Quite a lot has been said about whether we should do away with, or keep, the state poll tax as a prerequisite to voting. We'll be deciding that soon. We like the way Roy Craig handled this in his Stamford American last week. Here's what he said:

Texans will have the opportunity on November 9 to say whether or not the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting shall be repealed. There has been a lot of comment, a lot of words written about the issue and likely there will be a lot more before election day.

For the most part, citizens of this state have gotten used to the idea of paying a poll tax to vote. They recognize voting is a privilege and the \$1.75 which a poll tax costs is a small amount to pay.

But times are changing. People in other states do not feel the same way about the poll tax. For years agitation has been strong on the national level to do away with the poll tax. In fact, only two more states must ratify a proposed constitutional amendment that would prohibit the collection of a poll tax for voting in national elections. There is little doubt but that this amendment will pass in the next year or so.

This fact should be borne in mind by Texans when they vote next month. I am afraid we find ourselves pretty much between a rock and a hard place. Say what you want, like it or not, the poll tax in national elections is doomed.

Now, for Texans to hang onto the poll tax would be a foolish, unrealistic gesture. Consider, if you will, the trouble that would result if Texas demanded a poll tax receipt but none was needed to vote in national elections. So much confusion would result at the polls that election day would be a nightmare. Two sets of poll lists and two sets of ballots would be necessary.

