The Rev. Father Anthony Schroeder, 60, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland, passed away at 5 p.m. Friday in a Wichita Falls hospital. He had been ill for several months, but continued his duties with the Rhineland parish until a short time before his death.

Prontifical requiem high mass was conducted at 10 a.m. Monday in St. Joseph's Church, with the Most Rev. Thomas K. Gorman, bishop of the Dallas-Fort Worth Catholic Diocese, as officiant. The Very Rev. Abbott Michael Lensing, Order of St. Benedict, of Arkansas, also attended the local service.

The body was taken to Windthorst, where a second service was held at 9 a.m. Tuesday with the Rev. William Ignatius, pastor

of St. Mary's Catholic Church there, officiating. Final rites and burial were in Subiaco, Ark., with the Jacobs-Devers Funeral Home of Paris, Ark., in charge of arrangements. Owens-Brumley Funeral Home of Wichita Falls handled arrangements in Texas.

Rev. Schroeder was born June 2, 1902, in Tours, Texas, graduated from high school at Subiaco, Ark., in 1921, and was ordained there into the holy priesthood in 1928. He remained at the Subiaco monastery for 17 years.

He held pastorates at Little Rock, Ark., and Muenster, Texas, before coming to Rhineland some four years ago. He was a member of the Little Rock Council of Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Smith urges auto owners to bring their 1962 registration receipts and certificates of title when they come to register.

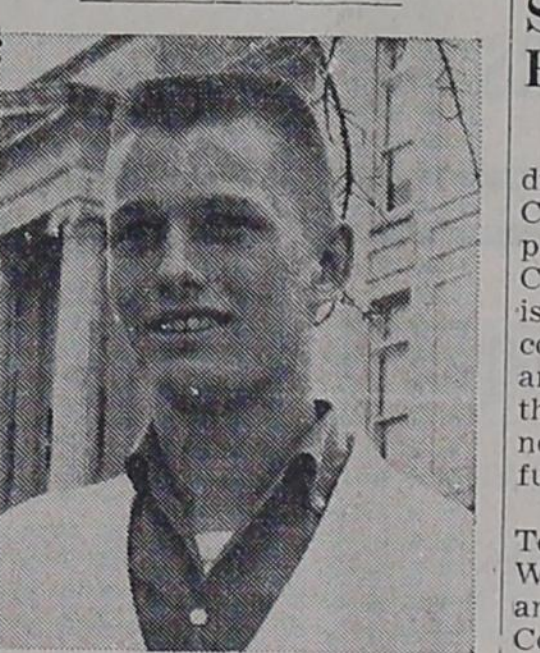
Track Meet Slated At Jr. High School

Screwworm Program Progresses Nicely

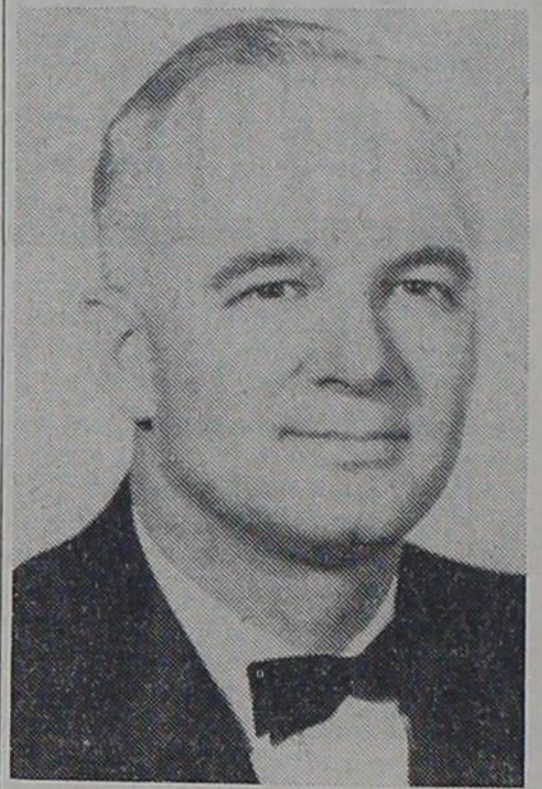

Members of the committee in each community are contacting stockman urging them to give so the program will not be stopped due to a lack of funds.

Four cases were confirmed in Texas last week, three were from Willacy County in south Texas and the other was from Kinney County in Southwest Texas. The one in Kinney County was the furthest north a screwworm has been found since the cold weather. Additional sterile flies were dropped on this ranch by air and others from the ground. This will overwhelm the native population and stop this threat where it started.

What Happens To Your Food Dollar?

How many times have you looked at the price tag after a trip to the supermarket and exclaimed, "Just look at this grocery bill!"

It seems as if the family grocery expense get bigger every week and that food prices are enormous. But here is a suggestion.

The next time you unload the car on returning from the supermarket, spread the items out on the kitchen table and have a look at them. It may surprise you. How many of those items are "non-food" purchases? How many can you actually eat, and how much of it is soap, tooth paste, household cleansers, mops, gadgets beauty preparations and even toys, books and magazines?

