. He'll go right along with the other horse, as long as he isn't hooked up to anything. He'll step right over the wagon tongue like a veteran, back up nicely so you can hitch the traces.

But when you get everything all set, gather up the lines and say "giddap", then all thunderation breaks loose.

Which brings to mind the fact that some Munday people are playing the balky horse.

When the clean-up movement was started, and a systematic method of garbage collecting and disposing was proposed, everyone seemed to work like veterans.

But when we "got the wagon hooked up" there was some kicking over the traces. Some seemed to entertain the idea that garbage ought to be picked up, no matter where it was located.

Pleas were put out, by press and by word of mouth, to cooperate with the garbage disposal plan—to place the garbage cans, containers for tin cans, etc., where they could be easily reached by the truck.

An appeal was made to keep things separated. Wet garbage separate from burnable trash, tin cans in separate container, etc., and help keep things from getting all messy again.

We were asked to separate cans from trash before it was burned. Some did, some didn't.

Some of us went ahead and burned things as usual. The garbage collector emptied trash burners several times. Some of them contained fire. He set his truck afire some four or five times.

Yep, there's been quite a few "balky horses" since our garbage plan was initiated. And in almost every instance, this proves a hindrance to the plan.

One reason you can't do any work with a balky horse is because he doesn't cooperate with the other horse. It takes cooperation to make the old mare go—this statement we've heard many times.

Cooperation between neighbors and with the garbage collector will keep our old "garbage mare" going, too.

Two neighbors live just across the fence from each other. Maybe one has his garbage can on one corner, the other on the far corner. There's a distance of nearly a block between them.

Now, these neighbors could place their garbage cans just across the fence from each other—and the collector could pick them up with one stop. That would be cooperation.

The garbage collector sees things that are not just exactly fixed right. He passes them up.

He could pick up that garbage once. Then when he gets an opportunity kindly ask that family to arrange the garbage as it should be. That would be cooperation.

Many take the attitude that they're paying for the service—and their tin cans, trash, garbage, etc., should be picked up, no matter where it is, or how inconvenient it is to reach.

That's being the "balky horse" again. The time put in at hauling the garbage away, the expense attached to the job, can be lessened, or magnified, according to our own viewpoints.

Munday has never had a garbage disposal plan before, to our knowledge. The plan we now have may have its faults, its defects, its shortcomings.

But we don't remedy those (Continued on Last Page)

WE CAN WIN

They are making available a wealth of material which shows the causes of fire, the principal hazards, and proven means of protection. But all this essential work will be done in vain unless a wide degree of public interest and cooperation are obtained.

There is nothing impersonal about fire prevention. It has only one purpose—to make your home, your property, and your person safe from one of the cruellest killers and destroyers. Its sole aim is to save the \$700,000,000 worth of property and the more than 10,000 lives that fire now consumes each year. Its goal, therefore, is to make this a safer, happier and richer country.

Organized fire prevention work is being brought to a peak of activity in 1949, and it will reach its peak during Fire Prevention Week next October. The leaders and experts are showing the way. It is up to the rest of us—the millions who are never safe from the threat of fire, whether we realize it or not—to make this great work bear its full fruit.

ONE FLAG IN A TROUBLED WORLD

Even in these days of strife and tumult there flies one flag that is the same world over. It is the flag of an army militantly fighting for peace in 97 countries.

The blue, red and yellow banner of The Salvation Army will be 70 years old September 26, and it is most fitting that we pay tribute to this ensign of an international army whose motto is "Marching forward to a better world with heart to God and hand to man."

This tri-color is the flag of love, hope and mercy for men of all races, creeds and colors, and during its seventy years it has gained the bloodless victory of truth and mercy—the victory that men and women who believe and who are willing to abandon their own devices for the plan of God can find peace in our world.