Goree Boy, 7 Dies On Tuesday

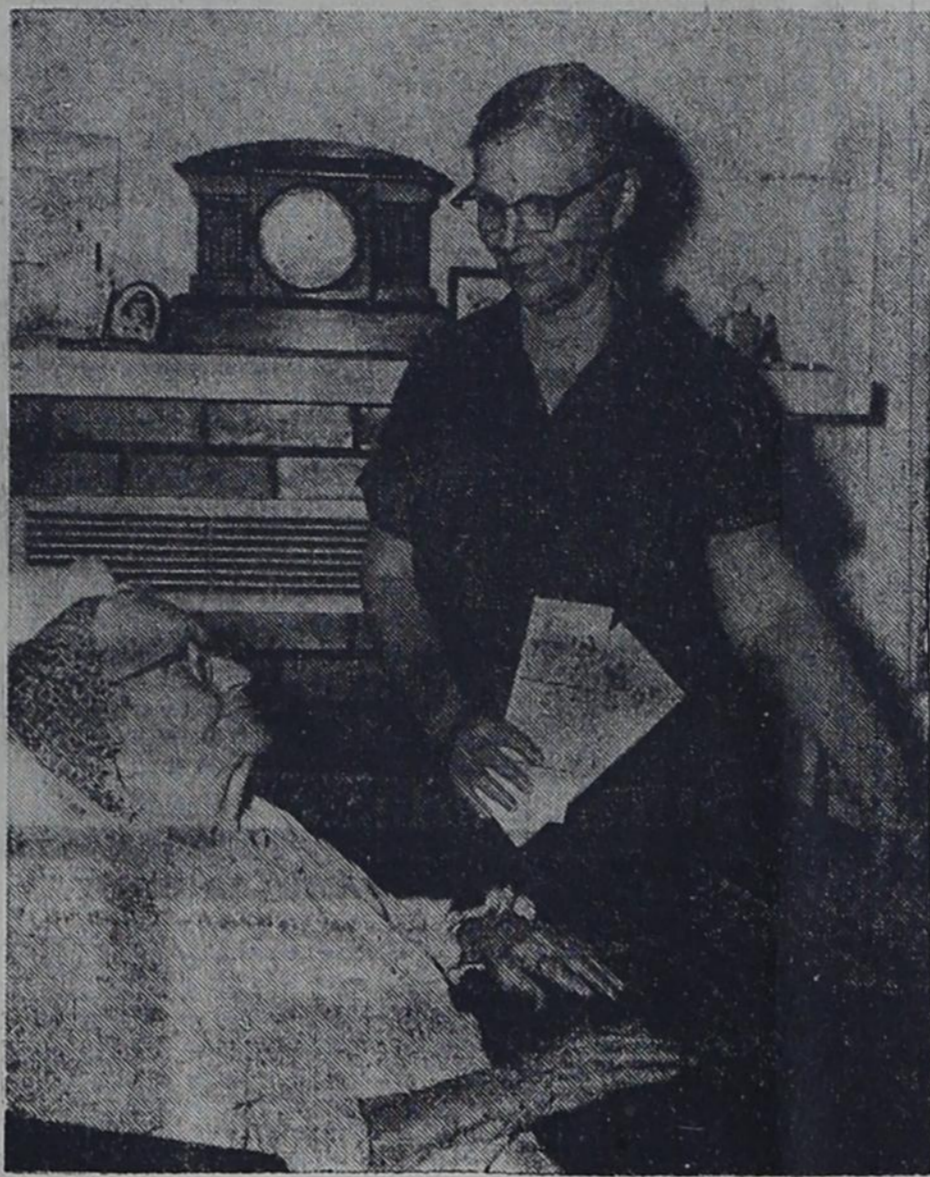

Cotton Receipts Slowed By Rain

Unfavorable weather for cotton harvest slowed receipts at the Munday cotton classing office and only 8,784 samples were classed during the week ending October 25.

The laboratory operated by Agricultural Marketing Service of the United States Department of Agriculture has classed 71,485 this season compared to 32,757 one year ago, according to A. D. Peebles in charge.

Grades for the week were 5 per cent white, 7 per cent strict middling light spotted, 52 per cent middling light spotted, 26 per cent strict low middling light spotted and 4 per cent low middling light spotted. Full spotted grades made up 6 per cent of the week's classing.

Staple lengths were 1 per cent 13/16, 18 per cent 7/8, 46 per cent 29/32, 26 per cent 15/16, 4 per cent 31/32 and 4 per cent 1 inch and longer.

Micronaire readings continued good with 2 per cent 3.0-3.4, 5 per cent 3.5-3.9, 43 per cent 4.0-4.4, 39 per cent 4.5-4.9 and 11 per cent 5.0-5.4.

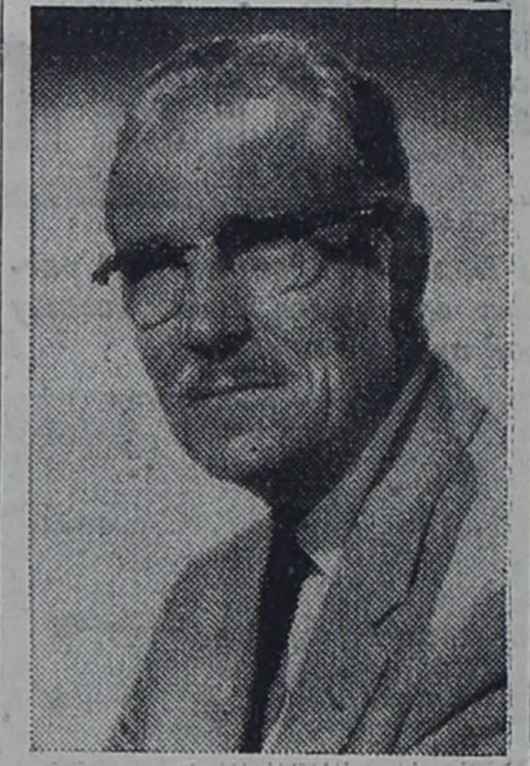
Growers were able to sell most light spotted grades with shorter staples at prices even with loan up to 35 points over the loan.

He was a leader in the Thorp Methodist Church, serving as superintendent of the Sunday School for many years. He transferred his membership to the Munday Methodist Church about 1946.

Mrs. Moore preceded him in death in 1959. He continued to live at his farm home until he became ill.

