A well-known writer of the past—he might have been Mark Twain, so far as we know—once said: "Everone cusses and discussed the weather, but nobody does anything about it!"

Since then, it has just about become a great American privilege.

Like cussing the president and the administration, or the governor and his cohorts. Everyone has his particular gripes!

Generally those with the biggest gripes are those who have never done anything about it, even when the opportunity presented itself.

Like in our city government. We've been inside the city hall when a person was berating everyone connected with the city's activities in any form—taxes, water bills, charges for trash pickups, you name it, and they had a gripe!

And the records would show that this person didn't bother to come out and vote when changes in the city administration came up. Sometimes, not more than 25 qualified voters had a part in electing these officials.

This year's weather thus far has pretty well followed the pattern for last year. One very good exception was the devastating hail that came in May, the like of which we don't want any more—any month or any year!

We had some rainfall in May, 1981—in the neighborhood of two inches, we think—and that was getting us by pretty well.

On May 28, we headed for Dallas for a get-together of our kith and kin, leaving Munday in a sprinkle. We hit a hard shower near Seymour, then experienced good driving after running out of it until we reached Jacksboro.

Dark, gloomy clouds unloaded on us just outside the Jack County town, and the remainder of our trip was made in near-downpours. We'd rather have been anywhere except driving the highway in such weather, but our fear of stopping dead-still was worse than that of moving!

Arriving back home Monday, we've received nightly rains during the past week, and we kinda assumed the character of our farmers, with fear of what a heavy rain would do to the farm activities.

Farmers had planted, or were planting, cotton. They had wheat ripe unto harvest last week, and the potato crop just ready to come out of the ground and be turned into cash money!

For several nights in a row, we'd have tornado warnings or heavy thunder-showers warnings out for Knox and adjoining counties, and our thoughts would be: "What's this gonna do to our crop situation?"

A quick look at our rain gauge next morning would bring some measure of relief. Now, we're asking that we be spared that devastating weather until a more appropriate time.

We met a friend at the post office Thursday, who said: "These rains we've had haven't hurt anybody!" We're hoping this is true.

Why should a columnist worry so much about the weather? Well, you see, we grew up as a farm boy, and a little bit of country has stayed with us!

Be it remembered, that the Knox County Commissioners' Court met in special session on this 5th day of June, 1981, at 9:00 a.m. with all members being present.

Motion was made by Bobby Roberson and seconded by Billy G. Johnston that the Knox County Commissioners Court appropriate a sum not to exceed \$9,600.00 a year for a full time jailer for the Knox County jail. This order effective June 5, 1981.

All voted in favor of this motion. There being no further business to come before the court, this meeting was unanimously adjourned.

Fishing's Fun With Fishing Float Made By Roe Allred!

Roe Allred is proudly displaying his latest, and favorite, invention—a home made fishing float—that is designed to take the labor out of fishing and provide more fun and recreation for his sport.

This invention is strictly Roe's own brainchild, and came about by means of developing his own idea, which resulted in a lot of piddling and some real work with a welding torch. The contraption measures 8x12 feet and is constructed entirely on aluminum with the exception of the iron that attaches wheels to the body. Aluminum irrigation pipe which was closed by welding each end, with dead air sealed inside, makes the thing float. In addition, there's a sheet iron platform equipped by two aluminum chairs, so two people may fish or walk about in comfort. A safety rail has been welded to each side.

The buoyancy of the float is such that it will accommodate more than two people, it being estimated that from six to eight people may safely come aboard. With two people and their fishing gear, the float displaces about six inches of water.

The wheels remain intact and are about half-way submerged when the float is floated. The small tires are labor-savers in floating and landing in shallow water. With very little speed, the wheels enable the float to be landed completely on dry soil.

On its "trial run" last Sunday, Roe said the float "took to the water just like a duck" and was very easily maneuvered. It has one handicap, however. Roe said it was not a rough

water vehicle; and, although it would be difficult to capsize, the thing cannot be handled in a high wind.

It is powered by a 10-horse Sea King outboard motor.

With this labor-saving device, Roe is looking forward to more fishing pleasure—and that's where he's likely to be found during most of his spare time!

That's his reward for some four months of work, off and on!

Local Housing Manager Gets Certification

Mrs. Jeanie Carden, executive director of Munday Housing Authority, has recently received certification from the National Center of Housing Management in Washington.

The certification reads that Mrs. Carden has completed all requirements for the designation of certified housing manager, family housing specialist, and specialist in elderly nursing.

