

#### BETTER BUILDING CODES

The National Board of Fire Underwriters reports that substantial improvement in American municipal codes was made last year. In that period, it helped prepare new codes or revise outmoded ones for 232 cities and towns throughout the country-more than double the number which asked such assistance the year before.

The organization's National Building Code has been revised six times since it was originally published in 1905. It also has an Abbreviated Edition for towns which do not feel the need for the more detailed Code.

This is an encouraging development. A sound building code is one of the most effective and fundamental weapons in the war against destuctive fire-and that goes for the small towns no less than the great cities. Firetraps, substandard commercial buildings, inadequate and improper exits, excessively inflammable materials -these and other kindred dangers have been responsible for a huge amount of property loss and for a ghastly number of deaths and maimings. Fire is always waiting for its chance to strike-and poorly built and maintained structures are just what it is looking for.

The war against fire must be fought on all fronts, in all salients. Sound building codes are one, as are adequate fire-fighting facilities and a public which is alert to hazards and knows how to correct them. Our gigantic fire waste is something for which we can have no excuse.

#### THE ECONOMIC VIRTUES OF LIVESTOCK

A brief article in Country Gentleman, written by L. O. Brackeen of Alabama Polytechnic Instiute, says that "using livestock to balance cotton and tobacco production is increasing the income of Southern farmers." He cites a number of specific examples. In one case, for instance, a 96-acre cotton-hog farm over a 10-year period showed an average cash balance of about \$3225 after deducting all cash expenses. The annual sale of hogs was a big factor, with an average

#### IS THERE A "DOCTOR SHORTAGE"?

## In face of Board findings to the contrary, union leaders insist on 48 hours pay for 40 hours work. This would be an average in-

crease of 31 cents an hour, or \$2.48 a day. So Union leaders have called a completely unjustified strike on 5 Western railroads, effective June 25.

On June 15, an Emergency Board appointed by President Truman under the terms of the Railway Labor Act recommended the railroads grant switchmen a 40-hour week and a wage increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 for an 8-hour day.

Despite the added financial burden involved, the railroads are ready to accept these recommendations, as they have always accepted Emergency Board recommendations on national issues.

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 cents an hour or \$2.48 A DAY—although their present earnings are substantially higher than those of workers in other industries!

#### **Board Says Demands Unjustified**

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employes, and would add too great a burden to railroad co.

strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!



AUSTIN-Texas draft boards have more than 65,000 men fit for duty and available for military service in case of emergency or war, Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state director of Selective Service, said today State draft boards during May added almost 5,000 to this group

by classification action of its 137 local boards. These figures represent men who have been classified in I-A by the boards under the federal draft law. The draft boards during May

made 12,338 new and original classifications. These represent men who were classified for th first time under the Selective Service Act of 1948. Of th number, 7,830 were classified a deferred status.

Approximately two-thirds the classification each month involves men who are classified for the first time. The other one-third involves registrants who are reclassified because of change in status, such as marriage, physical condition, and other factors under the law.







The Switchman's Union on a number of roads has refused to accept an 18 cents per hour, or \$1.44 a day increase in pay as recommended by an Emergency Board set up by the President. 

AUSTIN-Death rates in diabetes is three times as high in diabetics whose condition was not discovered until after complications developed than for patients whoes illness was recognized and brought under treatment before advanced symptoms appeared.

Based on recently completed national studies, this was revealed Thursday by State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox.

"Diabetes has not always been a public health problem," the health officer declared. "It became one when we found that the death rate is much greater when the condition is discovered

"Public education makes for lower death rates, and public education in such matters is a health department job."

Dr. Cox told this story about diabetes:

It used to be that diabetic patients sought treatment only after having developed serious complications. A considerable number of all diabetics examined at autopsy showed active pulmonary tuberculosis.

The discovery of insulin gave physicians a specific treatment for prolonging patients' lives, even before it was entirely clear what the disease was and what its effects were. Thus, event afery means longer life.



# Survey Reveals **Business Taxes** Fall On Public

The influence of taxes on the American family will be uppermost in the minds of members of Congress for the next few weeks. They are seeking the answer to this \_\_64 question:

How can they satisfy increasing public demands for tax reduction and at the same time find other taxes to offset such a reduction? Their problem is made double hard by the fact that Uncle Sam wants to spend \$5½ billion above his income

The Council of State Chambers of Commerce today pointed up the problem in a special study by its Washington research staff. It found that the \$401/2 billion in all taxes collected by the Federal Government last year came from these sources: 441/2 percent from personal income taxes, 28½ percent from corporation income taxes, 6 percent from social security
