THE SENATE MUST DECIDE

The United States Senate is being called upon this month to make a decision on an issue that reaches down into the American philosophy of

The issue, in brief, is: Should one industry be allowed to use the federal tax power to hobble a competing industry? Should not all industries, like all citizens, be equal before the law?

The industry affected is the margarine industry. Over a period of years certain elements in the dairy industry, on one pretext or another, have succeeded in loading down the margarine industry with a burden of crippling taxes.

As a consequence, consumers have been compelled to pay at least 10c a pound more for yellow margarine than they should.

Margarine manufacturers contend that their product is an important part of the nation's food supply, that it is nutritive and packed wth vitamins, and they have produced scientific proof to support their claims. A pound of yellow maragrine contains as many calories as a pound of

Last spring, by a 3 to 1 one vote the House passed a bill to repeal all taxes and license fees on white or yellow margarine. This bill, with a single minor amendment, is now before the Senate. It is in the people's interest that it be vetoed upon its merits, without the addition of amendments which would change its intent and mean-

This is an issue on which all consumers and vegetable oil producers can unite. Ask your Senators to support this bill and make yellow margarine free of discriminatory restrictions.



"School absence due to illness or vague disorders, if investigated, may disclose early cases of rheumatic fever. Teachers need to be more alert to visible signs and symptoms suggestive of substandard health. Among these signs and symptoms which should bring children to the attention of teacher or parent are: Failure to gain weight; pallor; poor appetite; fatigue; frequent colds and

PRICE SUPPORTS BOTH

Cooperatives and price support of farm prosperity. are necessary for the same genera reason, Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan said in a recent address.

Cooperatives are necessary because the individual, acting by himself, has no control over the price at which what he produces will sell, the Secretary said. While production and consumer co-ops can do something about this situation, aren't able to do enough, at least as far as Agriculture is concerned. That is why an adequate price support program is needed-so that the producers of agricultural commodities, aided by government programs, may market their products in a more orderly way and obtain from them a reasonable and fair price.

Farm spending pays the wages and salaries for millions of industrial workers, Secretary Brannan reminded the group, and it is certainly in the interest of the entire nation that the purchasing

For ths reason, the Secretary stated, we should have a price support program that would prevent farm buying power from declining to a point dangerous to national safety. Price supports he explains, should not guarantee anyone's income, but should assure the reasonably diligent farmer the opportunity to secure a fair price for his crops in the market place.

Secretary Brannan also suggested that, since the public is already spending money for soilconservation purposes, it is only sensible to extend benefits of price support only to those indivinuals who are making some effort, to conserve the soil.


