New Plants Pogram Begun

"new plants" program and already more than 2,000 foreign that will prove valuable to the introductions and collections from the wild flora are included in the program.

Plants have been collected from practically all corners of the earth, except Russia and her satellites. Many have come from Central and South America, Africa, India, Turkey and the Philippines.

The purpose of the program is to find out if the crops under investigation can be grown commercially in Texas or if they can be used in the plant breeding work being done by the Station. Many of these plants may be resistant to diseases and the plants breeder will try to bred this resistance into new or improved varieties of our basic crops.

The program is being handled by a committee composed of Dr. R. G. Reeves, professor of agronomy and genetics, who is chairman; Dr. R. C. Potts, department of agronomy; Dr. O. E .Sperry, department of range and forestry; E. Mortensen, horticulturist, Winter Garden Experiment Station and Dr. H. . Blackhurst, department of horticulture.

Substations and filed laboratories of the Texas Station are studying each crop that the specialists feel my be adapted to the area in which the substation is located.

At Texas A. & M. College, the departments of agronomy, horticulture, range and forestry and floriculture and landscape architecture all have work underway under the program. Field units at Chillicothe, Sonora, Weslaco, Winter Haven, Stephenville, Montague and Yoakum are conducting investigations with crops that may be adapted to those areas.

Under study are many species of oilseed crops that have not previously been produced commercially in Texas. Among the







"All that's necessary is for the expectant mother to place herself under the care of a competent physician as soon as her pregnancy has been confirmed, the health officer said.

He believes that all too many Texas babies are being born with the application, passed to them by an infected mother during the prenatal period. Early prenatal care, he explained, would include a blood test of the mother to determin the pre-

In the past, sound insulation was partially achieved by build ing party walls of heavy masonry construction. Builders are now using more effective and less costly procedures.

One popular method is to build sound insulation into a wall. In an ordinary lath and plaster wall, sound is transmitted directly through the studs and across the air space between the studs. The sound insulating value of a stud wall may be improved by placing insulating board between a double

Dr. Cox charged that many times the mother-to-be delays her visit to the doctor until a few weeks, or days, before she expects the infant. Then, he says, it may be too late to prevent the birth of a syphilitic

Almost 2600 cases of congenital syphilis were reported last year. Dr. Cox says he sees little indication that there will be any appreciable reduction in case reports this year. Incidence of congenital infection will probably remain at fairly constant levels, he predicted, despite a slight reduction in total syph-

ilis of all types. "Advances in medical therapy for syphilis have progressed to the point where it is now possible to effectively prevent congenital infection-but not without the mother's complete cooperation," Cox warned.

The explanation is that even though a mother contracts syphilis just prior to pregnancy, she can be restored to health and the baby can be born sound and healthy, provided treatments are started within the first three prenatal months. Even after that time, a high index of protection for both mother and baby is assured, but the chances for a normal birth decrease with each week of delay.

Prenatal clinics are held by all local health units for those women who would not otherwise have this care because of financial resources, Dr. Cox


