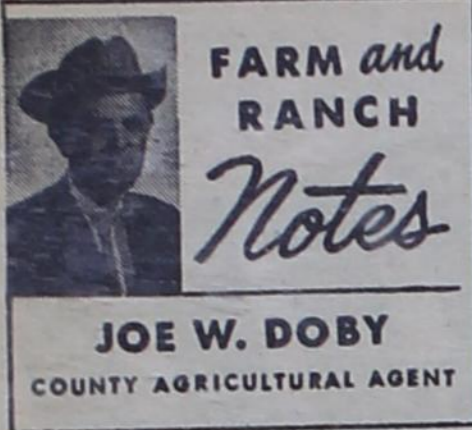

The officials warned that livestock producers should not relax their vigilance and should continue to check their animals at least twice a week, treat all infestations, collect samples from infested wounds and report cases to the Mission headquarters.

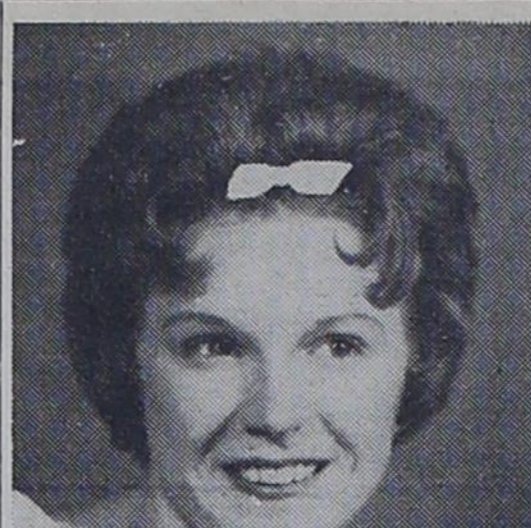

Bishop Copeland To Be Speaker For Annual Conference

Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland of the Nebraska Area of the Methodist Church will be the principal speaker for the Northwest Texas Conference to be held this year at St. Paul Methodist Church, Abilene, May 27-31.

Bishop Copeland, a former resident of Corsicana, was in his twelfth year as pastor of Travis Park Methodist Church, San Antonio, when elected Bishop in June, 1960, at the South Central Jurisdiction Conference. Bishop and Mrs. Copeland visited the mission fields of Southeast Asia last year.

Bishop Copeland, who was born in Bexar, Ark., received most of his schooling and had most of his pastorates in Texas. The bishop graduated from Corsicana High School where he delivered the baccalaureate sermon for his own graduating class. Bishop Copeland received his B. A. from Southern Methodist University where he is a member of the board of trustees, and an honorary doctorate from Southwestern University, Georgetown. He attended Westminster College, Tehuacana and East Texas State Teachers College.

Texas pastorates include: Corsicana, Cooper, Dallas and Wichita Falls.

The Nebraska bishop was a delegate to the uniting conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Methodist Protestant Church and Methodist Episcopal Church South, in 1939. The Vice president of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, Bishop Copeland is chairman of the Division of Peace and World Order, and also on the board of trustees.