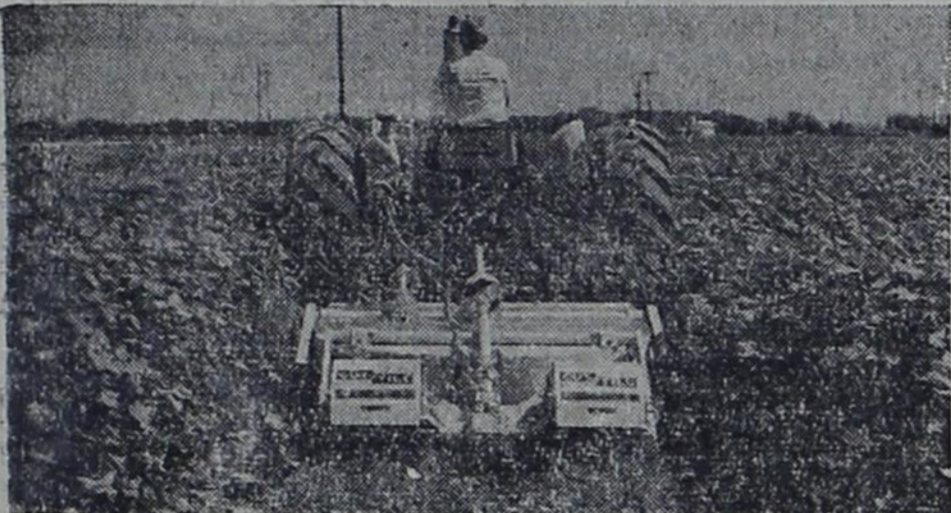

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TILLING ACTION—An area 12 inches wide on two rows is thoroughly tilled. A second crop can be planted without interference with planter, fertilizer or cultivator.

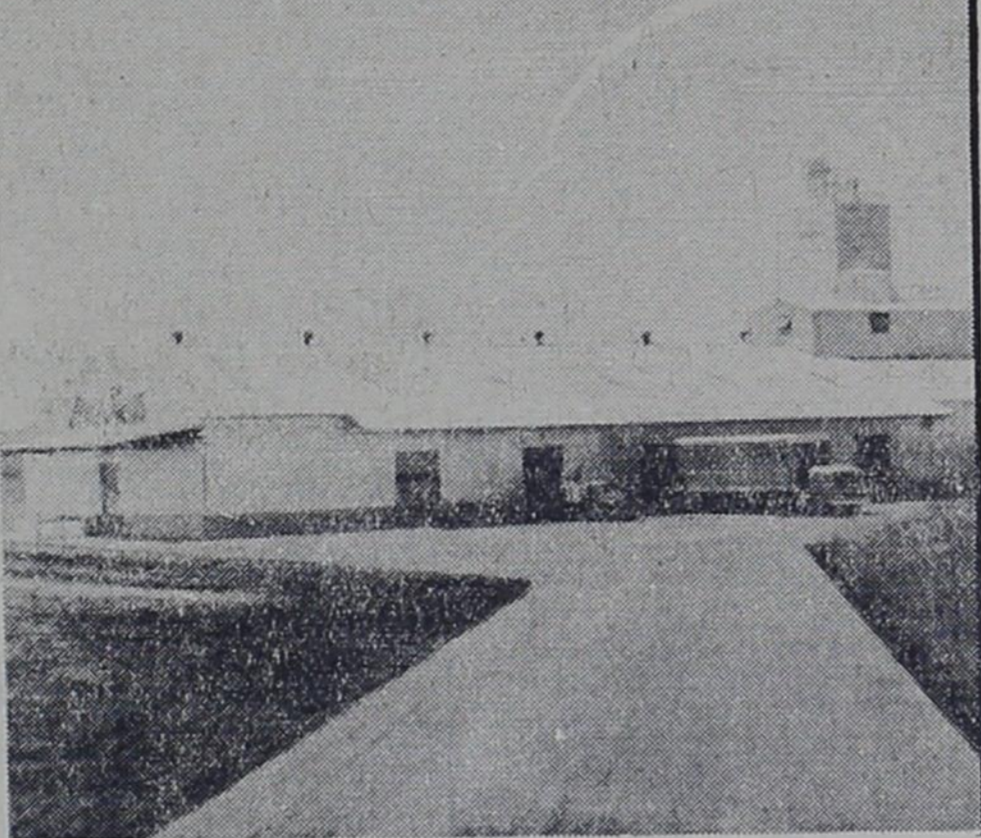

Now I don't mind admitting I didn't read that article, on the grounds that if I brought myself up to date on the situation in Yemen, it would be only fair to do the same for South Viet Nam, Iran, the Congo, Algeria, South Korea, etc. through the entire list of 175 nations now on earth, and by the time I got through I'd have to start back over as the situation changes every week or two in most of those places. This wouldn't leave me any time for farming, and if I'm not going to have any time for farming, I'd rather it'd be because of something besides the study of geography.

Trying to keep up with what's going on in the individual countries of the world is beyond my reach. It's like trying to keep up with all the politics in all the countries in all the states in the United States, when half the time I don't even know what's going on right here in Knox County. In fact, I'll bet there aren't a dozen people within ten miles of this farm who can name all the officials in this county, and even if they can, I don't believe they'd have much edge on the rest of us.

