We noticed some local people having to buy one-cent stamps Monday in order to utilize their stock of three-centers. You see, postage rates went up on Monday, and a three-cent stamp won't even send out a post card.

The new rates, 5 cents for first class letters and 4 cents for cards, 8 cents for airmail letters and 6 cents for airmail cards, are expected to add some \$459,000 annually to post office revenues. Some people allow as how they won't be writing quite as many letters. Except for business correspondence, the new rate won't effect us very much. We don't do much personal correspondence.

Newspapers also got an increase in postage rates. That four-bit raise in subscription price which we made last July was in anticipation of that increase—and now, the four-bits you pay won't pay for the increase in postage in mailing the paper to you for a full year. So we reckon we weren't very smart after all—or maybe we'd have charged a higher rate.

And Bill Bowley, who is in charge of the subscription department, says he sees no need for sending out three notices to let you know your subscription has expired. We're inclined to agree—and in the future you may receive only one notice—which will be a four-cent postcard. We hope our subscribers will be a little more prompt, and additional notices won't be necessary.

The increase in postage cost us two bucks extra on the first day. You see, we usually buy 100 stamps in each denomination, and this generally takes place twice a month, which means quite a lot of letter writing, bill sending and bill paying for a little business like ours.

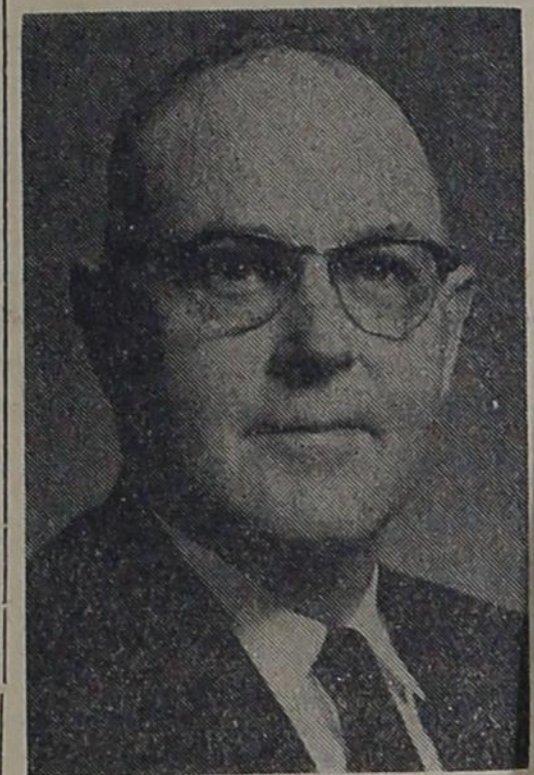

## Munday's New Post Office Building To Be Dedicated At 2:30 p.m. Saturday

Munday's new post office building, which was recently completed on the corner of Ninth and G Streets, will be officially dedicated in ceremonies at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, January 12, it has been announced by Chan Hughes, postmaster.

The Munday Chamber of Commerce is cooperating with the post office employees in the dedication ceremonies, which will be held at the post office site if weather permits. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to attend.



W. M. McMillan, regional director of the Dallas region, Post Office Department, will be principal speaker. Other postal officials, along with the senator and congressman for this district, have been invited.

The program will feature the Munday High School Band, under the direction of Bobby Brooks, band director. Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts of Munday will also have a part in the program.

Following the dedication ceremony, open house will be held in order that the public may inspect the new facilities.

Professor Richard C. C. Kim will speak to the First Baptist Brotherhood Tuesday night, January 15. This being ladies' night, all ladies of the church are invited.