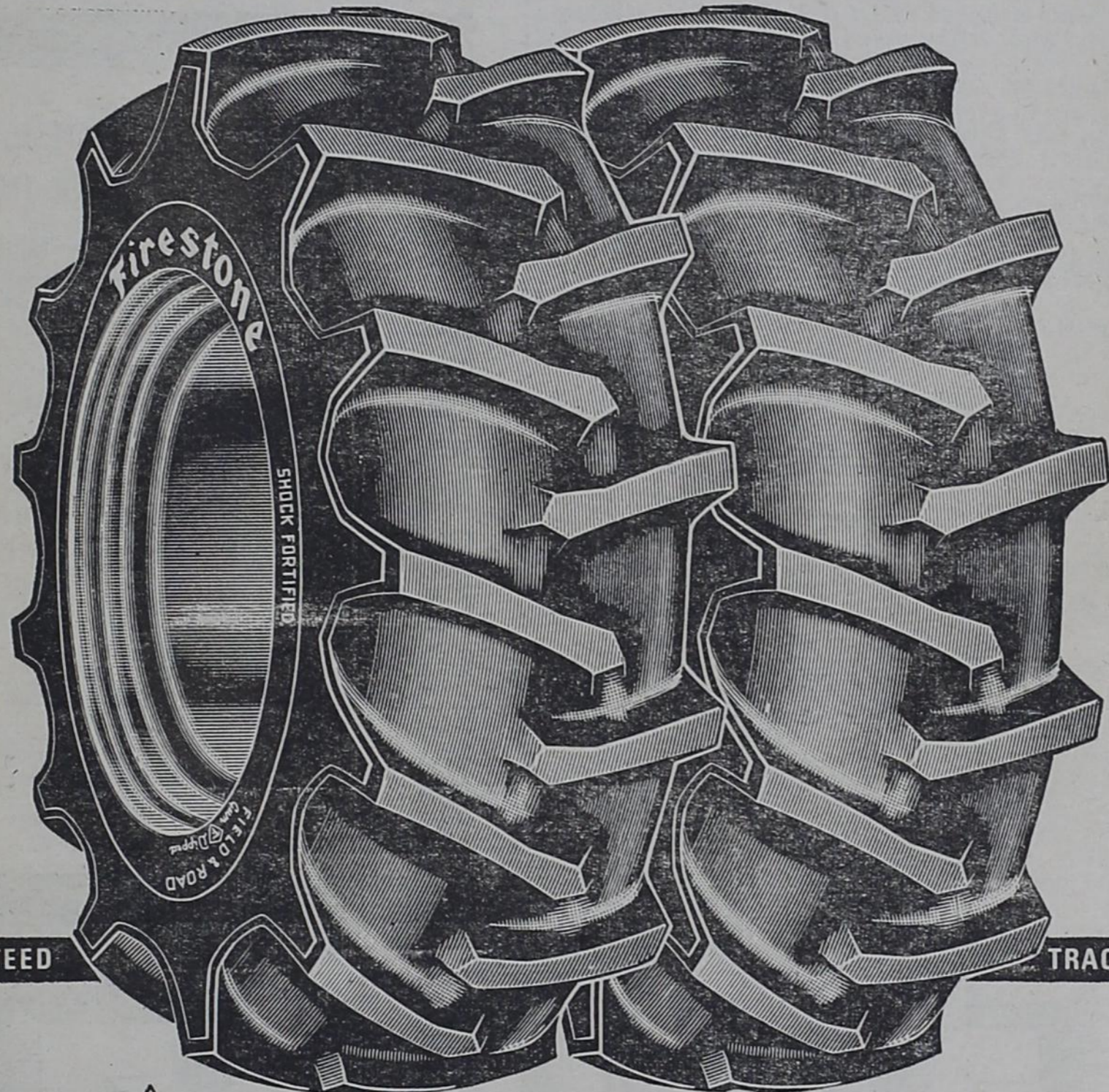

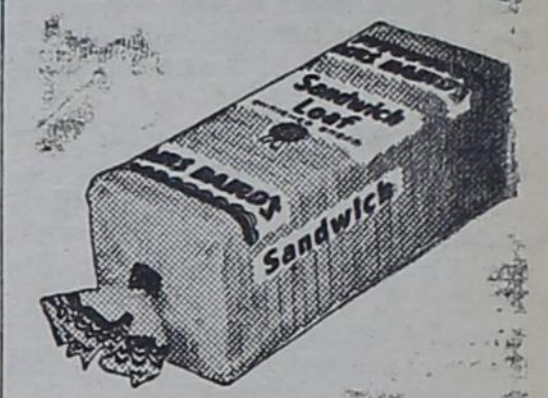
