United States Is Christmas Carol 'Meeting Place'

N TOWNS AND CITIES throughout America, in churches, public squares and along home - lined streets, over millions of radios and public address systems come the strains of the world's Yuletide melodies-old as bygone centuries, young as "I'm dreaming of a white Christ-

The United States, meeting place of carols from all Christendom, contributes yearly to the traditions of Christmas music by writing new songs and popularizing old ones.

The carols of Europe arrived with the peoples who came to America to settle. "O Come, All Ye Faithful' (Adeste Fideles), eventually translated into 119 languages and dialects, belonged to no one nation but was the common gift of the continent. From Germany came Luther's hymn for children, "Away in a manger, no crib for a bed. . ." England sent "God rest you, merry gentlemen, let nothing you dismay. . ." And France provided the beautiful "Cantique de Noel" or "O

Three American composers did much to revive the ancient custom by writing new songs which are, today, among the world's best beloved carols.

"It Came Upon a Midnight Clear" was the inspiration of Edmund H. Sears, a Massachusetts Unitarian minister, in 1849. Less than 10 years later Dr. John Henry Hopkins, Jr., Episcopal rector from Williamsport, Pa., composed both the words and music for "We Three Kings of Orient Are."

Perhaps the best-known American carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." was written in 1868 by Phillips Brooks in Philadelphia. The young Episcopal minister, later bishop of Massachusetts, was inspired to write the poem by the memory of a trip to the Holy Land two years earlier. The rollicking "Jingle Bells," though non-religious in theme, also came from the pen of a churchman, John Pierpont, and has enjoyed almost a century of popularity.

The point of all this is that ignorance and misundestandings do more than anything else to create distrust of free enterprise. A man who honestly believes that business makes extortionate profits and operates solely for the benefit of a group of bloated plutocrats, is a man ripe for the phony blandishments of the socialists and the communists. Those who would destroy free enterprise and free government have small concern with the truth. They make the most of every misconception that exists in the public

Only those who know the facts can make intelligent decisions. And the place to start teaching those facts is in our schools and colleges.

THE FUNCTION OF PRICES

The bulletin issued by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States describes the function of prices in these words: "Free prices perform enormously useful functions which direct controls are designed to destroy. Free pricing helps to conserve scarce supplies by cutting down less essential and marginal uses; it stimulates the elimination of waste; it encourages the development and use of substitutes. It is a great conserver. Price control, by making things cheaper and more plentiful than they really are, encourages wasteful use and consumption of scarce items, to say nothing of the enormous waste of manpower operating the controls."

Ina free market, prices find their proper level -a level which is determined by wage and material casts, by the supply and demand situation of the moment, and by other such natural economic forces. And, of very great importance, the free market is the only one which nurtures and protects our competitive system. As an example, in a controlled market all retailers sell their wares at prices which are determined by government fiat. Stocks are rationed to them and to the consumer. The business becomes purely mechancila, and there is no incentive to lower prices, to better service, or to do any of the other things which are a normal part of the functioning of the competitive economy.

Worst of all it seems pretty evident that some of those who are urging price and other controls as an emergency measure, hope to make them a permanent part of our economic system. Should that happen, government would be absolute master of the economy-and regimentation of inanswers averaged 50 percent. The true figure, dustry and individuals would be here to stay.

Dr. Moore, Author Cotton Meeting Of 'Night Before', Was Ashamed of It

Everyone knows and loves the poem which begins-

'Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the

Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse;but the man who wrote it, Dr. Clement Clarke Moore, was a-

shamed of it and would not allow it to be published under his name for more than 20 years. Dr. Moore, an aloof professor of Greek and Oriental literature in

the Episcopal Seminary in New York, wrote the poem on Christmas eve 1822 and read it to his seven children.

He had not planned for the poem to go further than his own family, but a relative who was visiting the Moores put a copy in her dairy. sent it to a newspaper.

Other newspapers printed the jingles and they quickly became known all over the country. The dignified Dr. Moore was embarrassed and considered it beneath a man of his scholastic standing to be the author of children's

Twenty-two years later, howpublished in book form under his name for the first time.

Wax From Candles Calls for Caution

With so many candles placed about the home to give a festive air during the holiday season, candle wax drippings on rugs, tablecloths, and mantels are almost in-

Wax spots on rugs can usually be Dear Santa Claus: removed successfully by first scraping off as much wax as possible with a dull knife and then sponging | big truck, a rope and chain. with carbon tetrachloride.

When you scrape up the wax, be tler. careful not to injure the yarns. If the candle was colored and a stain remains, try sponging it lightly with a liquid made of two parts of water and one part of denatured (rubbing) alcohol,

As a precaution against fading, test this mixture first on an inconspicuous part of the rug.

Wax that has run down from candleholders onto your best linen tablecloth can be removed by the same method of first scraping-being very careful not to injure the fiber or thread-and then sponging with carbon tetrachloride. If the stain is colored, use the solution suggested for a colored spot on a rug, after you've used carbon tetrachloride. Again you are urged to test an inconspicuous spot for possible fading from use of the solu-




