KEEP YOUR FEET ON THE GROUND

Excessive buying is gradually diminshing. With a little reflection it is easy to see why. Concern over the grim headlines of recent weeks simply caused a lot of people to lose perspective. Indisputable facts meant little-such as booming consumer goods production and soaring agricultural statistics. Meat is a good illustration. Abnormal demand has shoved up some prices but there is a shortage. Within a matter of weeks the biggest pork crop in history will be moving to market. And beef supplies are

Meat consumption is one of the best indica_ tions of a nation's living standard. Here again the figuree should help wary consumers get their feet back on the ground. The average family of four in this country eats eleven pounds of meat a week which takes about five hours of the breadwinner's pay. In Russia, by way of contrast, one would have to work 35 hours to pay of the same amount of meat, if it were available.

One very good reason why we have not had serious shortages of necessities in the United States is our free competitive system under which all business, big and little, operates. Wherever there is consumer need, it immediately becomes good business for somone to meet that need at a competitive price. While meat cannot be manufactured like automobiles and tooth brushes, meat producers and packers are compelled by the same natural lags governing other free enterprise to do their utmost to satisfy consumer demand.

These are some of the reasons why housewives in our country do not need to scramble for goods. There is more than enough of everything. Practically any other nation in the world would consider itself well off indeed if it had half the abundance of this country.

"One of the most difficult aspects of this problem of deserving public confidence is the fact that some businessmen are guilty of the same derelictions they criticize in others. Some of them also have the 'gimmies'. The moral is opvious. Businessmen must stop acquiesing in government intervention which doesn't seem to directly concern them. They will have to quit taking a handout from Uncle Sam with one hand, while they take a poke at bureaucrats with the other."-Elmer L. Lindseth, President, Edison Electric Institute.



For Farm and Home

How to Cure "Eye-Sores" FTENTIMES a building which has come to look "seedy" can be given a new outlook and its life span increased by simply covering the unsightly exterior. By using a durable yet inexpensive material, the owner is able to salvage the old building, give it a presentable appearance, and save the cost

of a new structure. Time and use bring about many ravages to farm buildings. Yet, the old machine shed, the garage-even the barn itself-can be rejuvenated both in appearance and strength by nailing on panels of Masonite quarter-inch temper-



These tough, strong panels of wood fiber have a number of advantages both for new construction and building rejuvenation. They resist weather, water and time; they are unusually strong and rigid, yet light in weight; and they resist wear and tear remarkably well.

An added point in their favor is their smooth, hard surface which can be painted any color desired, or to match the other buildings. Of course, they can be worked with ordinary tools available on any farm. They don't splinter or split,



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



the center of the board for the partition. Two strips of quarterround molding can be substituted for the groove. Duplicate side and end pieces are jigsawed in pairs. Tab slots in the end pieces are cut by drilling a hole at one end of the slot for inserting the saw

Parts of the magazine rack should be assembled as follows:

First glue the center piece in the groove in the bettom board. Be sure that the inside edge of half-lap slot aligns with the edge of the wood. Now nail and glue the side pieces to the beveled edges of the bottom board. The ends 30 on last. These engage the tabs on the center piece and then are bowed outward to snap over the tabs on the ends of the side pieces. This interlocks the ends. The lower edges of the end pieces then are nailed to the end grain of the bottom

For a variation in the material, use Masonite Leatherwood, which has an em-bossed surface resembling Spanish grain leather. Either hardboard may be left in its natural color, painted, varnished or lacquered.

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-At least four different types of radioactive detection instruments and computers are available for measuring radiation particles if and when an atomic bomb is ever exploded over a Texas community.

This enrouraging bit of information was revealed by the state's chief health official, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. He's state director of health and emergency medical service, part of the Texas civil defense setup.

Radiation is one of three principal harmful effects or atomic explosions. Others are blast damage and burns. Using RAD-IAC instruments, it is possible to know what areas are safe from the tasteless, odorless colorless radioactive particles

All RADIAC instruments are designed for use by radiation monitoring squads. Squad members might be soldiers, or they could be civilians trained by the State Health Department's rad (iological division. In either case they would be trained for imm-

ediate action in atomic disasters "Planning emergency medical and health services in an atomic disaster has been one big mess of confusion, "Dr. Cox admitted. "But we're beginning to see light now. 