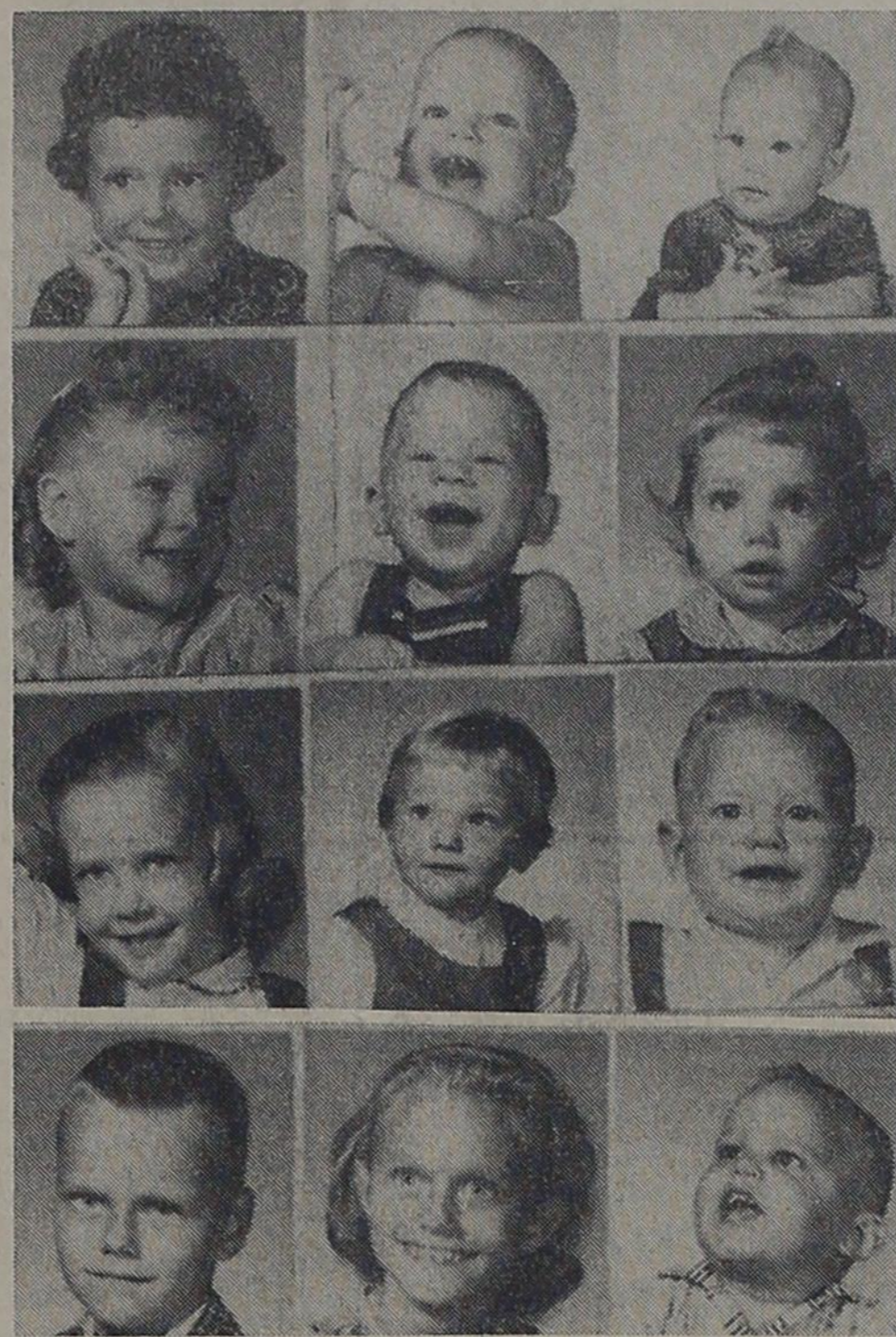

## Service Officer Is Commended For His Aid To Knox County's Veterans

Charles L. Morris, executive director of Veterans Affairs Commission at Austin, recently wrote a letter commending Clarence S. Woodward, veterans service officer of Knox County, for his services to veterans. The letter follows:

During the past year, \$149,489.00 was paid to veterans and their families in your county. Please bear in mind that this amount represents only the cases that were handled through the Veterans Affairs Commission and the organizations with which we are organized.

"We realize that none of these benefits were automatic in any sense of the word. The benefits that are available to disabled veterans and their families from the State and Federal governments must be applied for. The size of the awards indicates that you have done an outstanding job of assisting the claimants in your county in making proper application, and, in most instances, you are the one who developed the claims in order that payments might be made.

"We feel that the counties can make no better investment than to maintain a competent Service Officer such as you to provide the deserving veterans with the kind of aid which they would receive from a grateful community which they served during time of war.

"It has been a pleasure to work with you this past year and we wish to commend you for rendering such valuable service to the veterans, their dependents and their survivors, as evidenced by the records in this office."

Mr. Woodward explained that the amount paid to veterans last year represents \$108,000 more than in any previous year.

## Livestock Show Set For Saturday

4-H and FFA members from Knox County are making final preparations for the Annual Junior Livestock Show to be held Saturday, January 12 in Knox City. Entry fees will be charged this year for the first time and will be as follows: 50 cents for each cattle entry and 25 cents for each entry in sheep, hogs and chickens. Entry fees will be collected the morning of the show. Animals must be in their stall or pen by 9:30 a.m.

