Knox County Hospital Distric is now operating the ambulance service for Knox County, according to hospital administrato Stephen Kuehler. "The hospital will be responsible for day-to-day operation of the ambulance. We'll do the billing and collecting, and basically be responsible for the service," Kuehler said.
For the last several years, the ambulance service was operated by the cities, with subsidies from the county and the hospital district. "For the next four years, the county will continue to help sub idze the service. After that, the ambulance service is the sole re sponsibility of the hospital dis-
trict" trict."

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## METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed $\$ 5,000$.
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unles the loss of service was more than $\$ 200$. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter devic
(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee. All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without specia authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

Egg Bargains
With the coming of Easter wo celcbrate spring and all its glory. Let's all take time to enjoy the trees budding, wildflowers blooming along the roads and the gras beginning to green. Easter would not be complete with Easter eggs. Recognizing bargain in eggs becomes even more important this time of year We all know that eggs are sold by the dozen.
To compare prices, one should realize that a dozen large egg weighs $11 / 2$ pounds; medium eggs $-11 / 3$ pounds; and small ones -1 $1 / 8$ pounds. (according to USDA). You can get the best buy by comparing these weights against price per dozen. For instance large eggs at 90 cents a dozen would cost 60 cents a pound. That isvery reasonable for a pound of high protein
food. Generally speaking, if there is less than a seven cent price spread between sizes in the same grade, you will get more for your money by buying the larger size.
Egg size has nothing to do with quality. Shell color makes no difference in the nutritional value of eggs. Some people have a strong preference for brown or white eggs.
The Araucana breed of chicken produces bluish-greeneggs. These eggs have been promoted as being low in cholesterol. This is not true According to D.W. Francis, retired Extension Poultry Specialist, they are slightly higher in cho lesterol than brown or white eggs. To keep eggs fresh, buy them
only from refrigerated display only from refrigerated display cases and refrigerate them at home, large end up. Eggs should be left in the carton as long as possible in the refrigerator. The carton helps the eggs retain moisture and careggs in the refrigerator can also eggs in the refrigerator can also

Gently Launder Electric Blankets
It's time to put away the electric blanket, but it looks a little grimy. Can you launder blankets with all that wiring inside? Yes! Most electric blankets can be washed at home in your automatic washer using gentle treatment to avoid damaging electric wiring. First, check the blanket's care label, then follow these steps. 1. Pretreat soiled areas; 2. Fill washer with warm water to high water level; 3. Add liquid laundry
detergent to the washer and agitate briefly to mix detergent venly; 4. Stop washer; 5. Load lanket evenly around agitator and soak for about 15 minutes. Do not agitate; 6. Set dial for final 2 minutes of agitation, start washer and let machine complete the cycle; 7 . Put 3 or 4 clean, dry bath owels into the dryer and preheat for 10 minutes at high heat; 8 . Load blanket into dryer with warm owels; 9. Set Time Dry cycle for 20 minutes, start dryer; 10. Check after 10 minutes. Continue if needed; 11.Remove blanket while still slightly damp to prevent overdrying that can damage wiring and cause shrinkage. 12. Hang lanket over two lines, or lay flat,

## until dry.

Avoid long periods of agitation
in the washer and excessive tumbling or overdrying in the dryer. Vigorous laundering can damage the wires inside the blanket. On the other hand, gentle laundering canextend the blanket's useful life nd keep it fresh and clean.

The Christians of the Bible did not celebrate "Easter" instead the celebrated the Lord's death and resurrection every Sunday in the communion service ( 1 Corinthians chapters 10-11; Acts 20:7).
The council of Nicea (325 A.D.) ruled that Easter should be celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon following the vema equinox. This means that Easter can fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25. Some churche do not use this method of deter mining the holiday. For instance the Orthodox church will have heir Easter on April 18 this year Many churches, hoping to re store religion to the original Chris tianity of the Bible, do not have found in Galatians $4: 8-11$.