The supermarket today is a combination grocery store, notions dispenser, hardware seller, dry goods vendor, toy shop, tobacconist, library and—with its mechanized rides to amuse the children—a kiddie park. This vast neon-trimmed shopping arena, with its thousands of square feet of floor space and acres of parking is the modern day counterpart of the old general store. You can spend a lot of money there.

Yet we make a common mistake of getting home from a trip to this wonderland of national products and bewailing the high cost of "groceries." Who is the first to get the blame for it? Too often, the scapegoat of our wrath is the farmer—that guy "out there somewhere."

Sure, your shopping bill at the supermarket is higher. But a recent report by Purdue University revealed that about 20 per cent of what you carried home in that grocery sack was non-food items. Farm food is still your best buy, and the item whose cost has risen more slowly than nearly any other item you purchase. Farm food sold in retail stores has gone up in price some 13 per cent in the past decade. Meanwhile all other items that we buy for daily living has gone up an average of 32 per cent. Housing

costs are up nearly 33 per cent in the same period. Rent has skyrocketed 44 per cent. And transportation has soared 50 per cent.

We as a nation pay a smaller part of our income for food than any other industrialized country. We spend about 20 per cent of our earnings for food compared to 30 per cent in France and England, 42 per cent in Japan, 45 per cent in West Germany and 56 per cent in Russia.

In abundance, variety, convenience, and wholesomeness, American food is without equal—including its fair price.

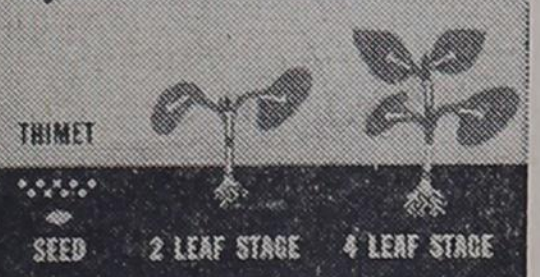

surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the num-

ber of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the laws adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

Many taxpayers are due to file an estimated tax return each year. Some believe that if they pay their taxes by January 15 that they are no liable for penalty for failure to file and pay estimated taxes during the year.

Congress passed the estimated tax provisions to require tax payments from business and self-employed taxpayers on the same basis that wage earners must pay through the withholding tax.

Unless all of your income is from salary and covered by withholding tax, it might pay you to look over the estimated tax instructions.

