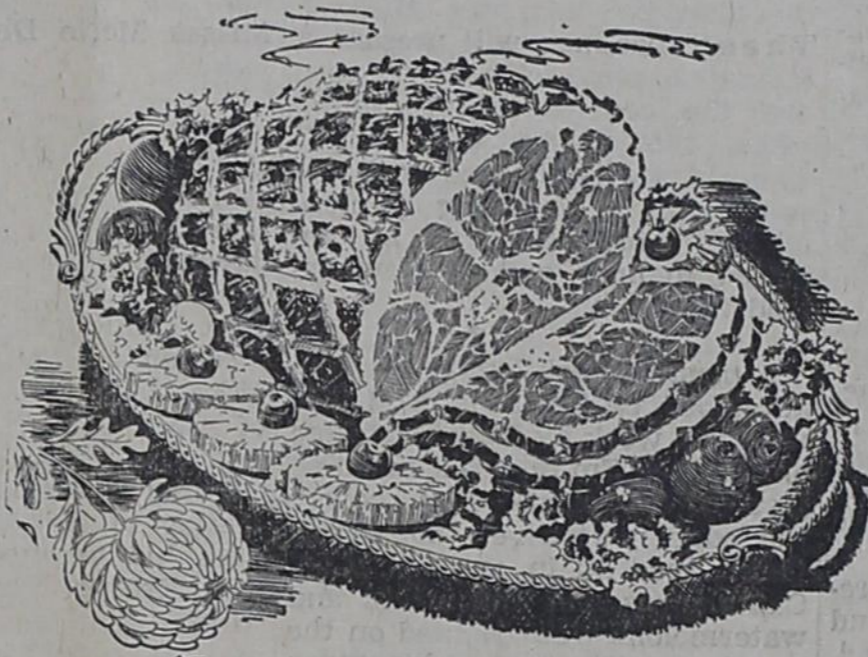

FARM and RANCH Notes

Gilliland 4-H boys and girls.
A total of \$133.60 was raised in the king and queen contest. Half of the amount each club raised will be returned to them for use in their club work.

The Benjamin 4-H members have organized a horse club and have begun practicing. They would like very much to make it a county-wide group. So if there is anyone in the county between the ages of 9 and 21, boy or girl, who has a horse and would like to join, come on out. The group is practicing every Sunday afternoon, weather permitting, on the east edge of town. The only requirement is that you be a 4-H member, and if you are not already, then it is very little trouble to join. There are no dues in 4-H work. Club adult leaders are Gene McAnear and Ed Daniels of Benjamin.

Subdistrict meetings, carried on by Extension Service specialists, to discuss the wheat situation will be held April 22, 10 a.m. in the memorial auditorium at Vernon and April 23, 10 a.m., in the district courtroom, Haskell. These meetings will present a factual account of both the pro and the con of the upcoming wheat referendum. The Extension Service is charged with the responsibility of giving farmers all the information in an unbiased manner and this we intend to do.

A plastic mulch laying machine developed by Texas A & M was used last week by Herb Partridge and James Smith. This machine lays a 48" plastic film, covers the edge, punches holes and plants seed all in one operation. Cantaloupes and cucumbers and watermelons were planted on the two farms. The main advantages of plastic film is that the total yield is increased remarkably, overall grade has been improved, crops mature two to three weeks earlier, sugar content of cantaloupes remains more uniform and ground rot of tomatoes and cucurbits has been eliminated or reduced appreciably.

You are welcome to visit these demonstrations during the coming season and watch the progress of these vegetables.
