

that a strong, healthy man working at a capstan -the sort of treadmill still used in some primitive areas of the world for converting human energy into mechanical power-could develop about one-tenth horsepower for an eight-hour day. On that basis it would cost about \$10 for each horsepower hour of power development by man labor, assuming a wage of a dollar an hour.

"It would be totally impossible, of course, in this day and age to meet the needs of food production with that kind of power at such a price." Mr. Childers went on to point out that each farm worker had 2.2 horsepower at his command in 1900, 5.2 horsepower in 1920, and 33 horsepower in 1950. And the figure is higher still today.

This is why a relatively small proportion of our people, working on the land, can meet all our needs for farm products and satisfy a heavy foreign demand at the same time. Machinery and power have made that possible.

IN TIMES OF CHANGE

Some time ago a retailing association appointed a committee to study what retailers can do to help in the transition from a semi-war economy to a peace economy, if and when world conditions improve sufficiently to make heavy reductions in military spending possible.

No one can doubt that retailing's role in such a transition would be an all-important one. Most of our spendable income passes across the counters of retail establishments of one kind or another. Retailing is one of our biggest employers. And retailing is the link between factory and farm and the American home.

It is equally certain that retailing is well-equipped to make major contributions to the national welfare and to economic stability in times of stress and change. There is nothing like our system of distribution elsewhere on this earth. In no other country are consumers, in great cities and little villages alike, offered goods in such vast quantity, at prices which are held to the minimum by free competition.





Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-Don't put too much stock in advertised claims for the bug-killing properties of socalled "vaporizers," State Health Officer George W. Cox cautioned Texans today.

He said "indiscriminate use" of the gadgets in homes or sleeping quarters could make the fumes more toxic to humans than to insects.

Vaporizers are familiar as small glass or metal instruments with a conical-shaped insecticide container in the top and a light bulb wired into the bottom. The insecticide is placed in the cone and vaporized by the heat generated by the bulb underneath.



Social Security Benefits Paid To 108 Knox People

Social security payments totaling \$3,180 went to 108 people in Knox County in December 1952, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

The men and women 65 or over who had worked long enough to qualify for old-age insurance benefits made up the largest group of beneficiaries and received larger amounts than dependents and survivors. Numbering 46, they received \$1,-701 for the month. Most of them vere from 65 to 74 and received payments after meeting the test of retirement given in the law; those 75 or over could receive ple, on earnings up to \$3,600 a payments even though they were year. The tax is now 11/2 per cent

In the smaller groups, 28 aged widows, dependent widowers, wives and dependent husbands received \$635. Not all of the people in Knox County entitled to payments were 65 or older. Monthly checks went to 34 mothers and children—some of them dependents of retired men, but most of them survivors of those who had died. The payments to the mothers and children amounted to \$844.

In the Nation at the end of December, monthly payments amounting to \$205,179,000 were being made to 5,025,500 people. Among them, according to Tate, were 2 out of 5 of the retired age. About 80 per cent of civilian jobs are covered by the law; 4 out of 5 of the mothers and children in the country can count on monthly survivors insurance payments in case of the death of the family breadwinner, Tate emphasiz-

Changes made by the 1950 and 1952 amendments to the Social Security Act accounted for a considerable part of the increases, both in the number of people receiving benefits and in the amounts of their payments. In 1950 the law was changed to include millions of people not covered before, and to make it easier for them to qualify for payments. Among those newly covered were self-employed people and regularly employed house-

In addition to the initial and maintenance allowances, the law also provides for payment of \$100 each time a reserve officer scheduled to increase to 2% each enters or re-enters active duty for employee and employer, and for 91 days or more on or after 3% for self-employed people on June 25, 1950, providing no uniform allowance has been received in the preceding two years.
