

There is a good deal of misunderstanding con-

cerning the meat situation. As everyone knows, meat prices have risen. But so has the price of practically everything else. The price of some other foods-including such staples as cheese, rice, butter, and salmon-have advanced

more than meat from the prewar (1939-41) level. Nobody "fixes" the price of meat. The price is largely determined by what the consumers of the country are willing to pay for the supply which is available at any given time. About 2,000,000 more people are working now than had jobs last winter. Third-round wage increases have given consumer purchasing power another boost. This, the demand

for meat is stronger than ever. On top of that, less meat has been available lately than came on the market last winter. That is the result of a normal seasonal factor, plus the fact that the corn crop was relatively poor lost year and great quantities of feed grains were sent





Thrifty-minded cooks are turning to poultry for main dishes instead of higher-priced meats and they are especially proud of Roast Duck stuffed with Orange Sweet Potato Stuffing. Combine 3 cups hot mashed sweet potatoes with 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup lightly packed bread crumbs (corn bread if possible), 1 cup peeled diced oranges, 1 tbsp. grated orange rind, 3 tbsp. melted fat. This is enough stuffing for a 4-5 lb. duck. Lightly stuff neck, fold skin over back, fasten with skewers. Body cavity should be lightly stuffed closed with skewers, then laced with string or thread. Fold wing tips under and tie ends of legs together. After placing on back in shallow roasting pan, let excess fat escape by pricking skin across back, around legs, wings and tail. Roast uncovered in slow gas oven held at 325° for 2 hrs. Serves 4-6.

Housewives who want leisure, yet must serve tasty meals on time, have learned to plan entire oven meals cooked by clock control. All they do is set the clock which auto-matically lights the oven burner, then automatically turns off the gas when the meal is done. The clock can be set hours ahead of time so that the cook can walk out of the kitchen and let this mechanical servant do the cooking for her.

The removable drip trays underneath the top burners of your gas range are as easily cleaned as a dish. Just wipe with warm soapy water, dry thoroughly on bottom and top before replacing.



Farmers Urged To Fight Weevils In Storage Bins

"With the shortage of grain storage space, there probably will be a lot of corn and grain sorghum stored on farms in Texas this year," Dr. H. G. Johnston, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, points out. "The wise man will start early to protect his grains against weevils."

The first thing is to be sure that storage bins are weather and fumi-

gant tight, Dr. Johnston says. If the grain is not in storage yet, clean the bins and spray thoroughly with a five percent DDT spray. Dr. Johnston recommends two mixtures for the fumigation process. The first is three part of ethylene dichloride and one part carbon tetrachloride. One thousand bushels of grain will use six gallons of the fumigant. Sprinkle with ordinary sprinkling cans over the top of the grain.

The second mixture recommended is one part carbon disulfide (highlife) and four part carbon tetrachloride. Again, six gallons of the mixture will fumigate 1,000 bushels of grain. Pour it in shallow pans and place around the bin— it will evaporate and the fumes soak through the grain.

"Weevil control is important", Dr. Johnston concludes, "not only from a grain-saving standpoint, but to protect your stored wheat if it is under government loan. August is a good month to get started on this important job."





No reduction in subsistence will be made as long as income from productive labor and subsistence allowance do not exceed spring: (1) \$210 for a veteran without de-G-I term insurance taken out by pendents; (2) \$270 for a veteran with more than one dependent.

This does not mean that there is a limit on what a veteran may earn while attending college fulltime. It does mean that a veteranstudent may receive his full subsistence allowance if his monthly earnings are not more than \$135 if he has no dependents, \$165 if he has one dependent, and \$270 if

he has more than one dependent. For full-time training in colleges or universities, a veteran may receive \$75 a month subsistence if has no dependents, \$105 a month if he has one dependent, and \$120 a month if he has more than one dependent.


