Editor Harold Hudson of the Ochiltree County Herald of Perryton, one heavy smoker who quit completely several years ago, made this pointed report in an editorial column a few days ago:

Edward R. Morrow, the television commentator who used to have the "Person to Person" show, established a trademark with a lighted cigarette which he always held in his hand. He was proud of the fact that he smoked two to three packs a day, and was a chain smoker during all of his working hours. It was not a great big surprise, then, to read this week that Edward R. Morrow had had his left lung removed in a major operation which casts doubt upon his recovery. It was lung cancer.

If you're smoking more but enjoying it less, try switching from filters to fresh air for a while. It's great stuff... and it's tax free!—The Canadian Record.

Charles Baker has been a frequent visitor at our office during the past few weeks. He started a little project which, we think, was to have been a laborious task—but which he found fascinating.

There we found a story and congratulatory ads relating to the opening of the new Roxy Theatre in Munday, bringing the very best and very latest in theatre entertainment to the people of this area. P. V. Williams had gone all out for his town in the opening of this new and modern theatre.

The irony of this incident is this: We think it was very same week in which we were reading the good news of 1928 for our town that the doors of the Roxy Theatre were closed.

Thirty-five years, and some months, after this new theatre was opened with great pagantry, there was no picture show in our town!

Haskell's City Council Dismisses Suit Against Water Authority At Austin

Backers of the Miller's Creek water project reported Tuesday night they are "proceeding according to plan" after word was received from Austin of dismissal of the last lawsuit said to be blocking the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority efforts to work toward construction of the dam.

This word came from W. R. Herren of Haskell, member of a citizens' group supporting the project and former chairman of the authority's board.

What those plans are probably will not be known until the Water Authority meets here at 7:30 p.m. next Tuesday at the call of L. B. Patterson, chairman,

who returned from Austin late Tuesday.

Judge Jack Roberts, presiding over the 126th district court in Travis County, signed the order dismissing the case in which Haskell Mayor J. E. Walling and the city council had challenged the right of the Texas Water Commission to issue a permit to build the dam.

The Haskell mayor and all five councilmen announced last week that the city was dropping the last remaining suit generally thought to be blocking the way to the right to sell bonds for construction of the dam.

At the same time, the council announced it had passed a resolution unambiguously repudiating and canceling Haskell's participation in the water district created by an act of the Texas legislature setting up the administrative and tax machinery for construction of a dam to obtain a water supply.

Whether this move on the part of the Haskell mayor and council can continue to block efforts to seek construction of the dam is not immediately known, although it is the council's declaration that it can on grounds that contracts entered into by the cities with the water district are "illegal and void."

Lions Christmas Tree Sale Begins

The annual Christmas tree sale, sponsored by the Munday Lions Club, opened last Monday when the club's order for trees arrived, and a committee of "working Lions" started the task of erecting them on the city hall lawn.

They are arranged into a "forest of Christmas trees" and according to size so they can be easily selected by customers. Purchasers may amble through the "forest" and make their own selections.

This annual event is sponsored by the Lions Club for the purpose of raising money for the club's major projects—sight conservation, aid to the blind, aid to needy children, the Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville, etc.

The public is urged to make selections early, when a wider variety of sizes is available.