In the early days this flag was attacked, insulted and ridiculed, but the more it suffered, the greater its spiritual strength, until the ridicule turned to respect and the insults became tributes to the devotion and self-sacrifice of the men and

SORRY EXAMPLE

The American people would do well to keep an eye on England's "free" health service which staggered into operation last July. It is the kind of thing that proposals such as the long-pending Wagner-Murray-Dingell bill would fasten on this country.

Instead of being "free", the plan will cost the English taxpayers some \$600,000,000 a year in the beginning—a very large sum for a country of her population and economic position—and the cost will increase heavily in the future. Workers and employers will also kick in for a period of time. The benefits paid are determined by a mass of confusing regulations, and will run to only about \$5.20 a week for the sick worker. Most important of all, there is a definite insufficiency of doctors to carry out all the provisions of the scheme.

The doctor's position is exceptionally interesting. Most of them are refusing to participate, on the grounds that professional standards make it impossible for them to become civil servants. They have asked the government to definitely guarantee that professional freedom will be protected. But that guarantee has not been given.

So it goes in the Socialist Utopia, where everybody is supposed to be protected against everything, and everybody certainly has less and less freedom of choice. Compulsory medical insurance is just the step which precedes socialized medicine—which, in turn, is one more of the steps leading to the all-powerful state. We can profit by Britain's sorry experiments.

