



The Threefold Plan:

The sinner, needs to be saved from the love, from the practice, and from the guilt of sin. One may cease to love and practice sin, but still be guilty of it before the law. A thief might abhor his deed and wish he had never done it, but that alone would not free him from the guilt of stealing. A man might be sorry he failed to pay a debt, but his being sorry would not relieve him of his responsibility. He must do something about it.

Paul ceased to love and practice sin when the Lord appeared to him on the road to Damascus, but he was still guilty of sin three days later. When Ananias came to him to tell him what to do, he said, "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins ... " (Acts 22:16).

The statement "as a man thinketh in his heart so is he" is always true in all relations of life. See Prov. 23:7. The heart, or that part of man which thinks, is the logical beginning place, and the gospel, which is the power of God unto salvation to the believer, is first addressed to man's intelli-

The gospel, then, if believed, will change ones attitude toward sin, cause him to cease to love sin. Upon seeing that his life has not been pleasing to God, the gospel will lead him to repent of his sins, or cease to practice them, and having done that, the penitent believer will want to know what to do in order to get rid of the guilt of sin. Read Acts 2:36-38.

Faith changes the attitude toward sin; repentance changes the practice of sin; and baptims cleanses one from the guilt of sin (Acts 2:14-41).

I believe that I should call the attention of those interested in this bill to the fact that it authorizes a tax to be levied on property within the limits of the incorporate towns. However, each town can vote to come into the district or stay out, as preferred. I have not seen an engineers report as to cost of project, therefore I am not posted as to the financial side of the project. I do, however want to call attention to the fact that a property tax is authorized by this bill and there is no ceiling as to the rate.

While I am old "timey" enough to hesitate to approve such a provision in connection with property tax, I trust that those interested water district are aware of the authority to impose this tax.


