- Secretary of Commerce Sawyer has indicated that he will urge President Truman to recommend repeal of the war-time excise taxes. The secretary is quoted as saying, "There is no doubt that repeal would be an incentive to business."

That is a highly encouraging statement, coming as it does from an official of Cabinet rank. The excise taxes were strictly emergency measures. They were designed to curtail production of so-called non-esentials during the war, not only to raise revenue. A similar tax was also placed on train, plane and bus tickets, in order to discourage avoidable travel, and is still in effect. These taxes apply to goods and services which aren't considered luxuries by millions of Americans. Cosmetics, leather goods, furs and similar items are used by most of us, and are necessities in many cases. Travel is also a necesity, for reasons of business, health and recreation. This country pirdes itself on high living standards, and the excise taxes definitely harm those standards.