Judging will proceed as follows: Lambs, 1:30, Fat Barrows, Gilts and Boar, 1:45, and Steers at 3:15.

An auction sale will be held for the grand and reserve champion steers, fat lambs, fat hogs and

broilers. The winning contestants have the option of withdrawing if they so desire. In that case, the next animal in line will be eligible for the sale.

In the swine classes, boars and gilts must be 4 months or older to be eligible for showing. Feeder pigs will weigh from 125-175 lbs. and fat barrows 175-240 lbs.

In the poultry classes, 2 hens and a rooster of one breed will constitute a class. A pen of five broilers will also constitute a class. Poultry exhibitors must furnish their own coops.

All bedding will be furnished by exhibitors.

The show will be held in the first cotton warehouse south of Sam Leaverton elevator in Knox City. Go west from the south stop light across the railroad tracks and turn south. 4-H and FFA members from each school system will group their livestock together.

## Cotton Samples Come In Steadily

Samples were coming in steadily at the rate of 1,000 to 1,200 daily by the end of the week and 3,869 samples were classed during the week ending January 4th according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Munday, Texas.

Grades are running lower than at the last writing with 3 per cent Middling Light Spot, 32 per cent Strict Low Middling Light Spot, 5 per cent Low Middling, 16 per cent Low Middling Light Spot, 30 per cent Strict Low Middling Spot and 9 per cent Low Middling Spot.

Staple lengths ran 5 per cent 29/32, 70 per cent 15/16, 20 per cent 31/32, and 3 per cent 1 inch and longer.

73,931 samples have been classed to date.

Market activity remains slow with Strict Low Middling Light Spot 29/32 averaging 28.91; Strict Low Middling Light Spot 15/16, 29.45; and Strict Low Middling Light Spot 31/32, 29.95.

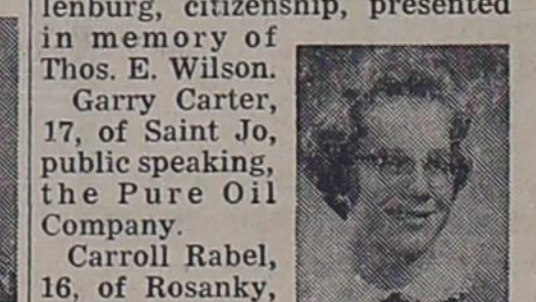
### BEST PROJECTS BRING TOP AWARDS TO LONE STAR STATE 4-H'ERS

CLYDE PATTON: AN APPRECIATION

(Delayed)
Clyde Patton, who passed to
his reward last week, lived here
nearly all his life and was en-
gaged in farming and the cattle
business. For twenty-four years
I have had occasion to observe
the man as a citizen and neigh-
bor. And since his death I have
heard his friends who knew him
much longer than I speak in the
highest terms of the man's char-
acter and his way of life. His
record here was above reproach.
He ate not the bread of idleness
but provided well for his house-
hold and his excellent though
bereaved family will "rise up and
call him blessed."

Like Moses of old, Clyde was
not fluent with his words, but he
possessed an eloquence far great-
er than if he had spoken "with
the tongues of men and angels."
He spoke with a blameless life,
with a generous and warm heart
for all mankind and a helping
hand for the needy. This is a
language far greater than any
man's mere words.

Wife and I have lived in
eighteen counties in Texas and
Oklahoma during my 38 years in
the ministry and have known
many wonderful friends and
neighbors, but none surpassed
Clyde Patton in his big-hearted-
ness and kind deeds. He would
sometimes stop at my sick room
and after having done many
things to help he would say, "if
you have something to be done
and if I can't do it I will get
somebody that can."

In holding the funeral of U. S.
Senator Kerr the other day the
minister said "heaven is all the
center by his going." Of course
Clyde Patton did not occupy as
large a sphere of service here as
the senator, but his reward will
be great and he too has heard
the welcome plaudit, "well done
thou good and faithful servant."

In my meditations today I
think of my good friend as being
with the angels—an inhabitant
of the celestial regions, and I an-
ticipate the time when I can clasp
that big generous hand under
skies that never become clouded,
amid landscapes where the frost
never falls, and beside silvery
streams that flow on forever.

Are All Believers Saved?

Many people accept a doctrine that all one has to do to be saved is to believe that Jesus
Christ is the Son of God. Is this the teaching of the Bible?

