





Mooseheart, Ill., the famed Child City owned and operated by the Loyal Order of Moose for children of its deceased members, became the recipient recently of a \$100,000 fortune, bequeathed by the late Herman J. Englehard, 78, a painter and decorator, of Chicago, Ill. Mr. Englehard was well known in his own communty for his kindness to and love for little children. Although not himself a member of the Moose fraternity, he chose Mooseheart as the beneficiary of all the money he had saved as a hard working laboring man because, as he told his attorney prior to his death, "I want to help little children." Mooseheart is both a school and home for nearly 1,000 children. It is an entire city in itself, with 150 buildings spread over 1,200 acres of lush farm land in the picturesque Fox River Valley, 35 miles west of Chicago. Nursery, elementary and high school education plus a trade are provided to the students. Mr. Englehard's humanitarian gesture is saddened by the fact that he met a tragic death. He was found fatally beaten in his home by an unidentified assailant. The Supreme Council of the Loyal Order of Moose has offered \$5,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of Mr. Englehard's slayer.
