Applications For Emergency Farm Loans For Fire Losses Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by fire are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Knox City, FmHA county supervisor, Bobby G. Cude, said recently.

Knox and Foard Counties are two of 147 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the

Cude said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever obtain credit from private com- fered losses from the disaster.

mercial lenders, the interest rate is

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA Emergency Loan, ' Cude said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.



The Munday Moguls shut-out and Paducah took over on downs. the Paducah Dragons 48 to 0 for Munday's second of the season. The Dragons got inside the Mogul

In the first quarter the Moguls scored after Kole Sanders recovered a fumble at the Dragon 40 yard line. After moving the ball Jake Jordan on a short pass. Jortouchdown. Ky Edwards kicked the PAT.

After receiving the ball, Paducah moved the ball across the 50 to the Mogul 40. The Dragons coughed up the ball once again and this time Jason Bowman was there to recover for the Moguls.

Later in the second, Munday got the ball at the 43 yard line after forcing the Dragons to punt. Bronco Flye figured it was his turn. Bronco dodged and then took the ball 57 yards for another Moguls touchdown. Edwards kicked the PAT. Munday was on top at the end of the first half.

The Moguls received the kickoff in the third and quickly moved the ball down to the Dragon 3 yard line. Dustin Kiser took the ball in from there to increase the lead 34 to 0. A fumbled snap kept an extra point from being kicked.

The Munday defense then decide to put some points on the board. After Paducah came up short of a first down, the punt was blocked and caught by Mogul Gerald Taylor and then he ran into the end zone from 45 yards out. Ky Edwards kicked the PAT and

City Sales Tax Rebate Shows 2.71% Increase

State Comptroller John Sharp sent a total of \$122.5 million in October sales tax rebates to 979 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 19.1 percent increase over their payments of one year ago.

Increased consumer spending has raised all city sales tax allocations since October of last year. Texas cities received \$109.6 million, up 19 percent from the \$92.1 million they received last October. Counties received a total of \$12.8 million for their October rebates, a 19.6 percent increase over their October 1992 rebates, which totaled \$10.7 million.

"The state of Texas has experienced year-over-year employment growth every month since January 1992," Sharp said.

The City of Munday received a net payment of \$5,307.63 for this period compared to \$4,791.92 payment in prior year. The total payment to date for 1993 are \$67,133.85 compared to \$65,357.96 in 1992. This shows a 2.71% increase over last year's total to date.

The total for the county for net payment this period was \$12,997.81 compared to \$11,155.60 last year at this period. 1993 payments to date for the county was \$155,722.39 compared to \$166,771.82 last year's payments to date.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on August sales and reported to the Comptroller in September by business filing monthly tax returns.

New Vehicle Registration Sticker To Reduce Theft

Introducing the latest in antitheft devices from Texas.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing a new vehicle registration sticker-for placement inside windshields instead of outside on license plates. The program begins with registrations expiring January 1994.

The sticker is larger and of a different design. Its main purpose is to deter theft -- bringing up another feature.

If the sticker is peeled off the windshield, the word "VOID ap-

pears on it, making it a useless scrap of paper. It's not even worth stealing.

In 1992, 568,885 replacement plates and stickers were issued. TxDOT estimates that 60 percent of replacement stickers issued were due to theft. At \$5.30 per replacement, replacing the stickers cost the public \$1.8 million and a lot of time and aggravation.

"When the word gets out that these stickers are useless when peeled off the glass, incidence of stolen stickers will drop quickly, as will the cost of replacing stolen stickers," said Jerry Dike, director of TxDOT's Division of Motor Vehicle Titles and Registration. "But the savings don't stop there. If all stolen stickers were used on vehicles that would otherwise be legally registered, state and county revenue losses could exceed \$17 million. Recouping these losses could mean savings passed on for use on other projects.

the last month or two. The big problem is mainly water shortage.

Sure, many yards are being watered, the grass looks great, but for some reason the trees do not seem to be faring so well. There is a reason for this.

The feeder roots for the grass usually remain in the top two inches of the soil. The trees have their roots down around eight inches. To see if you are watering deep enough dig down about eight inches--somewhere just beyond the outreach of the branches. If the soil is wet there may be some other problem with the tree. If dry here is a good tip.

Instead of using a lawn sprinkler, try using soaker hoses around the tree. Do not water close to the trunk, this may cause root rot or other problems. Instead soak the ground out around the outreach of the tree's branches.

If your lawn has a sandy soil it will not take as long to do this as if the lawn has more clay in the soil structure. It is wise to continue watering into the winter so that trees do not suffer damage from the first freeze.



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
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
