### GRASS BECOMES HUMAN FOOD

Something like one-ahlf the total land area of the nation-nearly one billion acres-is in range land and pasture. Most of these would be almost entirely unproductive if it were not for livestock growing. The meat animals consume the grass which the range lands produce, and so, althrough the alchemy of nature, this otherwise useless grass becomes steaks and chops and roasts and the rest of the meats we buy.

Here is a particularly striking example of the livestock industry's contribution to the country. And, in addition, the animals consume approximately 85 percent of all our grain crops. Millions of tons of commercial by-products, such as sugarbeet pulp and oil-seed cake go to them.

The point is that livestock growing helps the whole nation by converting products, that would otherwise go to waste, into food for people, by restoration of the soil and in various other ways. Finally, when meat animals are processed in the packing houses, they provide a long list of valuable by-products, made of horns and hoofs and hair and other inedible commodities, in addition to the meat.

Looking at the matter from the viewpoint of farmer or rancher, meat animals constitute agriculture's largest single source of cash income. The market is always there, day in and day out, ready to pay the going price. The livestock industry benefits everyone.

### THREE FEET OF SPACE

The president of a retail association whose membership includes stores in all parts of this country and Canada recently said that the three ft. of space between the customer in front of the store counter and the retail clerk behind is the most important space in the country today. The maximum sale of consumers' goods, he added, is necessary to full employment.





### Plan For Range **Deferment Now**

period to regain their vigor and cutting permits summer season to allow them to produce a seed ing and treatment can then fol crop. Now is the time to make low in the late summer or early plans for carrying out deferred fall. Chemical treatment will grazing practices for this year, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

The length of the deferment may vary from two to six months or longer depending on the rainfall, condition of the range and the kinds of grasses in the pasture. In areas of high rainfall where grasses get coarse and lose their nutrients upon maturity, a spring rest for vigor and a fall rest for seed production is best, says Walker. In north and west Texas where grasses cure well, a six months rest from May to November may be advisable.

He points out that many ranchers were surprised at the amount of grass that came back on their deferred pastures. Excellent moisture and good growing condition last year were contributing factors and many ranchmen found tall growing grasses in their deferred pastures that they had never seen before. The explanation, says Walker, the grasses never had a chance to grow up before heavy grazing got them.

More operators, he adds, are finding that there is a dollars and cents angle tied in with the deferred grazing practice and cites as an example the case of Mason county ranchman, Elwood Kothmann, Kothmann, he says, has rested one pasture for three years during the growing season from May to November and has grazed it during the winter months. Last year this pasture produced 41 pounds of beef per acre on an annual basis and did it in just six months of grazing and Walker adds the grass is early waist high.

Walker suggests that you make plans to defer at least one pasture on the ranch this year. He says demonstrators have proved that deferred grazing is also a very effective aid in

This is the story of a historic bell, told by Harry Putnam of the Cuero Record:

The bell originally was used in the steamer Reliance to sound the hours and to herald the approach of the little vessel into the harbor. It was in the summer of 1856 that the Reliance glided into the port of Indianola, then a striving city on the Gulf coast of Texas. That night a fire broke out aboard the ship and it was destroyed, the bell going down with the charred hulk.

Lutheran Church. In 1864, three Union gunboats bombarded Indianola and captured the city. Supplies were seized and soldiers climbed into the belfry and tossed the bell to the ground. Then it was carried to the beach to be shipped north to be made into bullets.

But, that night, members of the congregation, after obtaining permission from their pastor, slipped down to the beach, loaded the bell on a wheelbarrow, pushed it to a wagon and, after a journey, it was buried under the sand.

A terrible storm swept down on Indianola in 1875 and, when a second disaster struck in 1886. the survivors decided to move inland and Indianola was abandoned. Many went to Cuero and when the Lutheran congregation built a church and it was found there was not enough money with which to buy a bell George Wasserman told of helping to bury the bell 25 years before and offered to act as guide in its recovery. He led a party to the spot and the bell was dug up, and found to be only slightly tarnished.

It was placed in the steeple of St. Mark's Church, where it remained until 1894 when a member presented the church with a larger bell and the old one was used by the Cuero volunteer fire department. New equipment was installed in 1913 and the bell was consigned to the scrap

Here it was discovered, some years later, by Joe Pannen, a member of the congregation. At his suggestion it was returned to the church as a gift and the old bell now hangs in the steeple of the handsome Saint Mark's Lutheran Church.



Immigration officials and State Department officials refused to tell our Committee why they were going to deport Mrs. Knauff. On Monday we had Mrs. Knauff brought before our Committee. In the presence of the Chief Counsel for the Immigration Service and State De partment officials, she made an excellent witness in her own behalf. We asked them to question her and they refused. They again refused to disclose the nature of the charges against her. Our Committee cannot compel these government officials to testify and we have no way of

securing testimony detrimental to Mrs. Knauff. We therefore reported out her bill and expect to pass it through the Congress unless these officials who claim they know something, will come before our committee and talk. We have offered to let them testify off the record in Executive Session. This means their testimony would be confidential.

Two cases were argued before the Supreme Court this week which may make history. One was the Henderson case. In this case, a negro has asked the Supreme Court to outlaw "separate Munday, Texas though equal facilities" doctrine. The second is the famous Sweatt case from Texas. This is the case in which a negro seeks to enter/the University of Texas law school. The courtroom was filled with negroes. Able negro lawyers supported by the Department of Justice are asking the Court to hold that "separation is discrimination" and violates the 14th amendment. These negroes contend that if he University of Texas had a negro law school on one side of the street and a white law school on the other side of the street, even though the negro school had better buildings and a better faculty, the mere fact that negroes were excluded from the white law school would be a violation of the law. They are asking the Supreme Court to overrule Texas laws and the decisions of Texas Courts. If the Supreme Court decides these cases in behalf of the negroes, then all segregation of races anywhere in the United States becomes illegal.

These cases grow out of hypocritical politics. They are exceedingly dangerous. Politicians in the government have succeeded in outlawing segregation in the armed forces; they have outlawed segregation in public housing; and the Department of the Interior has just announced that beginning season all of the swimming pools under their supervision will be operated on a non-segregation basis. This week, too, the Armed Services have lifted the quota provisions against negro enlist-
