

Faith Alone; Grace Alone; Baptism Alone

We diffe" widely about what saves us. One man says we are saved by GRACE ALONE, and quotes Eph. 2:8. Another claims justification by FAITH ALONE and quotes Rom, 3:1. Still a third, perhaps, contends that BAPTISM ALONE saves man, and he quotes 1 Pet. 3:21. Now suppose these three want to effect a union on the Bible. They are willing "to speak where the Bible speaks, and be silent where the Bible is silent." Suppose the grace alone man invites the other two to come over and stand with him. Could they afford to do this? Each of them is as scriptual as he is. His doctorine is not Bible. Suppose the baptism alone man asks the other two to come to his hobby of baptism alone. They would almost raise a charge of blasphemy, and rush wildly about crying water salvation. No union would be possible or desirable on any of these three doctrines. Union or error is no better than no union at all. There is only one word causing the trouble among these three. The little word "ALONE." What can they do? Each one cut if off of his favorite theory of salvation. They all can be saved by grace. All must agree to this because it is Bible. (Eph. 2:8). Likewise they can all stand together on justification by faith, because it is Bible. (Rom. 5:1). Likewise they can stand together in saying we are saved by baptism, because it is Bible. (1 Pet. 3:21). One man has as much right to say we are saved by baptism alone as another has to say we are saved by faith alone. Both are unscriptual and neither can ever be a basis for unity. Grace, faith, baptism, and many other things are said to save us, but not one of them, without the other, is sufficient. "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." (James 2:10).


