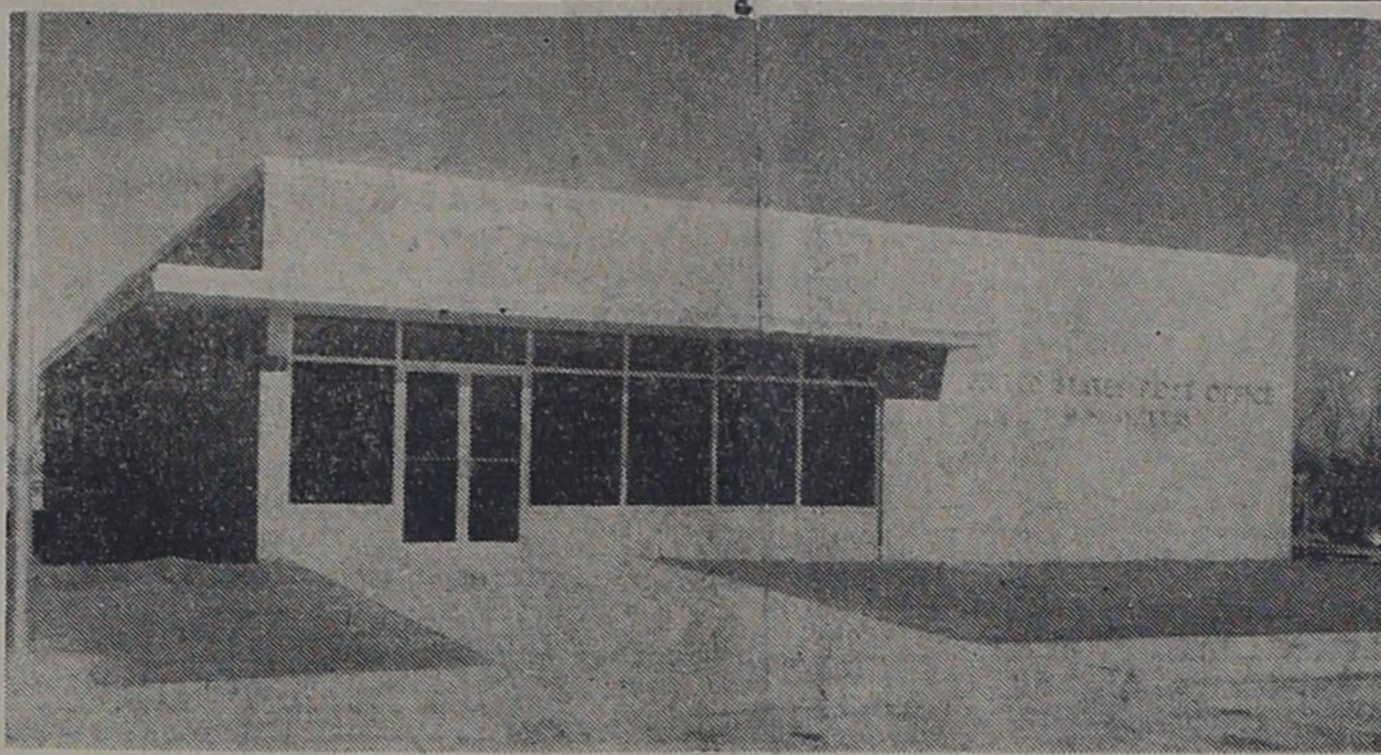
Lee Bowden is in charge of arranging for setting up tables. The Methodist Men's Club is furnishing the meat dish.

### Motorists Urged To Have Vehicle Safety Checks Early

"Our weather is getting worse all the time and April 15 will come before you know it," Captain Alan Johnson, Texas Department of Public Safety Supervisor, commented this week.

He was talking about the time left for Texas motorists to get 1963 vehicle safety inspections. The seven and one-half month period for getting inspections is more than half finished. Inspections started September 1 and will continue through April 15.

Since the period is so long, Johnson stated, no allowances are made for bad weather. He pointed out that inspections may not be made when streets are wet. "From now until April 15, we usually have a seige of bad weather in this part of the state which eliminates many inspection days," Captain Johnson said.

He also pointed out that inspection of vehicles now will insure that they are safer for the rest of the winter driving period, when good lights, brakes and other equipment are so vital. Failure to have a 1963 inspection sticker displayed on the windshield of your vehicle after April 15 is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

### Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

#### Livestock Show

4-H and FFA members of Knox County are making final preparations for the annual Junior Livestock Show, to be held Saturday, January 12, at Knox City. Entry fees will be charged this year for the first time, and will be as follows:

50 cents for each cattle entry and 25 cents for each entry in sheep, hogs and chickens. Entry fees will be collected the morning of the show. Animals must be in their stall or pen by 9:30 a.m.

