


If the farm has a feed grain base, the farm operator will be land out of unneeded feed grain production and shifting it to conservation uses.

"We're encouraging feed grain farmers to look into the advantages to be gained by taking part in the 1964 feed grain program," the Chairman declared. "There are definite advantages to farm owners and operators in putting crop acres into conserving uses under the feed grain program instead of turnsupplies.

"We've made good progress in the past few years in trying to cut back production of the feed grains so that our stocks will be in better balance with demand, continuation of the feed grain They were brought to the Knox diversion program for 1964 and

> "While the signup will not be held until early next year, the main provisions of the 1964 program have already been announced. A farm operator can participate by diverting from 20 to 50 per cent of his farm's feed grain base, with higher rates of payment for diversion greater than the minimum. And of course eligibility for price support on corn, grain sorghum, and barley depends on participation in the feed grain program."
