It was then that C. P. Baker, manager of the Baker-McCarty Store, announced the sale of the


store to the interests of Cobb's Department Store, a well known West Texas institution which operates 14 department stores over a wide area of West Texas. Baker-Bryant Co. was the second general mercantile store in the town of Munday. At its beginning and during it infancy, merchandise was brought in by freight wagons, for it wasn't until later that the railroad was completed into Munday.

The other general merchandise concern was Mayes and Alexander, which was operated by C. L. Mayes.







WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21-A major legislative skirmish perhaps the most important one of this session, was fought out in the House this week. Chances of reducing federal spending, of balancing the budget, of defeating the FEPC, and other absurd civil rights proposals, in fact, the chance of stopping any number of things in the Congress, was dealt a fatal blow when the House failed to go back to their old rules by a vote of 236 to 183. Heretofore, the Rules Committee in the House has been used as a sort of clearance Committee for John T. Flynn, in his thought-provoking book legislative proposals. In January, 1949, the rule was changed to permit any Commitee Chairman to bring up any bill which his Committee reported, regardless of the Rules Committee. 



The cause of this fire may never be known, but the building became an inferno with increible rapidity. One good can come out of this ghastly tragedy-it should cause those in take full advantage of the campaign recently initiated by the National Board of Fire Underwriters to inspect the nation's hospitals, and to show fire hazards may be eliminated. The inspections are being made by qualified experts, and have nothing to do with commercial aspects of insurance.

Once more fire has struck, killing the helpless. How many more object lessons are needed to get the fullest public cooperation for fire prevention?

During the last holiday season, as in the past, the odds were that such money tragedy came to many homes. It came in the form of fire. In some instances, it left dead, maimed and suffering human beings behind. In one case a fire which started with a Christmas tree destroyed most of a town.

Yet the terrible toll which fire took in 1949 need not be repeated in 1950. Fire is not an enemy against which there is no practical defense. It is, on the contrary, an enemy which can be captured and controlled. The experts say that something like 90 percent of all fires are unnec-, essary-they could have been prevented with just a little thought, a little time, a few simple precautions. Most fires start from the simplest hazards-carelessness with smoking materials, frayed electric cords, improperly maintained stoves and furnaces, accumulations of trash, and so on. You don't have to be an authority on fire prevention to get rid of these hazards in your home or place of business and the cost is small. This year, organized fire prevention will go ahead in high gear. It will be successful if, and only if, it is given public cooperation everywhere. Your life and property may be at stake.



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

One Thing Sure About Weather— **Feeding Needed**

Supplemental Feed Cost Will Prevent Costly Livestock Losses

No one can predict the weather very far ahead in the Cotton Belt, and there's an old saying that "only fools and strangers try to predict the weather."

One thing is sure, though, about January and February weather. This is the time when livestock producers can prevent costly losses and keep their animals in vigorous condition by following a good supplemental feeding program.

Death and weight losses are easily seen results of poor winter nutrition. Weak calves, poor milking and breeding troubles are equally costly results in improper feeding during winter months. Mature winter pastures lack the protein which is essential to keep cattle producing profitably. In many pastures, even the supply of mature grass is small and cold winter rains and winter storms increase the need of feed intake. Supplemental feeding should begin before winter weather sets in and continue until spring pasture growth is sufficient to satisfy the needs of the cows and calv-

Protein is the most commonly needed winter supplement. The concentrated protein in cottonseed meal, cake or pellets furnishes the protein requirements of the cattle and helps to make better use of the mature pasture forage the cattle get from the pasture. The high phosphorus content of cottonseed cake, meal or pellets is an added value for winter feeding. The phosphorus content of range and farm grasses, like protein, decreases rapidly as they mature and are bleached by winter rains.

Feed dry cows about 11/2 pounds of cottonseed cake, meal or pellets, per head daily. Bred cows need 2 to 21/2 pounds for 60 days before calving. After cows have calved the daily allow- or when grazing is very short Mixtures of cottonseed hulls prompt breeding.




GONZALES-A \$50,000 addition to the present seven building plant of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children has been announcd by foundation officials.





Hypertension is not always serious. Many people who have it do not grow progressively worse, but live to a normal old age.

In general, an applicant's record of experience must show satisfactory performance in increasingly responsible positions. College education may be counted in part in lieu of experince.