UNSAVED BELIEVERS

The Demons Believe
Numerous examples are recorded in the
Bible of those who became believers on
Christ yet were unsaved. James gave one
such example as he described the spiritual
condition of the demons: "Thou believest
that there is one God: thou doest well: the
devils also believe, and tremble" (James
2:19).

Believers Baptized

When Peter preached the first gospel sermon
on the day of Pentecost, thousands of Jews
became believers as the Word of God was
spoken. But they were unsaved believers for
they asked, "What shall we do?" Peter
answered these believers, "Repent and be
baptized every one of you in the name of
Jesus Christ . . ." (Acts 2:38).

Another Unsaved Believer

Saul of Tarsus became a believer in Christ
when the light of heaven blinded him on the
Damascus Road, but he was unsaved. This
believer asked Jesus, "What wilt thou have
me to do?" (Acts 9:6). The Lord answered,
"Arise, and go into the city and it shall be
told thee what thou must do" (Acts 9:6). The
Lord sent Ananias to tell him to . . . "arise
and be baptized and wash away thy sins"
(Acts 22:16). Thus, he could not have been
saved, even though he was a believer, for
he was yet in his sins.

Believers Deny Christ

John recorded the story of a group of Jews
who became believers in Jesus, yet they
would not confess Him (John 12:42). Jesus
said, "But whosoever shall deny me before
men, him will I deny before my father which
is in heaven." (Matthew 10:33). These ex-
amples prove conclusively that a person can
believe on Jesus Christ as the Son of God and
still be eternally lost.
These Bible examples enable us to see and
understand that some WERE BELIEVERS,
yet WERE NOT SAVED. We understand
also that those who were BELIEVERS
OBEDIENT to God's commands were justifi-
ed before Him. . . he (Christ) became
the author of eternal salvation unto all them
that OBEY him." (Hebrews 5:9).

SAVED BELIEVERS

There are also many examples of those who
became believers in Jesus who were saved
because their faith was active and working.
"For in Jesus Christ neither circumcision
availeth anything, nor uncircumcision, but
faith which worketh by love." (Galatians
5:6).

Christ's Last Words

When Christ made known the terms of sal-
vation He told his disciples, "Go ye into the
world, and preach the gospel to every creature.
He that believeth and is baptized shall
be saved; but he that believeth not shall be
damned." (Mark 16:15-16).

Believers in Samaria

"Then Philip went down to the city of
Samaria, and preached Christ unto them . . .
But when they believed Philip preaching the
things concerning the kingdom of God, and the
name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized,
both men and women." (Acts 8:5, 12).
These believers were obedient to the com-
mand of Christ to be baptized.

Simon Believes

Another example from the New Testament
is that of Simon, who, as a believer, obeyed
the Lord's command. "Then Simon himself
believed also; and when he was baptized, he
continued with Philip." (Acts 8:13).

Ethiopian Eunuch

The queen's treasurer, when returning from
Jerusalem, was joined by Philip who
"preached unto him Jesus," which resulted
in this man asking to be baptized. "And
Philip said, If thou believest with all thine
heart, thou mayest." The treasurer confessed
his faith in Christ and was baptized . . . and
went on his way rejoicing." (Acts 8:35-39).

Believers Have Power To Be Saved

The apostle John said, by inspiration, "But
as many as received him, to them gave he
power to become the sons of God, even to
them that believe on his name." (John 1:12).
Our Lord did not say that one becomes a
child of God by faith alone, but one who
DOES BELIEVE in Christ has POWER TO
BECOME God's child. His faith makes his
heart receptive to further commands of
Jesus to repent, to be baptized for the re-
mission of sins and to enjoy the blessing
of forgiveness.

### Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING ALL PERSONS, FIRMS, OR CORPORATIONS WHO NOW MAINTAIN AND OPERATE FILLING STATIONS OR GARAGES WHERE MOTOR VEHICLES ARE WASHED AND GREASED WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF MUNDAY, WHERE SUCH WATER IS TURNED INTO THE CITY SEWER SYSTEM, TO HAVE SAND, MUD AND GREASE TRAPS PROPERLY CONSTRUCTED TO PROHIBIT SUCH SAND, MUD, AND GREASE FROM GOING INTO THE SEWER LINES; AND PROVIDING FOR CONSTRUCTION, SIZE AND KIND OF SUCH SAND AND GREASE TRAPS SHALL BE CONSTRUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH PLANS AND DETAILS ATTACHED TO THIS ORDINANCE AND A COPY OF WHICH ARE ON FILE WITH THE CITY PLUMBING INSPECTOR; PROHIBITING THE DRAINAGE INTO THE SEWER LINES OF SAND AND GREASE FROM FILLING STATIONS, GARAGES, AND OTHER PLACES WHERE MOTOR VEHICLES ARE WASHED OR GREASED, TO PROHIBIT WATER, GREASE OR WASTE MATERIAL TO ESCAPE ON THE STREETS OR ALLEYS OF THE CITY OF MUNDAY, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE

