Especially since the showers of the week end. These came in about three relays—Friday, Saturday and early Sunday morning—bringing a total of .88 of an inch here in Munday, which isn't a big lot but enough to help a lot right at this stage of the game.

Coming as it did, the rain will cause very little replanting in the immediate Munday area. We can't say to much for an area from Weinert to Haskell, however, where the rainfall ranged to three inches and upwards and flooded low places in the fields.

The moisture has boosted the wheat crop, we think. We heard that a local citizen said last week that since the wheat is headed and on its way toward filling out, a rain wouldn't particularly help it. "Just the same," we says, "if we had a wheat crop a rain would be plumb welcome."

Better to come now than a few weeks later, when harvest time is nearing. This is a time that we nearly always have rain.

Wheat fields are very beautiful right at this period, and the sight is made more attractive to the eye when the wind blows, sending great waves through the fields of headed grain.

Someone remarked the other day that we were right in the garden spot of the area—but you don't have to go very far in any direction, he concluded, until you find it not so good. Kinda bears out what we've been saying about conditions to the north and northwest, where we've traveled recently.

The 'tater crop seems to be coming along nicely, too, and the showers of the week end didn't do this crop no harm, either. Of course, we realize that with irrigation, potatoes can be given water most any time they need it, but farmers welcome an opportunity to shut off those wells for a spell.

A number of other vegetables are being grown locally this year, and these will contribute greatly to the success of the area's first vegetable festival, which will be staged here on June 22.

It's interesting, too, that quite a few more cantaloupes are being grown this year. Most of the growers, we believe, have an established market for them at planting time. They learned the hard way a few years back that you can't pickle around with these melons. They're ready today, and too ripe tomorrow!

We learned this week that our former postmaster, Lee Haynes, has given up farming. For several years, he has farmed that lot just to the east of his home, planting it in cotton, and for which he had a cotton allotment. He stated that he turned all of his allotment back to the government this year, and has quit. The reason: The lot has been sold, and the Jeff Anderson's are building a home on it.

B. O. Norvill told us, too, that he planted his corn patches in wheat this year. He said he almost made a complete failure last year and allowed as how he'd put too much Munday water into the soil.

And it would appear that it's left up to Wally Park to prove (or disprove) that peas won't make when planted in the dark of the moon. We stated a few weeks ago that we were in with him on this project, but our planting failed to come up to a stand. Seems that we're another "city farmer" who needs to quit the business!

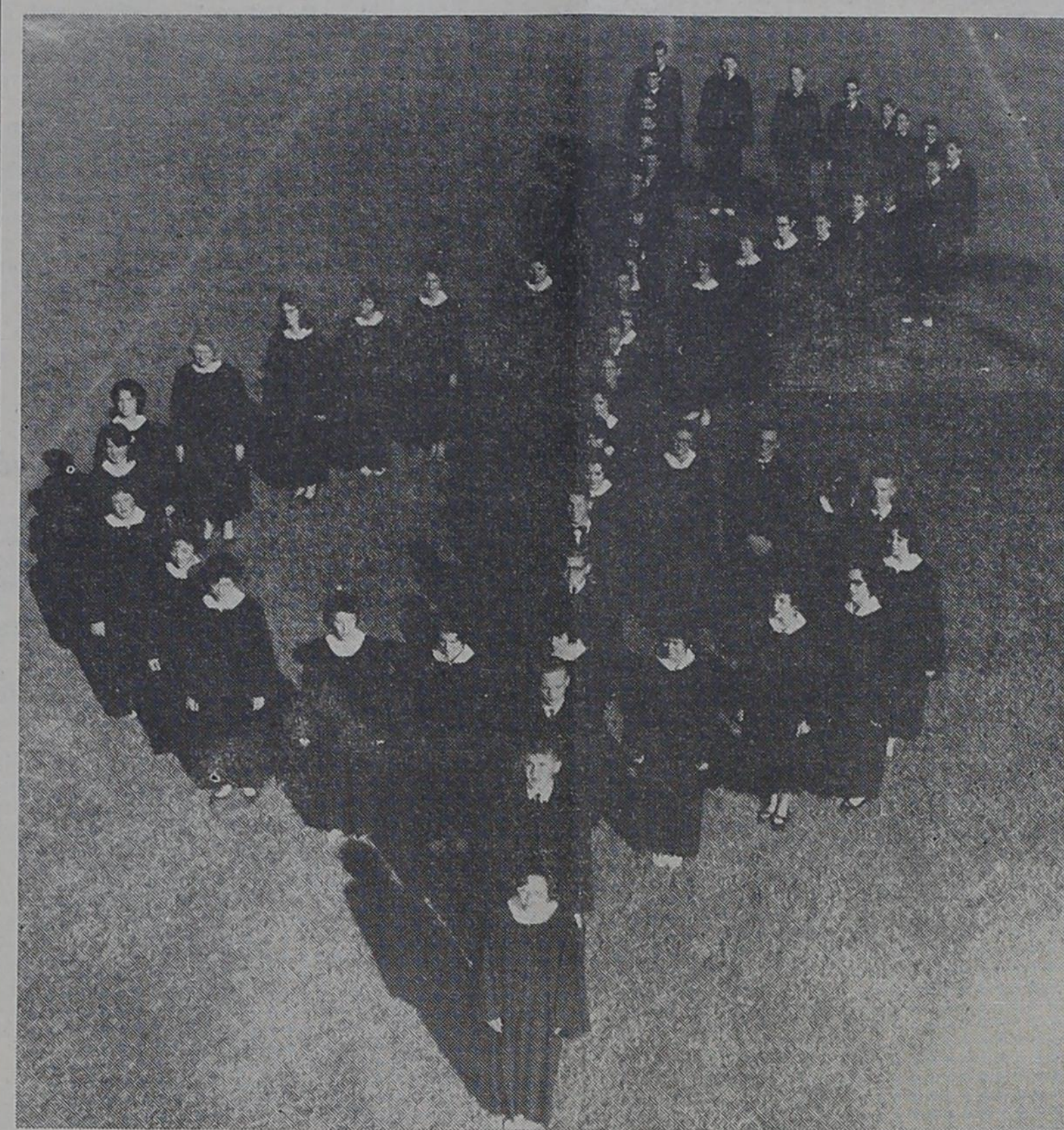