This certification requirement is relatively new and includes a week's school and compilation of a detailed management review for twelve months showing work completed, weak points, and future needs. This review is then graded.

Munday has 66 units included in the Munday Housing Authority. This certification allows Mrs. Carden to manage up to 75 units. She explained that she was pleased to have received the certification and the knowledge gained would better prepare her to complete her responsibility as executive director of the Munday Housing Authority.

Reappraisal Started On All Knox County Property

Senate Bill 621 passed during the regular session of the 66th legislature mandated that "each county in Texas create an appraisal district." The County Appraisal District is responsible for setting the values on all property inside its own county for tax purposes. Each taxing entity will use the same value.

The Knox County Appraisal District's board of directors are D. B. Gass, Don Hertel, E. L. Horton, Clyde Voss, and Bud Carver. These men employed Oscar Mangis as Chief Appraiser in January, 1981. Other employees of the District are Velma Melton, Clodell Duke, and Jan Rolston.

Mangis reports that all the farm and pasture land has already been classified. Knox County Soil Survey was used to classify these properties. Mangis stated that he feels the system is fair and equal for all landowners.

The Appraisal District employees have started placing values on houses and improvements. Mangis said he would appreciate the help and cooperation of all homeowners. "To get an equal appraisal of all property in the county," he stated, "we will need to measure most of the houses. Some of them have never been measured for tax purposes. This is a big undertaking and we will need the help of everyone in the county."

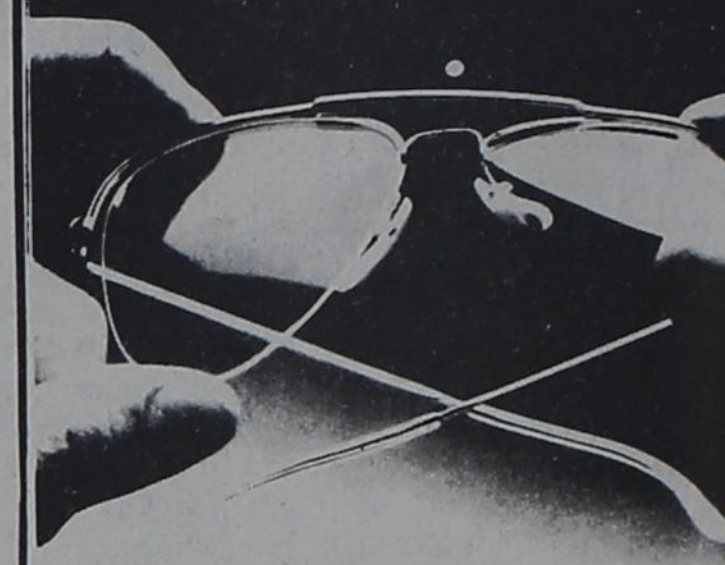
Ambulance Volunteers

LOGO PARIS. WORLD'S MOST-WANTED RIMLESS FRAMES.