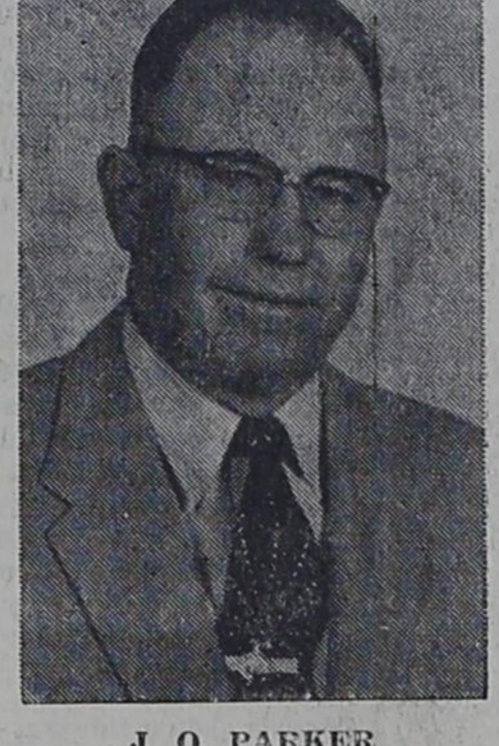

Cattle Feeders Recipients Of Awards

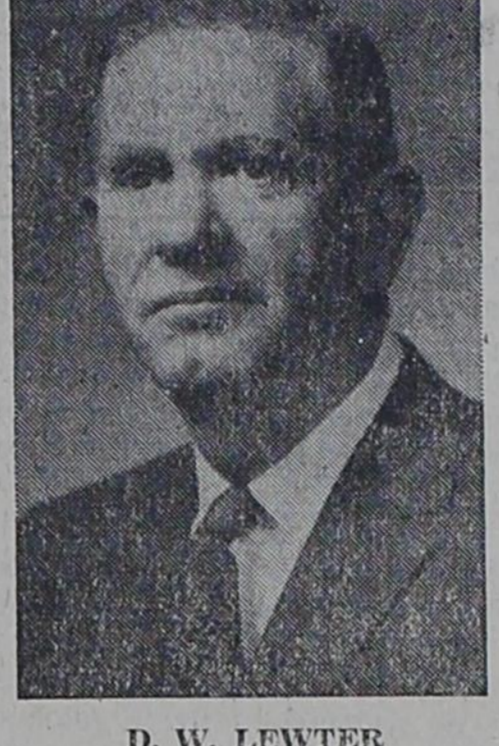

Recipients of the awards were D. W. Lewter of Lubbock and Parker Cattle Company of Canyon which is operated by J. O. and Foster Parker. The awards are sponsored by The Cattleman magazine.

plaques, assistant editor Dick Wilson pointed out that these feeders have contributed much to the cattle feeding industry and to their fellow man.

Accepting for the Parker Cattle Co., was J. O. Parker who describes the operation as a family farm and feeding enterprise. He produces much of his own grain and silage, and many of the cattle he feeds come from his own ranch and those of neighboring cattlemen. He feeds from two to three thousand head a year.

Kiddies' Parade On Saturday Officially Opens Christmas Shopping Season Here

Children of the Munday area are working on their entries in the kiddies' Christmas parade, which will be held here next Saturday to officially open the Christmas shopping season in Munday.

The parade will form at Munday High School and will be headed by the high school bands; and of course Santa Claus. Santa is due to arrive here Saturday morning—in plenty of time to prepare for his part in the gala parade.

A large number of children are working on individual entries, and it is expected that doll bugs,

tricycles, bicycles, pets and many other interesting creations will parade around the square.

Out of town judges will decide the winners, and the awards will be made immediately after the parade ends at the city hall square. \$100 in cash prizes will be given, \$50 in each division—the individual and group divisions—with \$25 going to first place; \$15 to second, and \$10 to third.

The parade will begin promptly at 2:30 p.m., will traverse main street, then around the square to the west side, as has been done in the past. It is important that all entries be on time so the parade can begin on time.

Of interest, too, to people of the unday trade area is the second annual treasure hunt in which practically every merchant in Munday is participating.

Some 40 merchants will give away individual prizes in the treasure hunt, and these will be displayed in their windows. In addition, 21 merchants are participating with "bonus gifts" and will not display individual prizes. These are principally those whose places of business are out which would make it inconvenient for "hunters" to find the gifts. The bonus gifts will be displayed at one of the main street store buildings.

TROUBLES AND STORMS

The troubles and storms which the Administration's foreign aid program have encountered is indicative of a fast-growing wave of feeling, within and without Congress.

This feeling is based on certain beliefs of varying degrees of significance. One is that you can't buy friends with dollars. Another is that many of the billions so spent have been wasted, going for purposes which were never intended by us. Still another is that certain nations which we have helped with the utmost generosity have cynically swung allegiance to the Soviet bloc or, at best, adopted policies of vacillation and a shaky neutralism. Still another is that the purpose of the Marshall Plan, which was the seed from which the whole program grew, was to help rebuild war-shattered nations, in the name of humanity, civilization and our own self interest as residents of the world; that this has now been accomplished and that the time has come to take long, hard second looks.

There also is a belief, certainly well-founded, that more stress should be placed on encouraging investment abroad by American private industry, and less on the whole aid concept. And American industry in many fields is in agreement, and is demonstrating that agreement through its actions.

Foreign aid will not abruptly end. But it is clear that it will be cut, and perhaps drastically. The hard-pressed American taxpayer, with his eye on our stupendous deficits and national debt, is beginning to demand just that.

AN UNEVEN NEW RECORD

We live in an era in which records are being broken on every hand. This goes for just about every area of human activity—sports, business production, wage rates, and so on and so on.

And last fiscal year, an AP dispatch from Washington points out, another kind of record was broken—and it is one in which every American save a forgotten hermit in the hills must share. The federal government collected close to \$106 billion in taxes. The dispatch quotes an Internal Revenue Service spokesman as saying, "This is the greatest amount ever collected by any country in history. No country before ever had so many people with so much money."

Well, that is no doubt true. And it is also true that the American people realize that they must pay heavy taxes, particularly for the national defense. But there are plenty of signs that these same American people are getting mighty weary of waste in government, and in nonessential spending for Welfare Statism and to support a bureaucracy of almost limitless dimensions.

