These wrecks accounted for property damage in the amount of eighty dollars.

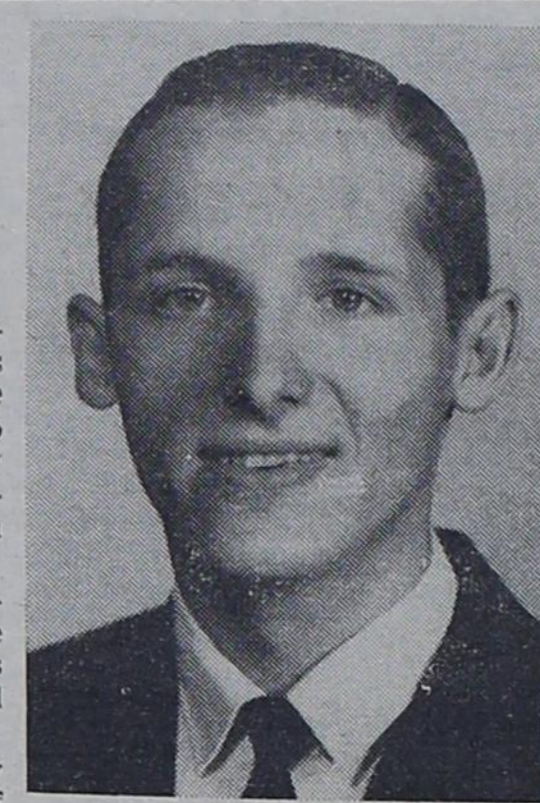

## Bond Sales Near Halfway Quota

W. E. Braly, Chairman of Knox County's Savings Bonds Committee, reports that Series E and H Savings Bonds sales in the County totaled \$11,250 in April. Sales for the first four months in 1963 were \$88,564 and 49.2% of the year's goal has been achieved.

April bond sales in Texas totaled \$12,327,195. Sales for the first four months of the year were \$52,615,020 which represents 34.9% of the state's 1963 bond goal.

"The 1963 Freedom Bond Drive is in full swing throughout the Nation. Literally thousands of bond volunteers are working to bring the bond message to all Americans. ## Man Jailed In Friday Slaying At Knox City

Willie Lee Scott, 20, waived examining trial on a charge of murder Saturday and was being held under \$2,000 bond in the slaying Friday night of his stepfather, R. T. Neal, 48, at Knox City.

Neal was fatally stabbed in the yard of the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Pinkie Watson, as an outgrowth of a family altercation, it was stated.

Scott reportedly told Sheriff H. C. Stone that he had attempted to intervene when Neal attacked him. The sheriff said Mrs. Watson, the suspect's grandmother, had been clubbed in the head with a sawed off .22 rifle.

He also reportedly said Scott told him Neal had him down, choking him with the rifle barrel. Neal was reported dead upon being taken to the Knox County Hospital with three stab wounds, one of them in the heart.

Scott was taken into custody early Saturday morning by officers at Stamford.

## Farmers Reject Wheat Program

Knox County's wheat farmers joined others of the nation in turning "thumbs down" on a new and tighter control plan for their crops in the wheat referendum voting last Tuesday.

Early returns from 40 states showed about 42 per cent of the growers favored the plan, which required a two-thirds majority to pass. This is the first time in 13 that a production control plan was rejected.

The vote in Knox County, according to an early report, went 322 for and 412 against the plan. This was only 43.9 per cent for the program.

Texas counties went almost unanimously against the program. Returns from 171 of the 173 participating counties late Tuesday night showed 21,240 growers—or 44.8 per cent—favoring the plan while 26,736 opposed it.

