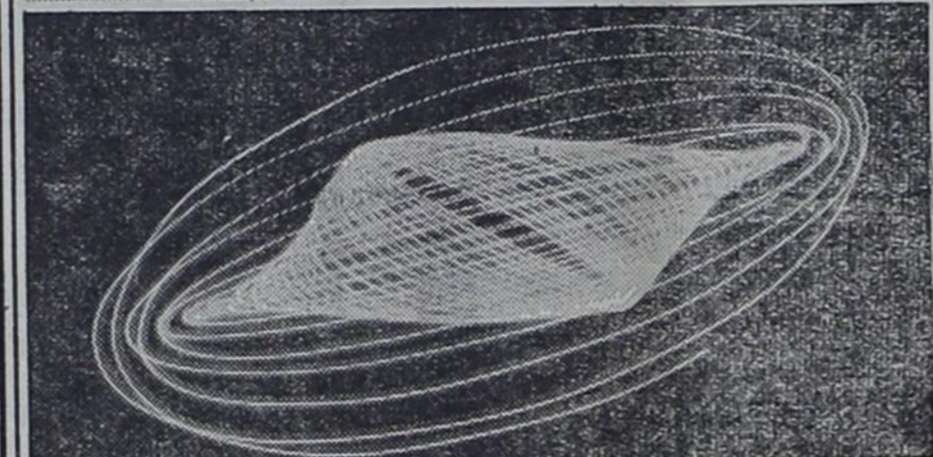

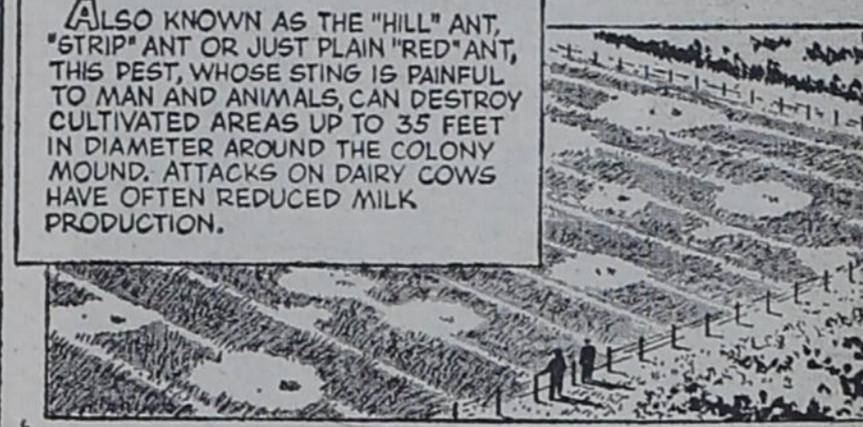

Whitewing Season Closed For Sound Logical Reasons

Texas will not have a white-winged dove season this year. "And for very logical reasons," said Howard Dodgen, executive secretary for the Texas Game and Fish Commission, "the same reasons we closed the pronghorn antelope season many years back. For the same reasons, hunters couldn't take red-heads and canvasback ducks last year."

"It's this department's responsibility to look after the game in this great State of ours. And, when our wildlife scientists conclude through research, observations, experience and concern that a species has been reduced to the danger point, it's our duty to protect this species, even if it means closing a season."

"This isn't the first time the whitewing hunt has been shut down. Back in the 50's the season remained closed for three years to give the birds a chance to build up their populations. Closing the season worked, and since 1956 hunters have enjoyed the thrills of trying their hunting skills against the darting, dodging doves with the white slashed wings. "A drop of the season this year may mean open seasons for the next several years," said Dodgen. "A hunt this year could force us to drop the hunts for the next several years. The people in this State, including those in the Valley, realize this and very few are complaining. Texans know that guessing was not, and is not, one of the techniques the

Commission uses for determining a season. Facts revealed through constant study resulted in the decision to withdraw the open season this year."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered, if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 3. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."
"AGAINST the Amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