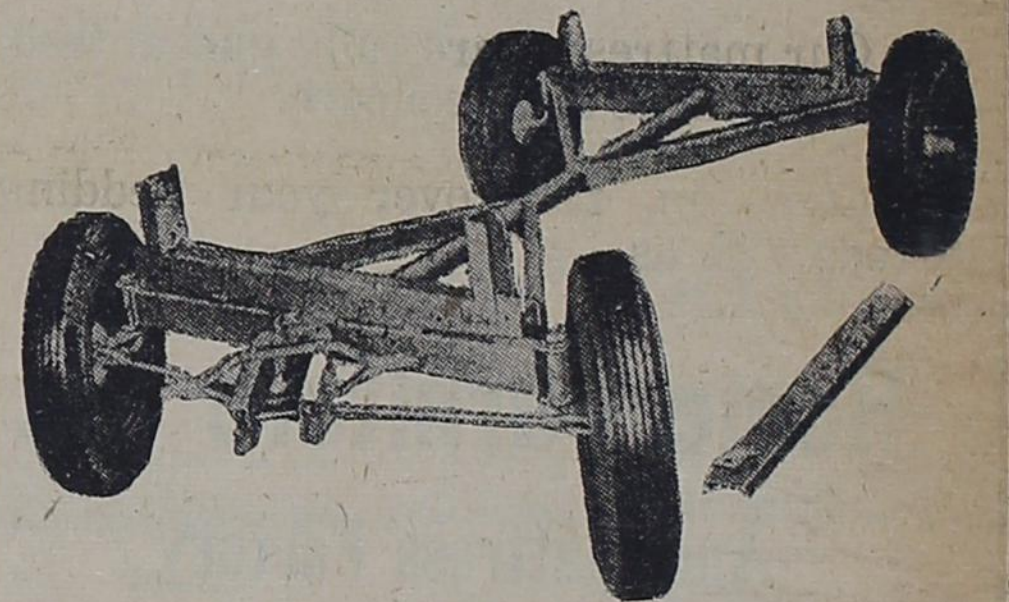

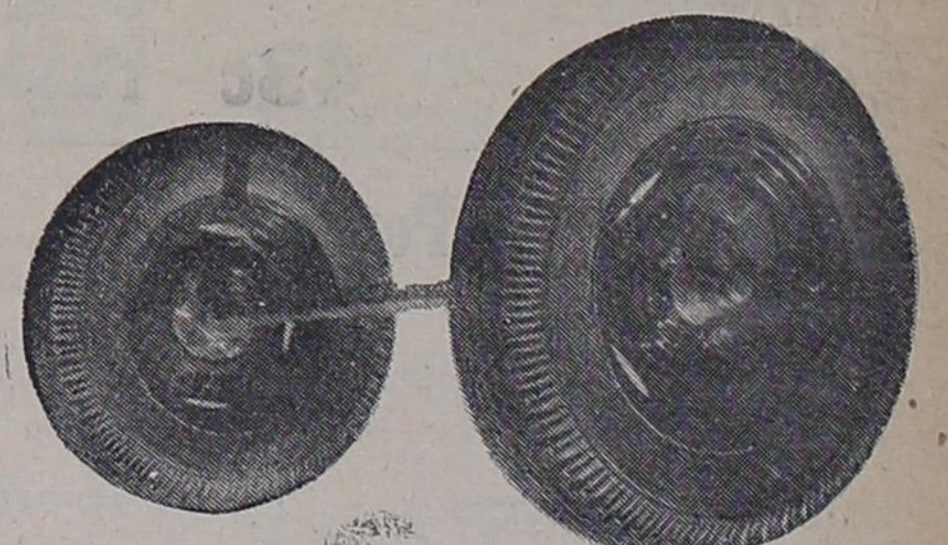

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN—Comparing morbidity reports from ten Texas Counties where there are no full-time local health units, with those from ten other Counties where these units afford efficient health protection, reveals a startling difference in the incidence of communicable diseases, according to a survey released by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Using as a basis of comparison the common childhood disease of whooping cough, Dr. Cox said that this survey showed that the Counties where local health units availed themselves of biologics from the State Health Department were able to hold this communicable disease to a desirable minimum.

"For instance", Dr. Cox said, "take these figures for comparison. In these Counties where there are no health units and therefore where no biologics from the State Health Department were used, the following rates of incidence apply, per 100,000 population: Gaines and Floyd, above 1000; Hale, Dallam, Castro and Cottle above 300; Carson above 400; Bailey and Hartley above 600; and Lipscomb above 750 cases."

By way of contrast to those high rates of incidence, Dr. Cox pointed out that in a representative group of Counties where full-time health units made use of the biologics available from the State Health Department, the following much lower rates

prevailed: Bell, Wichita, Bastrop and Hidalgo, less than 300; Travis less than 200; Smith and El Paso less than 150; Bexar, Dallas and Tarrant less than 100 cases per 100,000 population.

"It is plain to be seen" Dr. Cox said, "that the counties receiving the benefit of a full-time health protection, enjoy a much lower incidence of disease and the resulting lessened danger of death. Public health protection can be had for every citizen of Texas, but only when sufficient funds are appropriated to make possible a full-time local health unit in every one of our 254 Counties", Dr. Cox declared.

Four Texas congressmen flew to Europe this week, leaving Washington last Monday, for a five-weeks eye-witness inspection of the trouble-torn continent.

Making the trip are Representatives J. Frank Wilson of Dallas, Wingate Lucas of Grapevine, Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls and Omar Burleson of Anson. With them is Representative Laurie Battle of Alabama.

The group hopes to visit every European country outside the iron curtain. They plan to spend several days in Berlin, center of the east-west conflict.

First stop of their schedule will be Caux, Switzerland, where the Moral Rearmament Conference is underway. Gossett and Lucas are particularly anxious to visit displaced persons camps. Gossett has been one of the most outspoken members of congress in opposition to the admission of

additional displaced persons into the United States above immigration quotas.

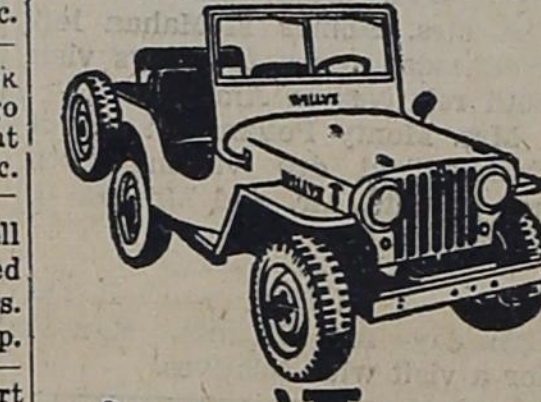

FARM NEWS

PROGRAM
from the County Agricultural Conservation Committee

PRICE SUPPORT AND CONSERVATION
Consumers as well as farmers benefit from the price support and soil and water conservation programs administered by farmer-elected committeemen in every agricultural county in the United States.