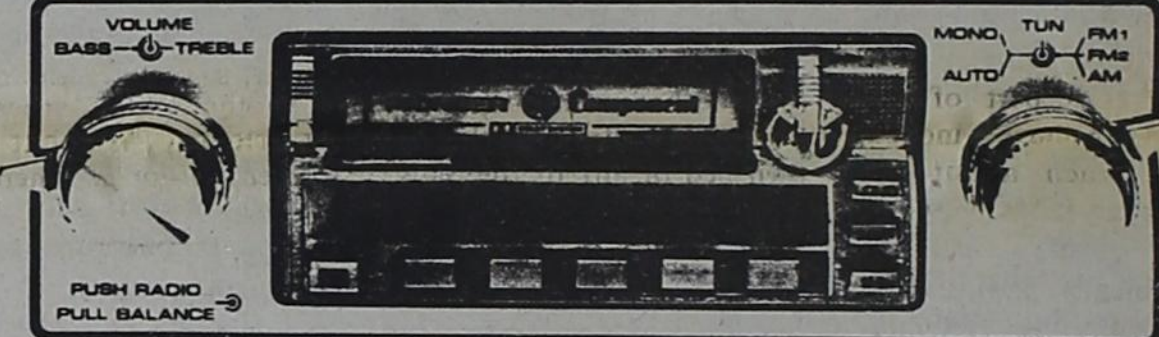

Benjamin Family Hosts "Daughter" From Chile

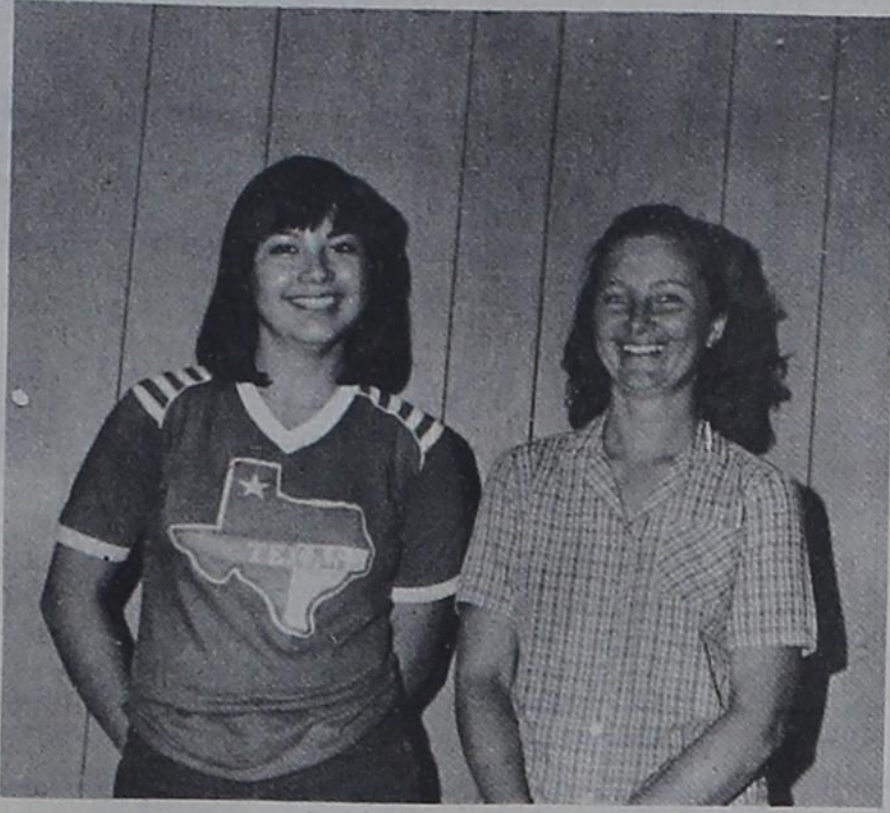
Lewis and Gay Spinks of Benjamin are temporary American parents for the second time. During the summer of 1980, the couple and their son, Shape, hosted a Greek student, Jim Papatheometriou, through the 4-H IFYE program, and since February, 1981, they have been "family" to Marcela Guevara of Rancagua, Chile, South America.

Marcela is with the Benjamin family under the Youth For Understanding International Student Exchange Program. Her span in the Spinks' family circle will end July 13, 1981. She is one of seven girls and two boys from Chile who are living with American families for six months. One of the boys, Eduardo Vansulla, also stayed in the Spinks home during spring break. He is making his temporary home with a family in Lubbock.

The Spinks' "new daughter" has attended Benjamin High School, where she was a sophomore, as compared to a private Catholic school which she attends in her own country. She came to America quite capable of reading and writing English, but has had to learn to speak the language. Spanish speaking people here were a definite asset to her on her arrival and the weeks following.

She has enjoyed attending school in jeans, as opposed to the uniform she wears in her homeland. Marcela has been very aware of the freedom that teenagers here exercise with cars. In Chile young people drive at an older age than in America, and then not nearly as freely. The teenagers in Chile walk or take the bus to their destinations.

Gay Spinks shared with us, "We are enjoying having Marcela as a part of our family. We have, indeed, learned much about her culture; plus, it has caused us to do some studying geographically, industrially, and agriculturally, attempting to learn more of Mar-

cel's life style and her country." The Spinks family has found Marcela to be a very warm and loving young lady. She is the oldest of three sisters and one brother. Rancagua, Chile is a large city, and yet, compared to the "spread out" appearance of Lubbock, the youths from Chile felt Lubbock was much larger. Lubbock, in fact, is a city with one-third less population than Rancagua.

New experiences for Marcela include living in the "country", riding a school bus, attending a small school, American convenience foods (such as cake mix), big cars (and more cars), and the dishwasher.

One big difference which Marcela had to quickly grow accustomed to was no maid service. In her country there are two classes of people - very poor or very rich (by their standards). She and her family are of the upper class and the family's maid does all the cleaning and cooking for them.

