

OIL'S "NEW LOOK"

The oil industry, according to an authority on its operations, has acquired a "new look". That didn't come about suddenly, for reasons of style. It was the result of an evolutionary development which has caused far-reaching changes in oil's ties, and other inducements. importance to the American people and American industry.

Not so many years ago oil was primarily a one-product business, and that product was kerosene. Therefore, most of the industry's work had to do with producing more and better gasoline to meet the needs of the automobile age. Now, in this complex postwar world, it is clear that a very high percentage of all the energy needs of the world must be met with oil and natural gas.

A few figures vividly illustrate what has happened. Many people think that the millions of cars, trucks and buses which throng our streets and roads are the greatest users of energy-ye the fact is that they use only 10 per cent of the total. The railroads use 11 per cent. All our merchant ships and all our planes use together less than 3 per cent.

The really big users of energy fall into three groups. First come the public utilities, which account for 37 per cent of all the energy consumed. Industrial manufacturers use 16 per cent. Finally, heating in homes and places of work takes 24 per cent. The use of oil for space heating alone has gone up 50 per cent in the last two years.

RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million railroad employes.

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work -in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employe!

These employes have had substantial raises during and since the war. Their average weekly earnings are higher than the average weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing industries. They have more job security than the average worker in American industry. They also enjoy paid vacations, a retirement system and other advantages more generous than the average worker receives.

In contrast with the demands of these 16 unions, which add up to the equivalent of 48c an hour, the Conductors and Trainmen recently settled their wage request for an increase of 10c Railroads Run for Everybody— Not Employes Alone

The railroad industry must serve not one but many groups-producers, businessmen, shippers, passengers and the general publicnight and day, every day of the year. These unions are proceeding in utter disregard of this important difference between railroads and other industries. Industrial plants can be shut down over weekends and holidays, but freight, mail, express and passengers must continue to move. Everybody who enters railroad employment knows this.

Strike Threat

On September 18, 1948, the leaders of these 16 unions began taking a strike vote. But the threat of a strike will not alter the opposition of the railroads to such unreasonable demands!