William B. Crawley, Assistant Administrator for Production and Acting Director of the Agricultural Conservation Programs Branch of the Production and Marketing Administration, backed up this assertion by showing how both consumer and farmer gain from those programs. Speaking to farmers, farm leaders and committeemen from Mis-

souri, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, and Minnesota in a conference at St. Paul, Minnesota, August 31, he said there is a mistaken idea that price supports are responsible for high prices. He pointed out that parity—the base for determining price supports—is tied to the prices of things the farmers as well as other consumers have to buy. When the prices of these things go up the parity level goes up with them but not ahead of them. Price supports for most supported commodities in 90 percent of parity, which is 10 percent below an even break. A number of commodities produced on the farm are not supported. Beef is one.

Lamb is another. Then the prices of many commodities are above support levels and therefore are not effected. The commodities supported are among the better buys at the grocery store. He called attention also to the spread between what the farmer gets and what the consumer has to pay and said that in many instances if the farmer got nothing the consumer still would have to pay a fairly high price.

On the other hand, with farmers protected from price collapse they have not been afraid to produce abundantly. Consumers have gained from this abundance. Abundant production has prevented prices of farm products from going even higher. Consumers have gained through the Agricultural Conservation Program which has been in operation for the past 12 years in that the conservation practices carried out by farmers cooperating in the program have helped to make possible the large harvest this year and for the past several years. The conservation practices which farmers are carrying out on farms which comprise two-thirds of the Nation's farmland are the greatest assurance consumers can have that we can continue to fill the grocery shelves, he said.

Prices Farmers Pay
Rural living costs have continued to advance to the fifth consecutive month, and reached a new high in mid-August this year. Increases in automobile and all automotive farm equipment advanced about 4 percent since July 15. Household supplies, furniture, building materials, coal, tires, and other items advanced sharply. Mid-August prices paid by farmers for all commodities averaged 275 percent of the 1910-14 period, over 7 percent more than a year ago. Building materials now cost farmers 11 percent more than a year ago.

Prices And Price Supports
Numerous statements implying that Government price supports for farm products are responsible for higher consumer prices. Here are a few facts which seem to have been overlooked.

1. Present laws assure farmers a price support for several of the major crops which is equal to 90 percent of "parity". "Parity" in everyday language means a fair price to farmers for the crops they sell in relation to the cost of things they buy. "90 percent of

Varied entertainment features have been added this year, and one of Texas' finest carnival attractions will be on the Midway.

An added feature this year is the Special Cowboy Events, under the direction of Buster Shelton, local cattleman. These events include Junior Cowboy and Cowgirl Riding Contests, Senior Cutting Horse Contests, Senior Reining Contests, and a Senior Jackpot Roping Contest. Several hundred dollars are being offered in prizes, and wide-spread interest is being attracted.

Special emphasis is being placed on the Horse Show. A. W. Weaver is chairman of this division, and entries to date have exceeded the past several years.

An automobile and implement display show is to be held for the first time this year, and the latest models in these lines will be on display.

No. 1 potatoes in Texas is \$2.35 per 100 pounds and the retail is around \$6.00. For U. S. No. 2 potatoes the support price is \$1.17 and the retail price is around \$5.00.

