The body of Pfc. Richard F. Albus, Army, son of Mr. John N. Albus of Rhineland, was due to arrive at New York at the end of March on board the U.S. Army Transport Robert F. Burns. Pfc. Albus gave his life in the struggle for the liberation of Europe. His body was removed from the

U. S. Cemetery at Epinal, France. Two transports, the Burns and the John L. McCarley, are bringing 5,342 Americans home from European cemeteries.

The Burns, carrying 2,723 remains, including 128 for Texas, is due at New York about April 1. The McCarley is scheduled to arrive from Cherbourg about April for kin residing in Texas.

#### WARM WEATHER FIRE HAZARDS

Fire loss in this country is naturally at its peak during the winter, when heating plants are being used to the limit. But the approach of the warm season brings special and very dangerous hazards.

Many homes and businesses have been destroyed because the grass wasn't cut on adjoining vacant property and caught fire. Every community should have a suitable law in this regard and enforce it strictly and impartially.

Carelessness in burning rubbish during dry days takes its share of the toll. Such fires should never be left unattended. And some means of controlling or quenching them if they threaten to get out of hand should be immediately available.

Spring and summer will witness a tremendous increase in tourist travel through the rural and timbered country. Millions of acres of splendid timber have gone up in smoke, leaving nothing but an ugly, scarred landscape as a memorial, because people have thrown burning matches and cigarettes from cars, and because campers haven't made absolutely sure that their fires were out before moving en. These crimes of carelessness are covered in the law-but police and forest service officials can't be everywhere. Fire prevention, in all its many phases, is up to the individual.

When spring clean-up time comes, do a real and thorough job of it. Get rid of the junk and the refuse. A clean house and clean premises mean Fire prevention.



### State Cleanup Week Is Set For April 4 to 10

Austin-Marvin Hall hopes that every Texas housewife will do spring house cleaning.

The State Fire Insurance Commissioner suggests that a good time for this annual job is during Spring Clean-up Week, April 4-10. Not interested in the back-

breaking drugery of cleaning woodwork and windows, he was most concerned with the cleaning of floors. "Gasoline was not made to clean floors; it was made to run motor cars," Hall stated. "Many housewives are killed each year from using gasoline for cleaning purposes. A commercial cleaner does the job quicker, easier and much safer."

The Commissioner also warned against using gasoline for cleaning spots off winter clothes before they are stored away for the summer. He urged housewives to throw away any containers of gasoline on the premise.

"Oily polishing and cleaning rags should be stored in a tight metal container when they are not in use," Hall recommended. "When all the polishing is completed, these rags should be thrown away or again stored in air-tight non-inflammable containers.'

If you are planning to have your house painted, Commissioner Hall urges you to be careful with paint rags. Paint-smuged rags should be kept in tight metal containers as they, like oily rags, are subject to self-ignition.

Hall says that if you are also planning to have your house papered, that would be a good time to check your electric wining.







WE LOOK upon Means Jobs - steel as being the leader of our manufacturing industries. Steel is basic. It supplies the raw materials and semi-processed materials which are the chief need of manufacturing plants today. Our daily lives are conditioned by the place of steel in modern civilization. This is one reason why we should be concerned by the decline in profits shown by the steel industry.

Why would the agitators like profits to be less? They would like to see government "take over" any of our major indus-tries. That would bring them a step nearer their goal: "taking over." How has the profit of steel and other industries, despite big increases in sales, been kept so low? The main reasons: enormous operating costs and heavy taxation. Only a very large and efficiently managed industry could operate successfully under these conditions.

Steel, like other industries, requires constant reinvestment of new funds. Moreover, a large portion of profits have to be returned to the business. In 1946, when net income was 5.5 cents per dollar of sales, about 2.5 cents was put back in the steel business. This left only 3 cents to be given to the owners and investors. It is easy to see that if industry is not allowed to make profits, our business cannot continue to make goods we need and offer jobs for all. Adequate prof-
