We've been like the Irishman several times. When election day passed without having placed a ballot in the ballot box, we felt ashamed of ourself!

You should, too!

Come Saturday, April 5, we'll have the opportunity and privilege of electing people to several of the governing bodies of our county.

In the City of Munday, as in all towns of the county, aldermen and/or mayors will be elected to the city council. This year, we of Munday will have a choice in both of these. We have two running for mayor and will elect one. We have four names on the ballot for city alderman, and will elect two.

In our public schools, we have three seeking places on the board, and we must elect two.

Munday C-C Honors Marshall Benner As Citizen Of Year

A surprised Marshall Benner, employee of West Texas Utilities Co. for 34 years and longtime Munday resident, was selected and honored as Munday's citizen of the year last Thursday night at the Munday Chamber of Commerce annual banquet.

In awarding the plaque, Robert Nix, retiring president, cited the recipient as one who serves "far beyond the call of duty" in both his business and private life. Mentioned were his work with young people and the elderly, along with teaching a Sunday School class, regular visits with residents of Leisure Lodge, and other services performed in a "quiet way".

In accepting the award, Benner said it was a surprise in getting "something like this for doing something for those you love." He mentioned several at Leisure Lodge who have touched his life in many ways.

Others to be honored by presentation of awards were the following:

Mrs. Eurus Reid, a plaque for her untiring work and enthusiasm in helping form a Johnson Memorial Cemetery Association to provide care and maintenance for the cemetery. The award was presented by M. L. Wiggins;

Mrs. Paula Schur, an award for her work as fund drive chairman of Munday United Fund which resulted in Munday and Goree going far "over the top" this year. The plaque was awarded by Bob McWhorter, United Fund president;

Miss Shelly Lee, who at 97 years is Munday's most senior citizen, for her artistic influence in the

Banquet Highlights

If our banquet speaker traversed Main Street westward from the traffic light last Thursday, and happened to glance at our community sign, he saw the words: "Welcome Home Winston!"

This public welcome was reverberated many times over by Winston Blacklocks many friends who met him at the Chamber of Commerce banquet or during his brief visits about town. The fact that he is a native of Munday, a local high school graduate, a former businessman, Chamber of Commerce official, and Lions Club president, accounted much for this joyous welcome.

Winston's talk was not a "ear jerker" or one that instilled a sense of loyalty to country, but it was one which local people apparently wanted and enjoyed as he talked of "olden days" in Munday. He said his biggest problems were making passing grades in school, trying

to avoid numerous "paddlings", which he said were truly whippings, and getting his high school diploma.

"There were so few boys in the senior class that every one of us received an honor," he said.

He spoke briefly of his business ventures in Munday, and gave a short account of "his stewardship" after entering the life insurance field. He said he traveled up and down and across the country, and to a lot of islands in his work. Referring to his early retirement, he said: "I'm not making a lot of money, but I'm doing what I want to do - and I'm happy!"

He referred to three mischievous boys, Eddie Littlefield, Danny Offutt and Jimmie Lee, who would visit his store in Munday. "These boys could re-arrange a store in nothing flat", he said.

During his entertaining talk, he quoted the poem about an old man who crossed a chasm deep and wide, then stopped "and built a bridge at eventide", saying it was for a youth who was following in his footsteps. "People of Munday built bridges for me", he said, and named his father, Ben Blacklock; Pitzer Baker, W. E. Braly, C. L. Mayes, M. L. Wiggins, J. Weldon Smith, and others.

He received a standing ovation - not for his great oratory, but for his down-to-earth remarks concerning his activities, his friends and his home town.

After his retirement from Southwestern Life Ins. Co. as vice-president and assistant agency director, he

opened an office in Dallas as a life insurance and annuity services consultant.

Enjoyable events of this banquet, as of others, were those honored by various awards. These are mentioned in a separate story.

After presenting retiring president, Robert Nix, a handsome service plaque, incoming president Gary Schur reviewed some of last year's accomplishments and this year's project aims. "This year", he said, "we have secured 25 new members and had 25 others increase their dues, which helped us to operate in the black. We have worked toward securing a doctor for Munday, and solving the energy and fuel situation in our area."

Highlighting this year's projects is a continued effort to secure a doctor, and concentrated efforts of the chamber's industrial committee in the hopes of having a new industry for the Munday area by early 1982. An industrial brochure is planned by September of this year.

Around 200 people gathered to enjoy the banquet meal served by Godbey Catering Service of Fort Worth, and to help celebrate the occasion. Visitors were from Knox City, Stamford, Paducah, Weatherford and Denton.

Local Ambulance Volunteers Become Well Trained Group

Since the ambulance volunteers became a reality in March of 1976, the group has come a long way toward preparing themselves to be the best qualified personnel possible.

To become an EMT (emergency medical technician), registered and certified by Texas Department of Public Health, a person has a number of qualifications to meet.

One must attend 80 hours of classroom lectures and 40 hours of time assisting in a hospital. In the classroom, training is received in treatment of diseases, bandaging, splinting, care of disaster victims, driving emergency vehicles, care of heart patients and extricating victims from collision

vehicles. Even though this is not a complete list, we have offered them so the reader may get an idea of what training the volunteer has access to. They are able to practice a number of these training techniques "for real." For instance, a wrecked car was provided at Wichita Falls, and the trainees spent an entire day practicing the removal of victims.

Included in the 40 hours of hospital time are eight hours of observation in surgery, four hours in intensive care and 24 hours in emergency. Each of the local people completing this requirement did so at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene or in Wichita Falls General Hospital. Every two years, a refresher course of 24 hours of classroom training must be taken in order to keep their certification current.

Munday area is fortunate in having Mickey Jackson, Melvin Cypert, Curley Awalt, Jeanie Carden, Martha Nell Franklin, Bill Kingston, Jim Reid, Thelma Maston, Reba Redder and Bobby Hutchinson all as EMTs. Gene Nix has completed the classroom hours; he relieves Bobby Hutchinson on Friday of each week. Gene Brown has been a certified EMT but has not been able to make the 24 hours necessary to hold it current; Mickie Hutchinson is also an EMT, but has moved to Abilene.

Bear in mind, if you will, all this schooling was completed in these people's "spare time" The impact of what they have done is much greater when we realize this.

This area can also boast of volunteers who have become ECAs (emergency care attendants). To become an ECA, a person must complete 44 hours of classroom instruction, in essentially the same topics as the EMT course. EMT training is more in depth, but a trainee for ECA also spends time in actually performing the skills. This certification, like the EMT, requires 24 hours of instruction every two years in order to keep current.

Volunteers having completed their ECA training are Bill Longan, Mrs. Mark (Pam) Reed, Ray Herring, Gary Crawford, Freddie Caram, Ray Lynn Hardin and Jessie Andrade. Pat Hutchinson completed the classroom instruction; and therefore, holds the knowledge, even though she was not able to get certified because of time available. Pat has been a "faithful fill-in" from the beginning, when she is needed by her husband, Bobby.

A number of other people in the community have had Red Cross training, having taken the CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation) course, and have made it known that they can be called on if needed.

One can readily see the volunteers have been busy and might ask "when did they have time" to do this training. But an old saying that holds true is: "If you want a job done, ask a busy person to do it". And this brings another thought - now that it is time to begin raising funds for a new ambulance - and that is "they ain't through yet". We certainly hope the volunteers stay as active and energetic as they have thus far. They are a great bunch of people; and we need them!
