If you are a wheat farmer, this is a most important date for you. That's when you vote on whether or not you want to continue the government's wheat program. To our way of thinking, this matter this year is more controversial than ever before.

There appears to be two schools of thought about the matter. One of these, apparently headed by the Secretary of Agriculture and various agencies, makes it appear that farmers (especially the small growers) are doomed if the vote on quotas fails to carry by the necessary two-thirds majority.

The other school, in which the Farm Bureau plays an important part, is that voting for the programs would be voting away all our individual freedoms.