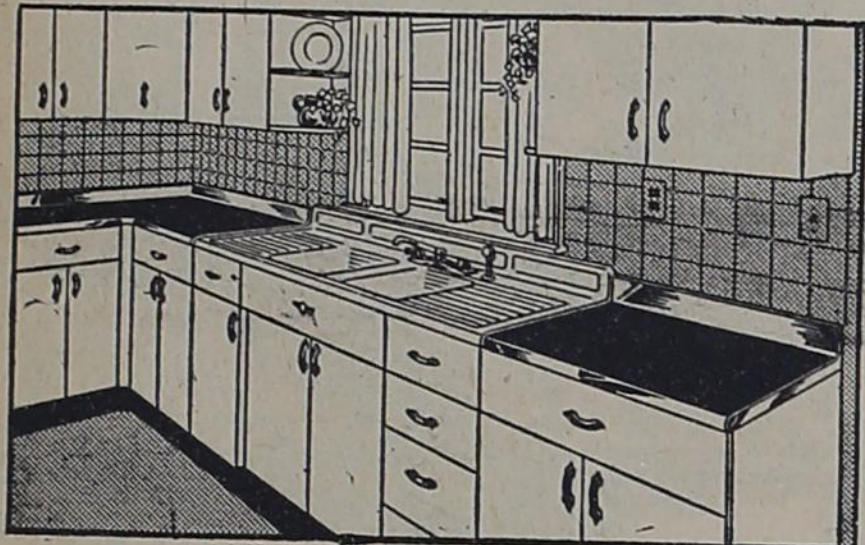

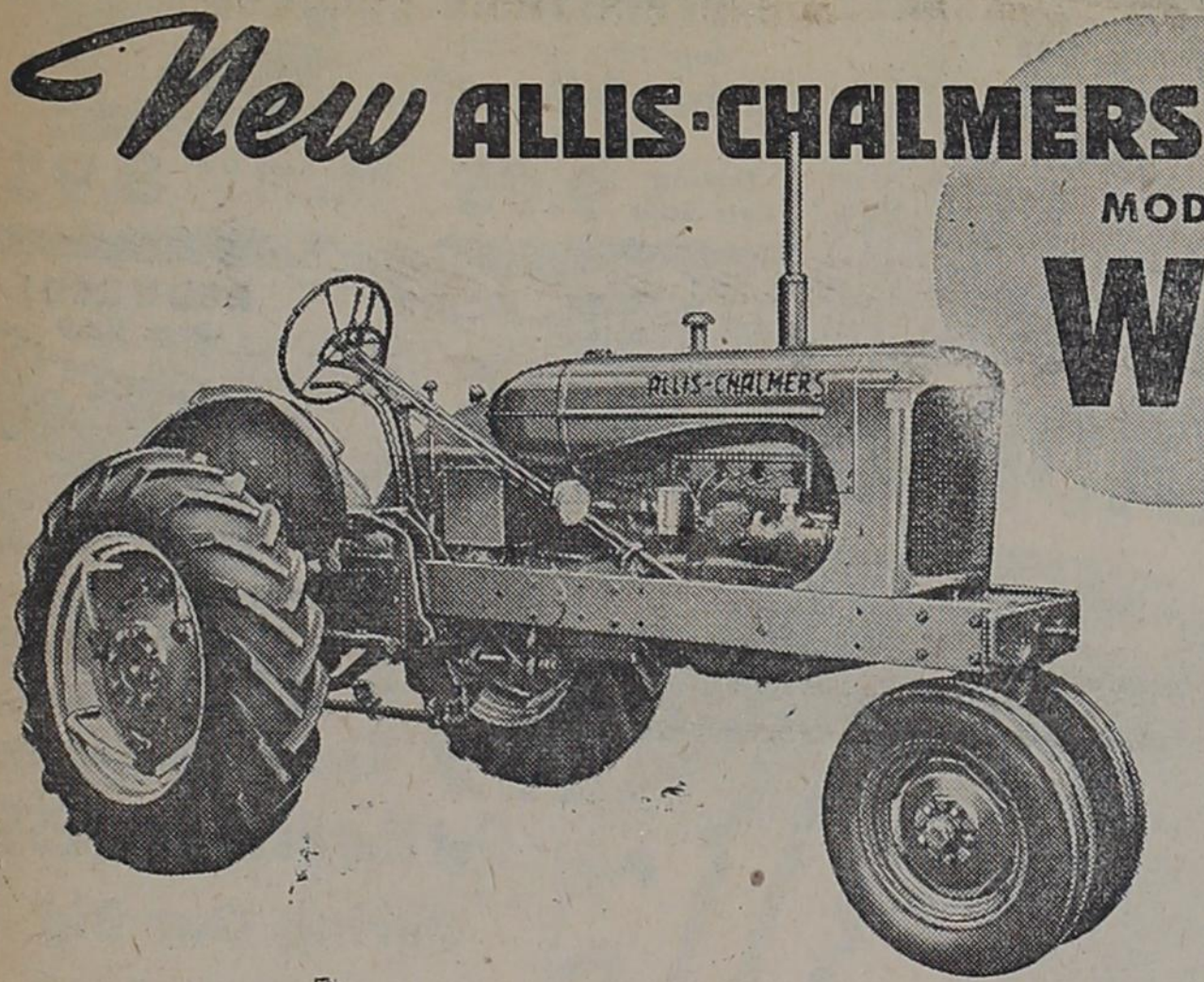

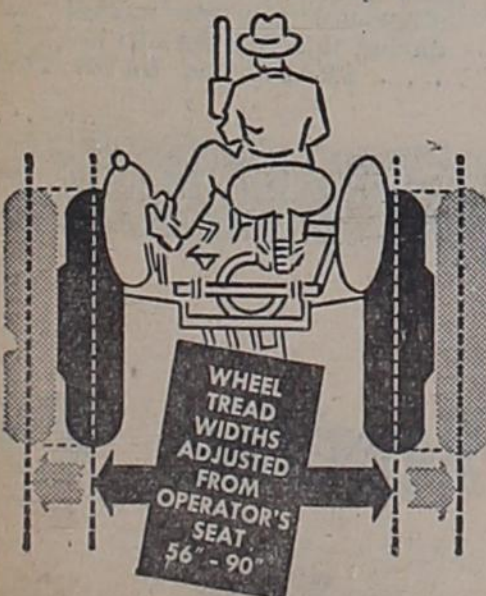

Planting Time For Cover Crops

Now is the time for planting winter cover crops. Farmers who are going to plant winter legumes such as hairy vetch and Austrian winter peas should start as soon as possible toward getting these legumes planted. Seed preparation is not much of a problem. Some farmers are planting now in middles of maize and cotton, where the cotton has not made too large of a growth. It is important, if phosphate becomes available, to put phosphate under the legumes at planting time.

The seed crop was short last year and seed are scarce, but some seed are still available at different locations.

The Supervisors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District are making the fertilizer drill available to all cooperators possible at a nominal fee to help speed up the planting of the badly needed soil conservation crops. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service will also help as much as possible in getting the cover crops planted.

Veterans' News

Thousands of veterans who contracted malaria overseas during World War II have been cured, the Veterans Administration reports.

Within the next few years, the problem of relapse from war-acquired malaria will be an insignificant one, VA added.

The rate of cures is indicated by VA statistics. During June, 1947, approximately 130,000 veterans receiving compensation for malaria incurred in service. Nine months later, in March, 1948, this number had dropped to 32,000. It is still declining.

The number of relapses also has declined—from approximately 500,000 cases infected during the war to less than 10,000 at present.

The parasite eventually "burns itself out" in human bodies in from one to three years, although some cases are known to have remained infected for as long as 20 years.

Use of the drugs chloroquine, pamaquine (plasmochin), and the more recently synthesized 8-amino quinolines, such as pentaquine and isopentaquine, have given splendid results, VA said.