Mrs. Spinks found a necessary adjustment in this respect, too. It was not known to her at the time Marcela arrived that the girl was not expected to make her own bed or any of the daily chores which Mrs. Spinks found it necessary for members of the family to do. "It was difficult, at times, to have Marcela share respon-

sibilities of the home and yet, not make her feel she was being used as maid service. As she realized I did all my work, she began to help, even in the kitchen, and enjoyed it."

Marcela's father, Sergio Guevara, is a grower of avocados, oranges, and grapefruit. He oversees his farm with laborers doing the work. However, women do not work in the fields in Chile. Poor women work as maids, but never with their husbands in the fields.

A definite division is made between the two classes. For instance, Marcela said her grandfather would scold her younger brother if he saw the boy playing with the maid's children. At the same time, the older man was apparently exceptional with his kindness, always seeing that the maid's children have lunch (which is not an accepted thing).

Some house servants live at the family home or in servants' quarters; others, as do Marcela's family's maid, come during the day and go back to their home when the day's work is completed.

Another oddity, at least to Americans, is that the women do not go where the men are working. Mrs. Spinks took Marcela with her, thinking it would be a new experience, when she went to an oil drilling site on

the ranch. Marcela was very troubled, and feared "bad luck" because the two ladies were going where men were working, and explained her thoughts to her American mother.

Family style meals were an enjoyment to Marcela. An ordinary meal in her household consists of a number of courses, including appetizer, vegetable or vegetable/meat combination, meat, soup, salad, light dessert such as jello or ice cream, hot tea, with the coffee as the finale. They do not drink iced tea, but Marcela likes it. After each course, the dishes are removed before the other course is brought. Mr. Spinks commented, "All I could think of was all those dishes—they would need maid service."

Soccer is the popular game in Chile for boys. They also play basketball; but the girls play neither. As American girls cheer their football team to victory, the girls in Chile do not, nor do they find it that exciting, according to Marcela.

The youths visiting here have been made conscious of the inflation in America, as opposed to the economy in Chile. Each family is responsible for the trip to the United States which amounts to approximately \$2500, and their spending money while here. The youth in Lubbock said it had taken \$50.00 to go as far as \$5.00 in Chile. The American family furnishes room and board.

Marcela was all smiles when in The Courier office with Mrs. Spinks and stated that she likes America very much (even without maid service). She is a delightful young lady and one you feel has added to the happiness of the people around her.

At the same time, the Spinks family, one feels, has been good for her. They are the type folks one would pick to help a foreign student learn about America.

Wheat Harvest Is Slowed By More Rainfall

Considerable rainfall completely stalled new crop wheat harvesting throughout the entire Hard Red Winter Wheat Belt during the past week. Rainfall amounts received in the scattered showers ranged from two to ten inches for the week's period. Harvesting in the central Texas area was reported to have been approximately 50% completed prior to the rain, and harvesting in the state of Oklahoma was just in the initial stages. Presently, the southern half of the Belt is still receiving additional moisture, whereas northern sections are experiencing partly cloudy conditions.

Wheat harvest in the Munday area was halted by a series of nightly thunderstorms last week, but combine crews were able to resume their labors Sunday. Harvest has been going at full swing this week.

Market levels during the week were somewhat lower, even though nearby demand for cash grain needed to load steadily-arriving vessels placed some upward pressure from time to time upon the markets. New wheat demand was seen during the week by Brazil, who purchased approximately 5.6 million bushels of U. S. Hard Red Winter wheat for August shipment, and Peru, who purchased approximately 1.8 million bushels for July/FH August shipment. Japan, in that country's weekly tender, purchased approximately 3.0 million bushels of the U. S. bread grain. Israel and Korea also purchased moderate quantities of U. S. wheat.

Farmer selling continues to be completely at a standstill, as they are still somewhat apprehensive as to the supplies, as well as the quality of the new crop wheat that they have not yet harvested.

Mexico was a large buyer during the week of approximately 20.0 million bushels of corn and approximately 1.4 million bushels of sorghum for shipment July through October.

During the week USDA reported that export wheat inspections in the week ended May 28 were 10.7 million bushels, bringing the aggregate from June 1, 1980, to 1.430 billion bushels, somewhat short of the projected aggregate of 1.525 billion bushels.

During the 1930's, Mr. Warren operated a Gulf service station in Munday.