The way I see it is, if a man keeps up with one county, one state, a few children, two or three football teams and three or four countries, he's got his hands full! I may be ignorant of most of the world, but you've got to remember that most of the world is ignorant of me. This is probably an agreeable situation all the way around.

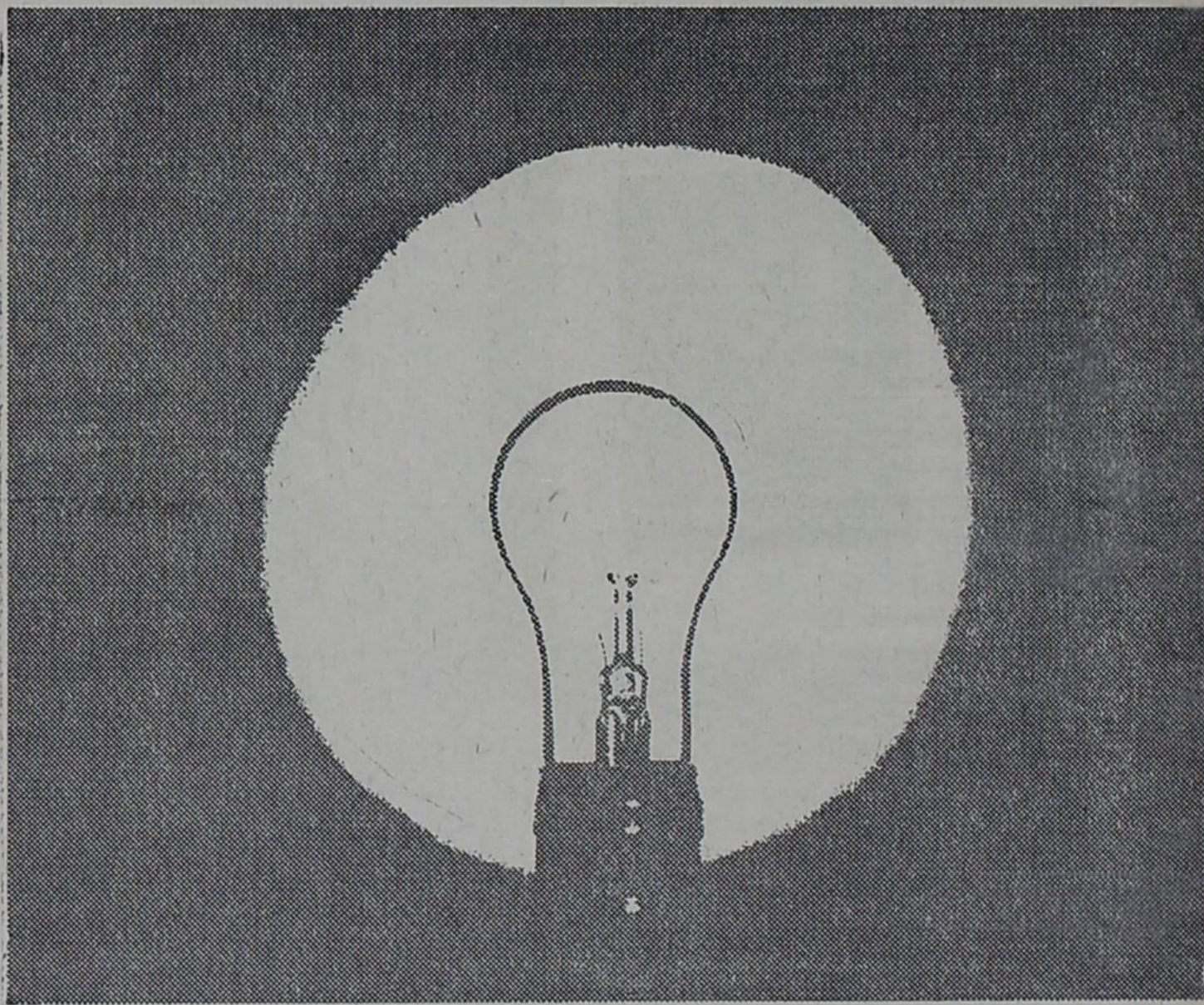