Nearly 5,000,000 veteran-holders of National Service Life Insurance have not yet converted their term policies to permanent forms of insurance.

The term policies in force represent more than \$31 billion.

More than half of the veterans holding converted NSLI policies have selected 20-payment life plans. These number 832,190, or 55 percent of the 1,512,150 permanent NSLI policies in force on June 30.

Permanent NSLI policies amounted to more than \$6.50 billion worth of insurance.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. Does a veteran who has become eligible for a loan guaranty through separation from service, lose his eligibility by return to active duty in the armed forces?

A. If he has become eligible once, he remains eligible, provided he can meet the other requirements of the Servicemen's Read-

justment Act and regulations in regard to the guaranty.

Q. Is a veteran entitled to a loan guaranty while he is receiving compensation or while he is going to school under the GI Bill?

A. Yes.
Q. I signed a statement before my discharge that I had a disability before I enlisted in the armed forces. Will this statement bar me from receiving compensation?

A. No. Under the law any statement of this nature which you may have made at discharge is considered null and void.

Q. Under what circumstances are parents considered dependents?

A. Parents are considered dependents if they do not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for themselves and members of their family under legal age and members of the family dependent by reason of mental or physical incapacity.

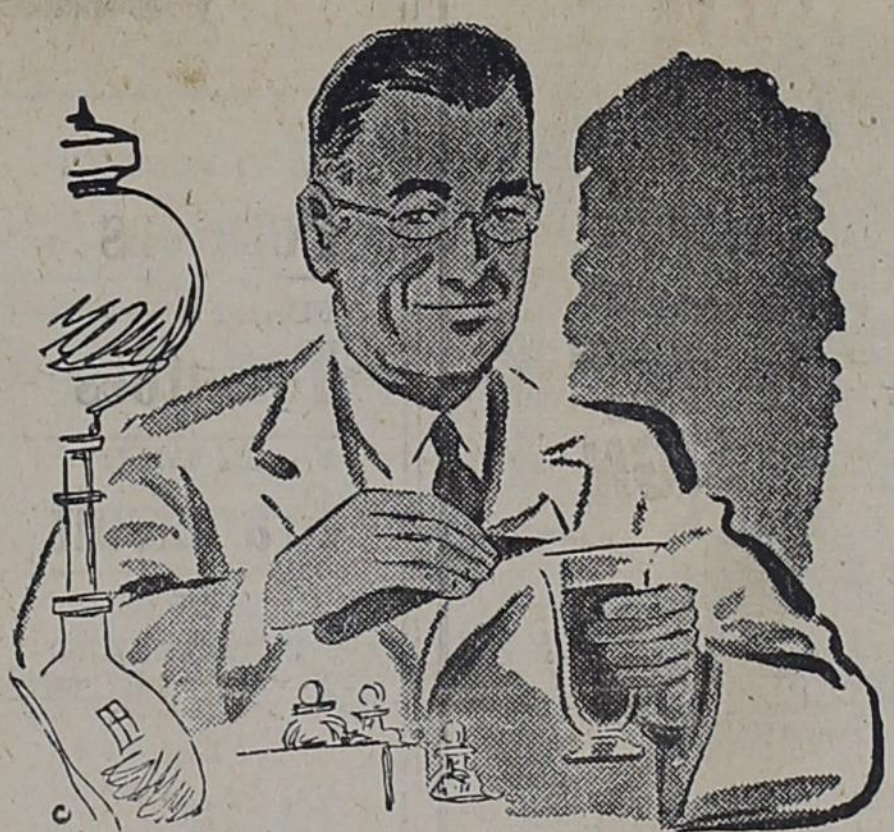

Uncle Sam's Selective Service

1. Q—Will there be a lottery—or national drawing—as there was in 1940—to determine who will be classified and inducted into service first?

A—No.
2. Q—If there is to be no national drawing, just in what order will the registrants be considered for classification and induction.

