#### ON "ONE-WEAPON" WARS

Marshall Andrews, military editor of the Washington Post and a veteran of both world wars, has written an important book, called "Disaster Through Air Power," which has been published by Rhinehart & Company. Not everyone will agree with its treatment of an extremely controversial subject-but it undoubtedly does more than any other work of its kind to dispel the dubious and dangerous theory that big bomers will assure us of victory should another war

In the book, Mr. Andrews makes this extremely important statement: "Is is reasonably safe to make the dogmatic statement that no nation which ignores sea power can hope to win a modern war. It was Hitler's failure to give proper weight to sea power which led ultimately to his defeat . . . . " This is an historical truth which the air-power zealots seem to have totally overlooked. And failure to recognize it could lead this or any other nation to disaster.

Moreover, in these times, adequate seapower demands a truly balanced Navy of surface ships, submarines and, of first importance, carrierbased aviation. Some Air Force partisans obviously wish to reduce the strength of Naval air to the vanishing point, and perhaps to even eliminate it entirely. Nothing could do more to cripple our Naval effectiveness. In the last war, and especially in the Pacific, the carriers were one of the most decisive weapons.

There as no "one-weapon" wars The maximum development of all the services, sea, air and ground, is the only road to military security.

# To Control Cotton **Insects Early**

Records prove that early season control of certain cotton insects is both effective and profitable. According to Allen C. Gunter, associate extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, early season control insures early fruiting in areas where thrips, aphids, or cotton lice, fleahoppers and boll weevils, alone or in combination, cause damage every year.
