



THE FBI DOESN'T MAKE POLICY

As a result of evidence in the dramatic communist trials, a great to-do has been made over alleged illegal activities by the FBI, including wire-tpping. This issue, as is to be expected, is being built up by left-wing groups.

However, many honest and sincere people are worried about the possibility of police state methods being adopted here. So the position of the FBI should be clearly understood. First of all, as J. Edgar Hoover has pointed out wire tapping is not carried on a wholesale scale, as the left-wing comrades would have us believe. It is authorized only in cases of the gravest kind, involving espionage, sabotage and kidnapping. In such cases, it is often the only possible means of developing eveidence. Moreover, as Mr. Hoover also said, the FBI does not make policy in this or anything else. It follows policies laid down by its superiors in the government. The policy on wire tapping was set by the late President Roosevelt in 1940. In each case when the use of a wire tap was under consideration, the authorization of the Attorney General must be obtained before the tap can be utilized by the FBI. This policy was followed by Attorney Generals Biddle, Jackson and Clark. The latter two are now justices of the Supreme Court. And the policy has been reiterated by the present Attorney General, Mr. McGrath. According to Mr. Hoover, "The FBI has less than 170 telephone taps in existence, confined to internal security cases, throughout the entire United States and its possessions." The tap, in other words, is employed only in extremely serious cases, which definitely affect the national security, and then only on the authorization of the highest legal officer of the Executive branch of the government.

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

THE IRON HORSE WORKS HARD



"Without this basic transportation by rail," he said, "it would not be possible to build and maintain the public highways. Neither would it be possible to build and operate the millions of trucks and motor cars which use them. In a very real sense, therefore, rail transportation is an essential part of transportation by highway."


Mr. Henry went on to point out the contrast between passenger traffic and freight traffic on highways and rail. Intercity passenger movement by private automobiles far exceeds the movement of all the commercial carriers combined-train, plane and bus. High Yields Are Reported By **Texas Farmers**


You don't have to leave Texas to see corn and grain sorghum that will produce well over 100 bushels per acre or wheat that will run from 50 to more than 90 bushels per acre. Such yields were produced by a number of Texas farmers in 1949.

According to reports from county agricultural agents, E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A. & M. College, says 16 Elder L M. Handley preaches counties reported that corn the third Sunday. Services at yields of 100 bushels or more per 10:30 a. m. Sunday. Singing in acre were made on one or more at 7:30 p. m. on Saturday before farms. These counties were Upshur, Franklin, Wood, Bailey Hopkins, Houston, Henderson, Wise, Red River, Brazos, Shelby Panola, Castro, Deaf Smith, Swisher, and Hale. Individual cases of yields in excess of 90 bushels were reported from 20 counties and 41 other counties reported yields of 75 bushels or more per acre. Miller says these outstanding corn yields show what can be done when good seed and cultural practices are Church school _____ 10 a. m. used and with favorable weather conditions.


He says most of the high yields were made on land that had been enriched with fertilized and inocculated legumes. County-wide corn production contests played a big part by stimulating more interest in higher yields. In Upshur county, four 4-H boys and three adults produced more than 100 bushels per acre. Lee Roy Bartlett, a 4-H boy, made 149 bushels to lead the list and the high adult demonstration was conducted by Roy Williford, 133 bushels per acre. These yields were made with corn hybrids on land that had been in lespedeza meadows for several years.



two acres. The delinted seed can be planted with a 5 hole corn plate rather than the regular cotton plate and this gives an even spacing of the seed and saves many hours of hand hoeing or chopping. On a 100 acres, Elliott says, 50 bushels or more of fuzzy seed are required for the planting operation against 27 bushels of delinted seed.

At \$3.50 per bushel, the 27 bushels cost \$94.50. Delinting costs and seed treatment bring the total to \$106.16. The fuzzy seed will cost \$175. Then add a conservative \$10 for loss of time for stopping to refill the old type planter box and another \$150 for a necessary extra chopping and thinning and the total is \$335. Subtract and you have a differ-