A—The oldest men—that is, those in the 25-year age group—will be considered first.

3. Q—Will each local registrant receive a definite number that will identify him?

A—Yes. It will be an identification number which will identify him as to state, local board, year of his birth, and his numerical position with respect to other registrants of his local board having the same year of birth, generally according to the sequence of their dates of birth.

4. Q—After the initial registration period is over (the period from August 30 through September 18, both dates inclusive), will men who become 18 after that have to register?

A—Yes. They will have to register continually as they become 18 within five days after the 18th anniversary of their births.

5. Q—Where will these men register after the initial registration period?

A—They will register at places designated by their local boards.

6. Q—Will ignorance of the law be accepted as an excuse for failure to register?

A—No. Ignorance of the law excuses no one. The Selective Service Act specifically provides that everyone will be deemed advised when the President proclaims dates for registration. This he did on July 20.

7. Q—Will single men be considered first for classification and induction into the armed forces?

A—Single men who are not fathers or not veterans probably will be considered first. The term "single man" is understood to include an unmarried man, a married man who does not live with

Named to Head March of Dimes



Mr. E. S. Stewart, prominent Abilene business and civic leader, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the 1949 March of Dimes, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced today.

The March of Dimes, conducted nationally each January, is the sole support of the National Foundation and its 2,800 local county chapters. Funds contributed to the annual drive pay costs of medical care and treatment for polio victims and finance the scientific research and professional education programs sponsored by the National Foundation. The 1949 appeal will be held January 14-31.

Mr. Stewart, born in Waco, Texas, has been long active in community fund raising and welfare work. A west Texas food broker for 17 years, he is now owner of the Abilene Candy Manufacturing Company. During the first World War he served overseas with the U. S. Army Engineers. Mr. Stewart is past president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club and in 1943 and 1944 was director of the American Red Cross War Fund in Taylor County.

Mr. O'Connor, in announcing Mr. Stewart's acceptance of the March of Dimes chairmanship, revealed that when complete incidence figures for this year are tabulated the toll of infantile paralysis in the United States from 1943 through 1948 may well exceed 100,000 cases.

"While the final answer to the mystery of poliomyelitis—the discovery of a cure and a preventive for the disease—lies in the research laboratory," Mr. O'Connor said, "the generous support of the American people is now more vital than ever before if victims of polio, children and adults alike, are to receive the care they must have to achieve maximum recovery."

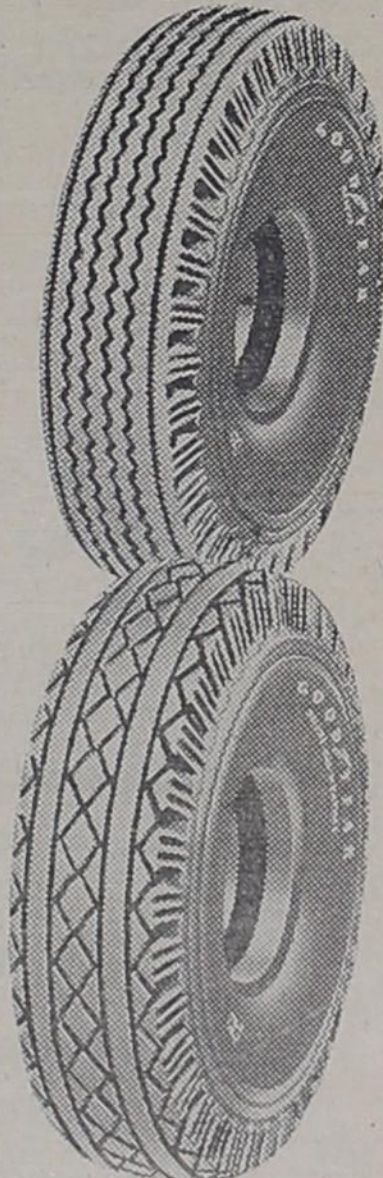
