
Hoyle A. Sullins of Vera, special agent for the U.S. Department of Commerce, bureau of the census, has submitted the following cotton ginning report for Knox County:

The waste is enormous-much more than most persons realize. The American Medical Association has shown that accidents rob the nation of more working years than any disease, because accidents strike all age groups, not just those whose productive years are largely behind them.

The traffic accident problem this year is serious, with a death toll of 35,000 in prospect. That would be the largest number of automobile victims since the record year of 1941,







A place to keep toys can be a safety measure. A box, cupboard or open shelf is handier than drawers or a cabinet with doors which are hard to manage and sometimes stick. "Playthings are the tools which help children to learn," says Mrs. Johnson, "so it is an important job to select safe toys and teach safe habits in using them." .







Orchard Jobs **Need Attention**

Next year's fruit crop may depend on the care you give your orchard during the next few weeks. High on the list of jobs that should be done now, says John E. Hutchinson, associate extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, is pruning. This job should be completed during this month, he says, because bad weather may make outside work impossible later in the winter.

Each tree in the orchard should be checked for San Jose scale, he says. This ashy-gray scale, if it is present, can be found on the trunk and limbs of the tree. Limbs that are severely infested with the scale should be removed and burned. A 3 percent oil emulsion spray, says Hutchinson, will control the insect provided the tree is completely covered with the solu-

Observe these simple precautions for greatest safety: Use cleaning compounds exactly as recommended by the manufacturer. Be absolutely sure that all moisture is removed from cans after cleaning. Cans must be dry before covers are re-

Proper care of milk cans usually pays off in the form of larger milk checks. Other common-sense rules to observe in handling milk cans are these:

1. Carry cans to desired location; do not drop, throw or roll them. 2. Leave covers off empty cans when

3. Avoid scratching the insides of cans with stirring rods. It is vitally important

to remove rods after stirring. 4. Do not allow sour contents to remain in cans for long periods.

5. Keep cans moving. Avoid long periods of storage and idleness.

6. Inspect cans regularly. If cans have been damaged so that their safety as sanitary containers is questionable, replace them with new cans.

Eleven Percent Of 1950 Cotton Crop

BRYAN-Insect damage to the 1950 cotton crop in Texas amounted to approximately \$107, 035,000, destroying 11 percent of the total harvest, according to an unofficial preliminary estimate compiled by the National Cotton Council, George G. Chance, chairman of the Texas unit of the Council, said here

'Insects kept approximately 456,000 bales of cotton and an estimated 187,000 tons of cottonseed off the market this year. Basedon average prices, this lint would have brought Texas farmers some \$91,1119,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of \$15,916,000," the Council spokesman said.

"Throughout the Cotton Belt," Mr. Chance said, "an estimated 16.5 percent of the crop, valued at approximately \$598,565,000 was destroyed. In dollars and cents, losses in 1950 were second highest on record, exceeded only by 1949 when damage amounted to more than \$617 million. Chairman Chance announced





Reflecting the larger supplies and smaller disappearance grain sorghum prices at the farm dropped to the lowest point since February 1949 and average \$1.63 per 100 pounds in October 1950. This was 9c below a year ago and 35c below the April peak of last season. Prices of No. 2 Yellow Milo averaged \$2.46 per 100 pounds at the principal markets during the 1949-50 season. This compares with \$2.62 per 100 pounds in 1948-49. At Kansas City, No. 2 Yellow Milo averaged \$2.04 per 100 pounds in October compared with \$2.01 a year ago and \$2.27 2 years ago.