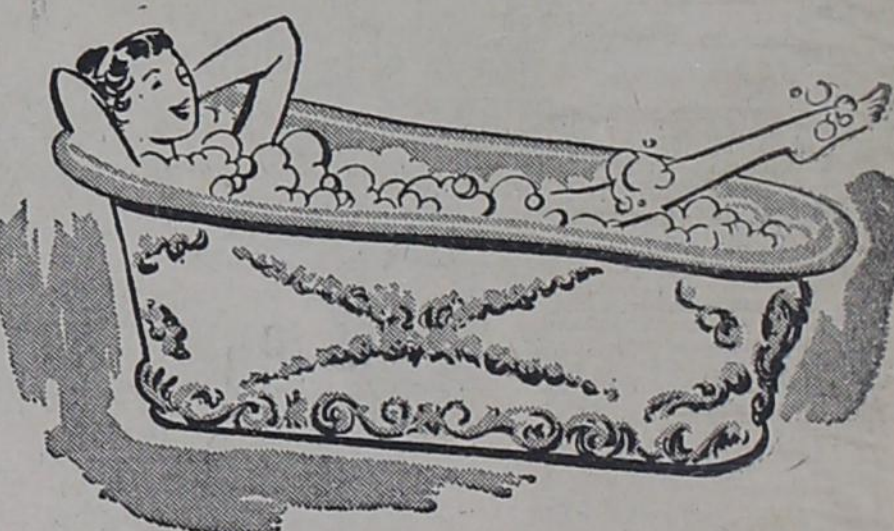

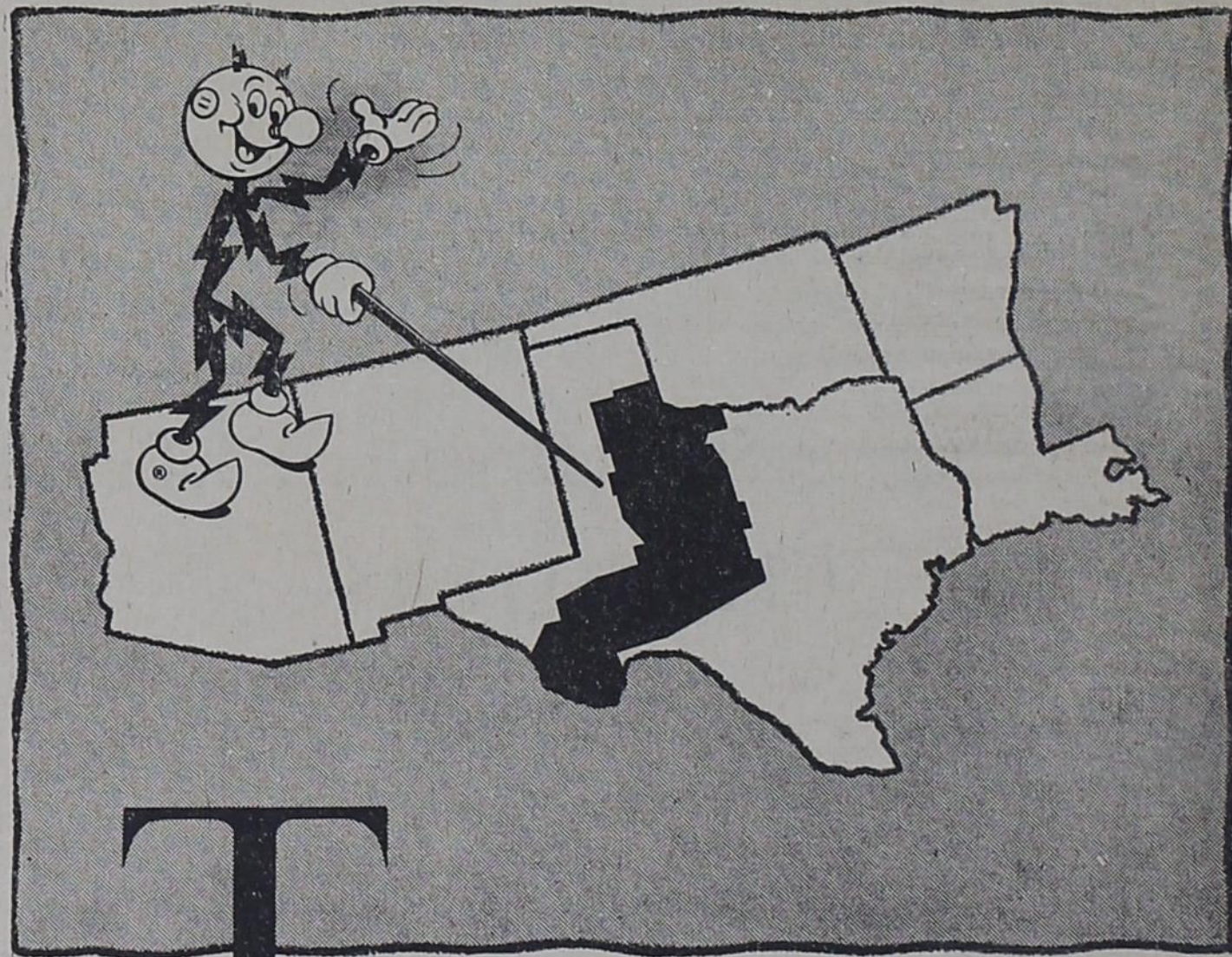

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Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

By Joe W. Doby, Knox County Agent

Knox County 4-H members are observing National 4-H Club Week along with 100,000 other 4-H members in Texas. Club presidents have received posters to be displayed in schools and other places over the county. 4-H members will have the opportunity to tour the county courthouse at 9:30 Saturday morning, March 9. Remember this date and get your Dad or Mother to bring you over and see what goes on in the Courthouse.

The petitions bearing the names of livestock producers in Knox County to declare a Type II brucellosis control area have been sent to the Texas Animal Health Commission. Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director, informed me last week a proclamation so designating this county would be issued as soon as the date for the hearing has been set. After the hearing, if everything is in order, the testing crews will move in and begin work.

All of the dairy and registered cows will have to be tested. In addition, not less than 20% of the range cattle in each herd over three years of age must be tested. The area will be declared modified certified free if less than 1% of the cattle (excluding steers

and sprayed heifers) in 5% of the herds are found to be reactors.

The only thing required of a producer is that he have his cattle where the testing crew can work them.

I received from Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, a resume of research on ruminant bloat that might be of interest to you. One, the tendency to bloat is inherited as the basic cause is a deficient saliva secretion. The physical nature of feed does influence incidence of bloat. The level of phosphates in pasture soils on climatic conditions apparently does not have anything to do with whether an animal has bloat. None of the chemical preventatives available today are satisfactory. These statements are based on research done by Agricultural Research Service.

Anyone interested in attending the commercial egg clinic scheduled for Wednesday, March 27 at Texas A&M College. Sounds like an excellent program. I will be glad to supply anyone with further details.

Dr. J. B. Reneau, Munday, asked me the other day if there was any interest in a feed lot tour of the high plains. This would be for the small feeder and would cover some of the smaller lots plus the Spur Experiment Station. If you are interested, see me or Dr. Reneau and something could be worked out if there is a

need. It could cover anywhere from one to three days depending on the wishes of the majority.

If you would like to learn more about leadership training and program development, the Longhorn Recreation Laboratory is the place for you. This lab is to be held March 24-30, 1963 at Glen Rose Camp, Glen Rose, Texas. It is designed as a stimulating experience for people interested in recreation. The cost is only \$35 per person, this includes meals, for six days of a wonderful experience! I have been once and have been wanting to go back every year since. I heartily recommend it.
