Notaries Public Due To Qualify

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring reappointment for the new term ending June 30, 1963 must requalify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

The required fee \$4.00 together with notary bond and oath must be filed in the office of the County Clerk, between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Guidance Counselor Named For Training

Mrs. Mary Alice Taylor, Knox County school supervisor of the guidance, counseling, and testing program, has been selected as one of the 30 who are eligible for enrollment in the counseling and guidance training institute to be conducted by Texas Technological College this summer.

This is an institute for school counselors sponsored by the Departments of Education and Psychology in collaboration with the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare under the 1958 National Defense Education Act.

Emphasis will be upon counseling under supervision and integration of the counseling and guidance program into the total curriculum.

Gene Brown, also of Munday, was elected to take his place.

Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1963 in Knox County totaled \$77,314. Of this amount \$19,339 were purchased in March according to a report released by W. E. Braly, Chairman of the County Savings Bonds Committee. This brings the sales during the first three months to 43 per cent of the year's quota.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1963 amounted to \$15,387,951, which represents 26.7% of the state goal of \$150,600,000.

Texas' Future Water Needs



U. S. SENATORS RALPH W. YARBOROUGH of Texas, left, and Clinton B. Anderson of New Mexico, co-authors of a bill passed by the Senate to help establish water research centers at state universities and land-grant colleges, study a chart on Texas' future water needs. The chart shows Texas population of 10 million will go up to 22 million by the year 2010; available jobs will rise from 3.5 to 8.5 million, and personal annual gross income from \$14.5 to \$64 billion. "While Texas needed only 2 million acre feet of water in 1958 for city and industrial use," Senator Yarborough said, "by the year 2010 more than 12 million acre feet will be required. Research can help provide more water at less cost. A total of \$563 million is to be spent on Texas for 30 major new reservoirs by 1975. We need to do more research and develop experts in Texas on Texas water needs."

Munday Man Named W.T.U. Manager Of Spur Office; To Assume Duties Soon

A new local manager for West Texas Utilities' Spur office was announced today by Russell Crowder, district manager. J. B. Scott of Munday will replace Ronald Carothers who resigned recently.

Scott, who is one of Munday's leading civic workers, is a veteran in the electric utility service business with more than 28 years of experience. He joined the W.T.U. service department in Munday in 1951 and previously had had 16 years of experience working for the City of Seymour and the REA.

In making the announcement Crowder said, "We are very happy that we can bring to Spur our local manager a man with as much utility experience as Mr. Scott has and one who has such an outstanding record of civic work and leadership in Munday."

In Munday, Scott has served on the school board for more than 8 years. He has been a member of the Volunteer Fire Department for the past 26 years and is currently Secretary-Treasurer of the West Texas Fireman and Fire Marshalls Association. He has also served as president of that association. Scott was recently re-elected to the Munday city council, where he has already served for more than 6 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Scott are Methodists and he is presently chairman of the Board of Stewards of the First Methodist Church in Munday.

Bob Curry Dies of Injuries In Auto Accident; Funeral Held Here Tuesday

Funeral services for Robert Dea (Bob) Curry, 18, Munday high school senior and all-district football tackle who was injured in a traffic accident near here Sunday, were held at 10 a.m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church in Munday.

Rev. Rex L. Mauldin, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Munday officiated. A second service was held at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church in Tahoka with the pastor, Rev. D. W. Copeland, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery with McCauley Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Curry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Odie Curry, died at 8:30 a.m. Monday in the Knox County Hospital. He underwent surgery at the hospital Sunday afternoon after a Wichita Falls surgeon landed his plane on a roadway near Knox City when he found

the landing strip partially covered with water.

Curry was a passenger in a car driven by Jack Morrow, 17, of Munday, who lost control of the vehicle after passing another car on State Highway 222, 1½ miles west of Munday. A third passenger, Paul Reed, 17, received a mild concussion in the accident. Morrow was treated at the hospital and released.

The youths were reportedly enroute to Knox City to pick up Curry's mother, who is employed at the hospital and was due off work at 3 p.m.

Born April 8, 1945, in Tahoka, Curry moved to Munday in 1961. Besides his football activities, he had been a member of the Future Farmers of America two years and was voted "Mr. Personality" during his senior year. He would have graduated in two weeks.

Survivors include his parents; three sisters, Mrs. Jesse Barnett of Abilene, Mrs. Robert Kukulka of Pharr, and Mrs. Jennie McCullough of Harlingen; and his grandmother, Mrs. Wiley Curry of Tahoka.

Serving as pallbearers were Edwin Wilde, Bruce Pruitt, Ronnie Hardin, Ricky Couch, Roy Perez, Douglas McGrady, James Earp and Jackie Miller, all senior football players. Honorary pallbearers were Coaches Wayne Bingham and Doyle Lowrance, and other members of the football team.

Dear editor:
As I understand it, some professional football players have been caught betting on football games they've played in themselves and as a result have been suspended. They can't play for at least a year, maybe longer. It's just against the rules to bet on yourself.

Now at first glance this doesn't seem too important as far as me and my Johnson grass far are concerned, but then I got to thinking. What if somebody in Washington for example comes out with a rule against betting on yourself in farming? There'd be more suspended farmers than you could count.

First, when a farmer starts a new year, he bets on the weather's being normal, whereas I have never seen a normal weather year over once or twice in my lifetime.

The odds against dry weather when you want it, rain when you want it, the right temperature when you want it, are so great that most farmers are incapable of carrying a bet alone on the sport and usually invite a banker to pitch in with them.

Then of course there's the matter of insects, and since there are so many millions more insects than farmers, you can see what the odds are there. It almost fails to be a sporting event.

FARM and RANCH Notes

Cotton producers should begin checking their cotton for thrips. These small, yellowish snake-like insects, commonly known as "oat mites" have rasping, sucking mouthparts and can cause considerable damage to cotton. They retard development of the plants by rasping the leaves and sucking the sap. Since the leaf is the manufacturing part of the plant, this causes the stunting. When thrip are causing damage, one of the following chemicals will give good results on thrip as well as overwintered boll weevils. The dosage is given in actual insecticides to be applied per acre.

Dieldrin-DDT, 2.0 lb. to .5; Guthion .125 to .25; Strobane-DDT, 1.25 lb. to .25 lb.; Sevin .5 to 1.0 lb.; Toxaphene-DDT, 1.25 lb. to 2.25 lb.; Heptachlor-DDT, .25 lb. to .5 lb.; Endin-DDT, .2 lb. to .5 lb.

Producers should be sure their sprayers are putting out the correct amount and that nozzles are not clogged. Equally effective control has been obtained in tests using 2 gallons of total material per acre as compared with six and 14 per acre if the same amount of insecticide is applied.