How much longer will we stand for the setting of new tax records? That's quite a question, in view of a virtual taxpayer revolt that has been revealed in polls, and also local elections around the nation, where the people can vote on tax questions.

OUR PHYSICIAN POPULATION GROWS

It is periodically charged that the number of practicing physicians in this country is not large enough to meet the need and the demand for medical services.

If such a fear has any validity at all, it would

seem that the lack is being rapidly made up. The American Medical Association recently reported that the ratio of doctors per 100,000 population has increased from 137.8 to 146.7 in only three years. There is every reason to believe that the trend will continue. More students are enrolled in our medical schools than ever before, and this year's graduating classes totaled the highest in history. The number of those schools have grown from 77 to 87 in 17 years, five more than are to be built shortly, and another six are in the planning stage.

The AMA News urges that physicians contribute to the future of medicine by giving guidance and inspiration to secondary school students who may be considering medical careers and must soon make a positive or negative decision. In its words, "By assisting these schools in their search for dedicated and well qualified students, today's physicians can assure a strong profession and a healthy America for tomorrow." No one who knows the caliber of the medical profession will doubt that such a challenge will be met.

So, there would seem to be no grounds for believing that the standards of medical care in this country, which certainly are not surpassed anywhere, will suffer. There is, on the other hand, every reason for believing that those standards, aided by new discoveries and techniques, some of a literally revolutionary character, will surely improve.

A quotation from Abraham Lincoln: "Every man is said to have his peculiar ambition. Whether it be true or not, I can say for one, that I have no other so great as that of being truly esteemed by my fellow men."

The Portland, Oregon Traffic Safety Commission warns that many lives are tragically lost each winter as the result of undetected carbon monoxide fumes in an automobile. To avoid a lethal concentration of this odorless and colorless gas, never start a car motor with the garage doors closed—always have at least one window open part way when the car is in use—and have the exhaust system checked regularly by a competent mechanic.

The American Medical Association has pledged its support in implementing the nation's new program to fight mental illness and mental retardation. The new legislation, as enacted by Congress closely follows the principles first advocated by the AMA in its mental health program announced in the summer of 1962. The bill calls for \$150 million for the construction of community health centers over the next three years; \$126 million over four years to be spent on research and treatment centers for mental retardation and the mentally retarded; and \$53 million for training teachers of the mentally retarded and other handicapped children.

Of every three of the nation's youths, one drops out of school before graduating from high school. That results in a tragic and significant contribution to the unemployment total—jobs nowadays usually require a high school education at the minimum.

Business Backs 4-H Clubs Nation-Wide

Incentives Help Make Best Better

U.S. business firms contributed \$1.25 million in 1963 toward recognition and encouragement of the nation's 2,225,000 4-H Club members, the director of the National 4-H Service Committee has announced.

Norman C. Mindrum, director of the committee, said the record figure made possible awarding of college scholarships and fellowships valued at \$145,000. They were presented this year to 275 of the nation's most outstanding 4-H youths and to young adults who once were 4-H'ers.

The financial support also was used for more than 180,000 other awards to members of the nation's more than 94,000 local 4-H Clubs. The clubs are in about 3,100 counties in all 50 states and Puerto Rico.

The national committee, headquartered in Chicago, utilizes the funds to assist the Cooperative Extension Service advance the 4-H program.

Awards Since 1900

"Awards are an integral part of 4-H," Mindrum said, "and have been provided as incentives and recognition for young people since the early 1900s."

Help from 57 business firms now backing 4-H dates back in some cases to the 1920s. The average tenure for all donors is 18 years.

The scholarships, nearly all for \$500 each, were awarded Dec. 1-5 during the 42nd National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, attended by more than 1,500 delegates. Their expense-paid trips, considered both educational and cultural, were awarded by more than 30 of these firms.

Funds for programs ranging from bread baking to entomology are channeled through the 4-H committee, incorporated in

1923 when a handful of business firms provided \$3,400 to help the growing club program. In the last 10 years alone, the number of county medals awarded has increased from about 85,000 to nearly 180,000.

"Each donor has an interest in boys and girls, an appreciation of the need for youth development and a feeling that the organization can serve 4-H in a wholesome manner with limited self-gain," Mindrum said.

Diversified Support

Among the business firms supporting 4-H in 1963 are American Forest Products Industries, Inc.; American Oil Foundation; Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway System; California Chemical Company—Ortho Division; Cities Service Oil Co.; Chicago and North Western Railway Co.; Chicago,

Burlington and Quincy Railroad Co.; The Conrad Hilton Hotel; Chicago Board of Trade, and Cudahy Packing Company.