Judging will proceed as follows: Lambs, 1:30; fat borrows, gilts and boars, 1:45, and steers at 3:15.

An auction sale will be held for the grand and reserve champion steers, fat lambs, fat hogs and broilers. The winning contestants have the option of withdrawing if they so desire. In that case, the next animal in line will be eligible for sale.

In the swine classes, boars and gilts must be four months old, or older, to be eligible for showing. Feeder pigs will weigh from 125 to 175 pounds, and fat barrows 175 to 240.

In the poultry classes, two hens and a rooster of one breed will constitute a class. A pen of five broilers will also constitute a class. Poultry exhibitors must furnish their own coops. All bedding will be furnished by exhibitors.

#### Screwworm Barrier Extended

Officials of the southwest screwworm eradication program have announced that the artificial barrier of sterile screwworm flies along the international border in Mexico has been extended to Laredo to above Del Rio. A 25-mile strip from Brownsville to Laredo has been seeded with sterile flies since early last month.

The barrier zone, which is eventually expected to extend from Brownsville to the New Mexico-Arizona state line, is designed to prevent the migration of native screwworm flies from Mexico into the southwest. A weekly average of 600 sterile flies per square mile is being dispersed in the 13,000 square mile barrier at the present time.

The recent freezing temperatures made many people uncomfortable, but officials have stated that weather of this nature will do much toward wiping out native screwworm fly populations; and, thereby, make eradication through fly release easier. During the week of December 9-15, only 311 screwworm specimens were submitted to Mission for identification, and 525 additional cases without samples were reported. During the same week, 64,290,650 sterile flies were dispersed in the southwest.

I would like to again remind each of you that our bulletins are available in the lobby of the First National Bank in Munday and the Citizens State Bank in Knox City. We will have the farmers tax guide on these racks as soon as it becomes available.

**Why Should Christians Try To Change Others?**

Many who are not converted to Christ ask the believer why he doesn't live the Christian life and let everybody else alone. Of course, no Christian should try to force others to agree with him. We believe in religious liberty and the right of each individual to worship God or not to worship without being molested. However, the Christian religion is basically evangelistic. Jesus commanded his disciples in every age to: "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:19-20)

The early church was intensely evangelistic. On the day of Pentecost Peter not only told the people who had helped to crucify Jesus to "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of your sins..." but he testified and exhorted them with many other words saying, "Save yourselves from this crooked generation" (Acts 2).

When the early church was scattered abroad the members went about preaching the word. They would not be silenced even by threats and violence. So today, those who really believe that Jesus Christ is God's Son must bear witness to this to others or deny their Lord who commanded them to go and teach others. If believers really love their neighbors as themselves, they must share with their neighbors the greatest thing in the world, salvation in Christ and the hope of heaven. If Christians believe Jesus's words about a hell to be avoided and a heaven to be gained they are under obligation to tell others about the saviour.

This is a brief explanation why New Testament Christians cannot be content to enjoy their own faith and let the rest of the world go by. Their faith demands that they share it with others. They should do this in love and with meekness. But the true Christian must seek to win others to Christ.

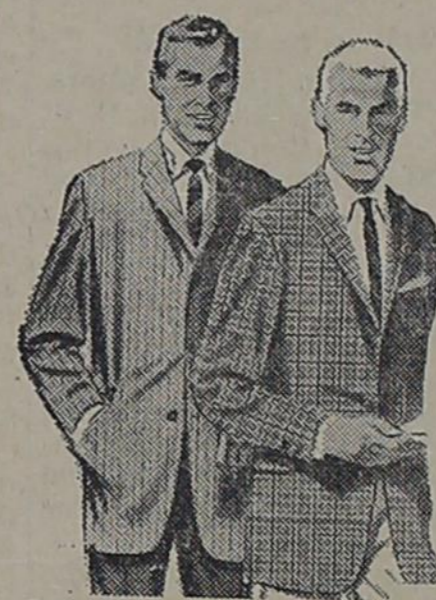

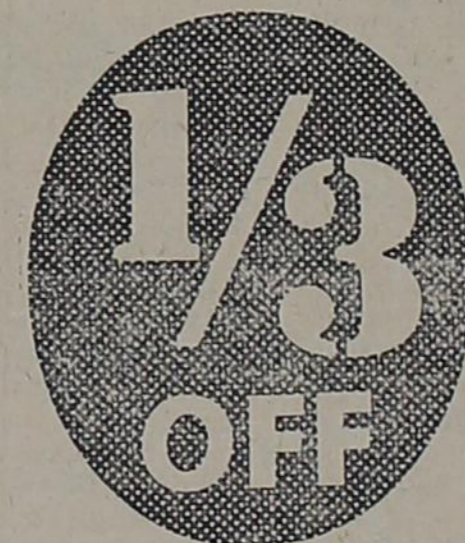
