

Under Public Law 78, the TEC must supply this information to the Secretary of Labor who must limit the number of Mexican Nationals to be used in this county by granting a "ceiling." The Committee consults with the local Office Manager to assist him in estimating the number of workers who will be needed, based on current lcoal conditions affecting the cotton crop.

"Ceilings" granted by the Secretary of Labor limiting the importation of Mexican Nationals into this area will be posted in Post Offices in Munday, Knox City, Benjamin, Vera, Truscott, in the County Agent's office, and in the County Courthouse.

A conscientious country editor is clothed with a heavy responsibility. He not only records the local news, social events and political happenings of his community, but he should discuss national and international issues which have a direct bearing on the lives and livelihood of his readers. This is often a discouraging and unappreciated job but if his paper is worth reading he has to accept the burden. He is in the position of a teacher. How well each translates his ideas to his audience determines his standing in his profession.

It is certainly true that the smaller paper must place emphasis on local happenings. But it is unfortunate for a community if an editor feels abliged to move entirely in that direction.

The home town paper is read from the first to the last page because it contains a review of community activities found nowhere else, regardless of competition from radios, television and big city papers. Yet, according to the Secretary of Agriculture, the family farm seems to have been holding its own and then some. In a late year it accounted for a higher proportion of all farms than it did 15 years before and, also, for a higher percentage of total marketings.

Even so, the Secretary feels that steps should be taken to strengthen its power of survival. Most important of these is government action to "... insure fair prices to farmers through public supply management programs when overproduction makes such programs necessary."

That phrase should be read again and pondered in order to understand its full import. If "public supply management" means anything, it means government control. So, to save the family farm from possible corporate absorption, we should give the power of management decision to a federal bureaucracy. Habeas Corpus—Corpus Delicti Two legal phrases which are probably more misunderstood and misused by laymen than any other are "habeas corpus" and 'corpus delicti."

Latin for "you have the body." this week. They are commonly used in the legal profession to describe a writ or order signed by the judge directed to the sheriff or jailer holding a prisoner or to any person who is physically detaining another, and commanding him to produce the body (alive) of the prisoner (or person detained) before the judge. The purpose of such an order is to allow the judge to determine whether the prisoner is being held lawfully or whether he should be set free.

The writ of habeas corpus prevents law enforcement officers from abusing the constitutional right of personal liberty and has been a jealously guarded privi-

The words "corpus delicti" are Latin, and, liberally translated, mean the elements of the crime or wrongdoing. Laymen incorrectly interpret corpus delicti as meaning literally "the body," as
