Kirby, economist in marketing and policy; R. J. Mears, small grains specialist; and John McHaney, economist and agricultural outlook specialist. The sharp-witted former teacher, who says she taught herself "in a blue-backed speller when I was four years old," said she always lived in the country and didn't have the chance for WMU affiliation until 1911. She was made president of the WMU at Bunyan in Erath County near Dublin that same year, 52 years ago.

A native of Columbia, Tenn., 40 miles from Nashville, Mrs. Lewis came to Texas as a child, went to school at Tarleton College, Stephenville. She says she then became "an old maid school teacher for 15 years," then was married at Munday, where she was teaching, in 1914.

She and her husband had no children of their own but raised three orphan children. One of them now resides next door to Mrs. Lewis, who lives alone, surrounded by her memoirs, in a small house two blocks off the Square.

Mrs. Lewis is widely known for her correspondence with shut-ins, with people about whom she has heard who have experienced trouble, sorrow, need, illness, or any other adversity.

Tuesday she was honored at a surprise presentation of writing materials, stamps, and other items.






## Activities of The Colored People

Dear editor:  
I've been reading about managed news out of Washington the last few weeks and I'm not sure I understand what all the talk is about.

For example, one complaint is that Washington officials like to see their achievements printed, will even help reporters get the facts, but are out to lunch and unavailable when their failures come to light.

The complainers seem to feel the officials ought to be as energetic about getting their mistakes into print as their achievements.

I guess they should, but that ain't the way I operate this Johnson grass farm. If I'm talking to a banker on a financial matter, I don't mind telling him how much cotton I made last year, how high the yield was per acre, provided it was pretty good, but if it wasn't, I emphasize something else. Nobody in his right mind seeks a loan or runs for office, as the case may be, on a crop failure or a Bay of Pigs. The only time I'm interested in listing my failures is on my income tax report.

However, I've found it's pretty hard to keep a banker or the American public in the dark very long, and most things eventually come out. The average man makes so many mistakes he's not going to be too harsh on an official when he makes ones, and most people are judged not on how many mistakes they make but what they do in between mistakes. At least that's what I try to tell my banker.

Now in Russia they've got managed news all right. When the government owns the newspapers and the television and radio stations, it's no trick at all. That is, it's no trick to keep it out of print and off the air, but keeping it out of the people's





Cotton Plant Extracts Repel and Attract Boll Weevils—Scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have extracted from the cotton plant with potential value for controlling the most destructive of all cotton insects, the boll weevil.

The first substances were an attractant that draws weevils to cotton plants and a feeding stimulant which makes the plants appetizing to the insects. The three substances were found by scientists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service working in cooperation with the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station at the Boll Weevil Research Laboratory, State College, Miss.

The repellent was discovered in connection with work with the attractant. When the attractant was warmed to room temperature, part of it vaporized or degraded. The part remaining proved repellent to boll weevils. A procedure was then developed for extracting the repellent from cotton squares (flower buds) and seedlings, the same parts of the plant containing the attractant.

The scientists listed these possibilities for the substances. Plant breeders could conceivably develop cotton varieties either with a high content of the repellent so plants would repel weevils or with such a low content of the attractant that the plants would not attract weevils.

The discovery introduces the prospect of starving boll weevils by driving them away from the kind of food they need. In laboratory tests, weevils were kept away from cotton squares, bolls and seedlings for 5 to 12 hours even when they had no other food to eat. When other food was available, the weevils left the treated plant parts untouched for 36 hours.

Other possible uses for the attractant include the luring of weevils to a trap or simply to an area away from the cotton plants. The feeding stimulant does not attract weevils from a distance, but offers the possibility of forcing them to starve on the wrong kind of diet. Research is continuing on the substances and cotton strains are being checked for their content of them.