CITY OF MUNDAY, TEXAS:  
 Section I. That all persons, firms, corporations, or their managers thereof, now operating filling stations, garages, and any other business where automobiles, trucks, or any type of motor vehicles are washed and greased, shall install and maintain adequate sand and grease traps, or improve and reconstruct existing sand and grease traps, whereby sand, mud, or grease shall not drain or flow into any sewer line within the City of MUNDAY.  
 Section II. All sand and grease traps now existing within the CITY OF MUNDAY shall be repaired and remodeled by the owner, operator, or manager thereof, and maintained in accordance with the details and dimensions hereinafter set out, and in accordance with such details given in the plans attached to this ordinance and a copy of which is on file in the office of the CITY PLUMBING INSPECTOR of the CITY OF MUNDAY.  
 Section III. All sand and grease traps hereafter constructed shall be of reinforced concrete with all walls, footing and top to be grate. The main tank of these traps shall have an inside measurement of four feet length and four feet width with a minimum depth of five feet six inches. The secondary tank of this unit shall have inside measurements of two feet length, four feet width and minimum depth of five feet six inches. The two tanks being separated by an intermediate wall, of six inches thickness, extending from

the floor slab to top slab or cover and being connected with one-fourth inch cast iron line through the baffle wall set at an angle as per plan. The outlet of the discharge line, from the secondary tank to the sanitary sewer line, shall have a flow line elevation set twelve inches above the floor. This line shall be constructed with a 45 degree long radius all extending upward from the secondary tank, a short section of pipe connecting with another 45 degree long radius ell reversing the direction of flow to the sanitary sewer line and a two inch vent pipe connected where discharge line connects to a line which has been properly vented. Other wise, a four inch vent will be required. A Cast iron frame and grate shall be placed in the top slab over the primary tank and the secondary tank provided with a stand cast iron frame and cover for a cleanout.  
 All dimensions and details for such sand and grease traps will be as per plan, on file in the office of the PLUMBING INSPECTOR of the CITY OF MUNDAY.  
 Section IV. Any persons, firms, corporation, or their managers thereof, now operating filling stations, garages, and any other business where automobiles, trucks, or any type of motor vehicles are washed and/or greased shall not permit water, grease or waste material to escape or run on the streets or alleys of the City of Munday.  
 Section V. Any person, firm, or corporation, not complying with the terms and provisions of this ordinance, or allowing sand, mud, or grease to drain into any sewer line within the City of Munday, or shall permit water, grease or waste material to escape or run on the streets or alleys of the City of Munday, shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

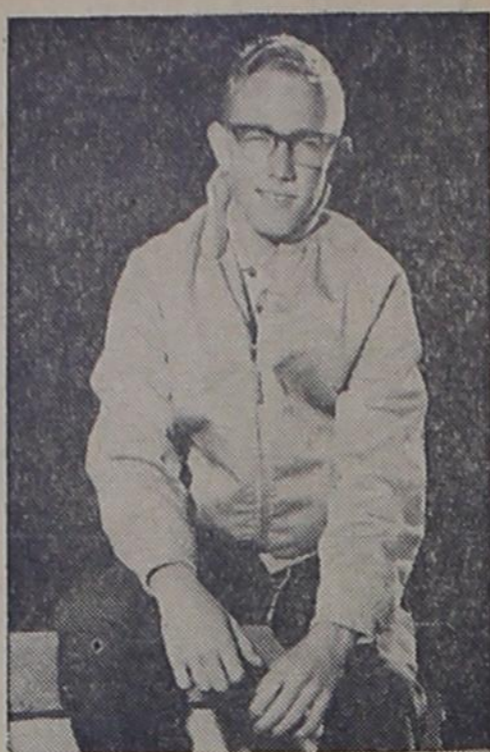
### Get Inspection Stickers Early

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are approximately 5,000 authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

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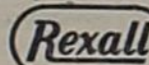
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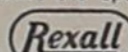