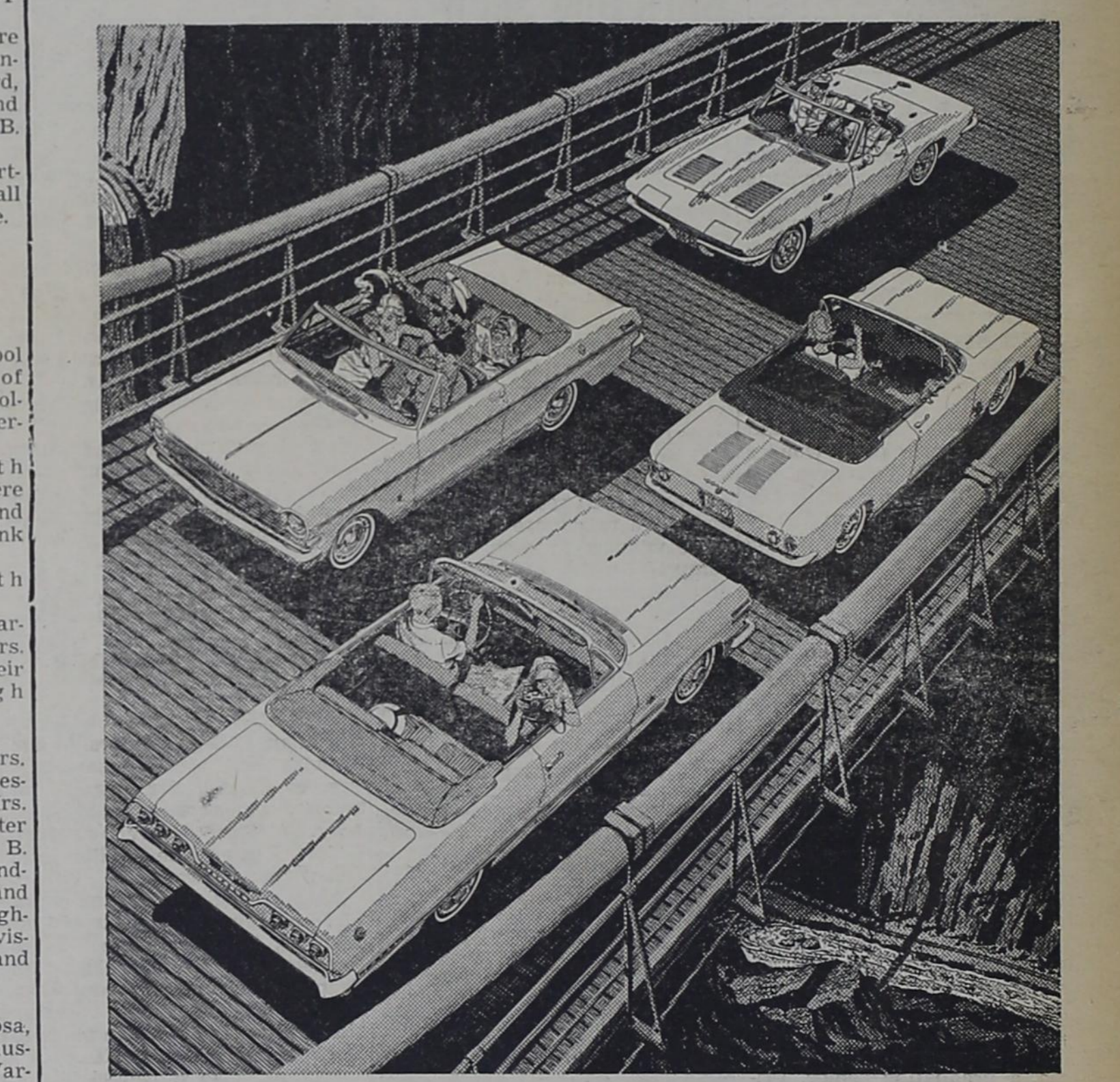

**FARM and RANCH Notes**

Screwworms have been confirmed on the Arledge Ranch in Western Baylor County. This herd has been sprayed at program expense and surrounding herds closely checked to prevent the spread of these flies.

Sterile flies are being released in the area and will be for about two more weeks if no other cases are found. Knox County produc-

ers are urged to be alert for cases in this area.

Please obtain samples before treating the wound. If you do not, then there is no way of telling whether they are screwworms or maggots. If you do not have a regular sample bottle, then save them in any kind of a container in water or alcohol.

If we do have screwworms, then it needs to be known before they have a chance to spread and multiply. It is the responsibility of every producer to help stamp out this menace.

Grasshoppers are hatching out and now is the time to control them while they are still on the hatching rounds.

The thrips are working in cotton in some fields quite severely at the present time. If they are present in large numbers, they can do a large amount of damage. They damage the plant by feeding on the leaves, which, of course are the food manufacturing part of the plant.

My schedule for visits to different areas of the county for the purpose of helping on cotton insect control is as follows: Tuesdays, 8:00 a.m., Gilliland Gin; 10 a.m., Weiss Store, Vera; 1 p.m., Rhineland Gin. Wednesdays, 8 a.m., Munday, Knox Prairie Seed; 10 a.m., Goree Gin; 1 p.m., B & C Chemical Co. I will try and maintain this every week unless I

have out of county trips to make.

"Say," he said, "I've been reading your letters in The Times and I think you ought to run for office."

"Run for office?" I gasped. I don't like the word run anyway. Walk is all right, if you take it slow and rest often.

"Yeah, run for office. They could use some of your ideas in Washington."

"Washington? I thought you were talking about a local office. Yeah, worse off than I thought. Ought to rest oftener."

But since I discovered he was actually serious, I set him straight at once. ### FHA Plans Insect Control Program

Due to the extensive damage caused by cotton boll weevils in the rolling plains this past year, the Farmers Home Administration has been called upon to finance a large number of farmers for the 1963 crop.

In an attempt to prevent a recurrence of last year's loss, Wilburn A. Satterwhite, FHA Supervisor servicing Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton Counties, announced here today that several FHA borrowers have planted a few rows of cotton extremely early to be used as a trap crop in determining the extent of cotton boll weevil survival in the area.

If overwintering weevils attack the trap crops in sufficient numbers, then all FHA borrowers will apply two early season applications of poison to their regular crop in order to destroy the emerging weevils and thereby prevent the last season buildup which did so much damage to the area cotton crop the past year. This is the control system that has been used by successful farmers in the blackland area of Texas for a number of years.
